Why you should be pro-life





The case of abortion is a multifaceted argument of law, morality, philosophy and practicality. Too often it depends solely on a person's religion. If a person accepts a religion that says abortion is wrong, then a person generally accepts that abortion is wrong, regardless of the objective moral argument. It is, however, just as easy to reject the religion and therefore reject its doctrine regarding abortion without considering the objective moral argument. Unfortunately, a belief cannot be refuted, and it is difficult to gain support on an issue if the public does not generally accept the doctrine.

The typical moral argument claims that a fetus is a person, and causing harm to or killing a fetus is morally equivalent to harming or killing a person, therefore it should also be legally equivalent. However, this is a major problem in the abortion debate, as the idea of personhood is not easily definable or provable. Don Marquise, a moral philosopher and professor of philosophy at the University of Kansas, tackles this problem by arguing that the reason abortion is wrong has little to do with whether or not personhood exists in a fetus. He is not saying that personhood does not exist in a fetus, but that regardless of its personhood, it is still immoral to kill it.

In Marquise's piece, "Why Abortion is Immoral," he argued that the problem with both arguments is they argue the wrong issue. Morally, he says, the argument must "point to, or be based upon, the essence of the wrongness of killing, what it is that makes killing wrong." A person must understand, not just believe, that killing adult human beings is wrong.

It is illegal to take the life of an innocent adult human, no one refutes it. But why do we all so readily agree? Is it wrong because it brutalizes the person doing the killing? Marquise points out that the brutalization only comes after it is decided that killing is immoral, which means that without the designation of immorality, brutalization cannot exist. Neither does the argument that those who are left behind will be left in intense grief, otherwise it would be morally acceptable to kill a person who has no living friends or family.

What makes killing morally wrong, the worst of all things, is the loss of "all the

Black gold on campus?

Say hello to Schoolcraft's new oil rig

- To achieve horizontal drilling, machines burrow into the ground until they are able to locate a fresh water source. Once located, surface casing and cement are put in as support. The drill bit then continues until it reaches the "kick-off point," which is the point where the horizontal drilling will begin.
- A different, flexible drill is then lowered inside the hole. It takes about a quarter of a mile for the drill to make a complete horizontal curve. The bit will periodically be brought back up for maintenance. Cement and surface casing are again pumped into the hole, securing the walls of the hole. Then a machine is sent down which perforates the walls of the hole, causing cracks that allow gasses to seep into the oil well. A plug is sent

So, just what is that huge, flag-adorned tower next to the College's freeway sign? That is a new oil rig, ladies and gentlemen, which was set up in December. It was established for the purpose of searching for a potential source of crude oil and natural gas as a part of Schoolcraft's plan of becoming more efficient in its energy consumption.

The project investors are West Bay, an exploration company based in Traverse City. According to Schoolcraft's Vice President and Chief Financial Officer Glenn Cerny, West Bay came to Schoolcraft nearly 20 years ago. "They needed a site in which to drill ... and we leased the land to them."

Currently, West Bay is paying the College \$30,000 per year, plus royalty payments, to drill on site. Cerny says there is a pretty strong potential of finding oil. The project was initially started by West Bay back in 1993. However, the project had to first go through many permits in order to gain approval, due mainly to the oil industry's high standards when it comes to drilling locations.

The tower (or "derrick," which is a term used for the type of mechanism the rig is) does not, at the moment, actually contain any oil. The oil is being extracted by horizontal drilling using a wide-open stretch of land over on 6 mile in the Laurel Park subdivision on the east side of I-275. The rig was erected by a team of workers from the West Bay company working around the clock, drilling 3,000 feet below the surface horizontally. They chose the site to drill because it is what is referred to as a Niagara Reef, which is a geological access point beneath the bedrock. Once struck, the natural gasses will push the oil towards the surface, where it will be put to use.

Once obtained, the oil will be sent to a collection station that West Bay operates that is located behind the Costco on 8 Mile Road. Drilling operations will continue for another couple of weeks.

Should they actually reach that precious "black gold," there would be an estimated one hundred barrels pumped through the station every day. The College would benefit from refining the gases found in the ground (after gaining permission from regulators).

"We're not in the oil business," said Cerny when referring to the College's involvement. "This is simply a chance for the College, West Bay and (potentially) the surrounding area being able benefit from this natural resource.







down to isolate the fracture area off from the rest of the hole, and the fracturing process is done again.

The plugs are removed, and the surface equipment is installed. Most oil reserves are wider than they are tall, thus horizontal drilling allows the well to access more of the oil reserves than traditional vertical drilling would achieve. Horizontal drilling, however, does come at the cost of being much more expensive and taking much longer than vertical drilling.

Part III: Left in division

This is the third part in a series of three articles on the withdrawal of American troops from Iraq. The second part was published in the January 16, 2012 issue of the Connection.

In the dark, early morning hours of Dec. 18, 2011, a convoy of 110 vehicles carrying 500 American soldiers drove through the Iraqi desert. These were the last American troops in the country. After crossing into Kuwait, a group of American and Kuwaiti troops closed the gate on the border. The war in Iraq had finally come to an unceremonious end.

According to the New York Times, the exact details of the trip were a closely guarded secret – a telling revelation about the nation the U.S. has just left behind. Few ceremonies marked the withdrawal but there were sporadic celebrations among Iraqis.

The Iraq that is left behind, teetering on its first unsupported steps of post-Saddam nationhood, is in the midst of a crisis. A long standing partisan conflict between Sunnis and Shiites is once again bubbling to the surface. Tony Karon wrote in Time magazine that the various factions have just been using the nearly decade-long American presence in the country as a way to place themselves in a better position for the next part of a conflict that has continued even with U.S. forces occupying the country.

Prime Minister Nouri al-Maliki, who is Shiite and has been accused by Deputy Prime Minister Saleh al-Mutlaq

of creating a dictatorship, has arrested some of his rivals including a number of the Sunni Vice President Tariq al-Hashimi's guards. Al-Maliki ordered al-Hashimi's arrest and is preparing a case against the Vice President on terrorism charges. Al-Maliki accused al-Hashimi of plotting his assassination through a bomb plot in the heavily-fortified Green Zone, the area of Baghdad where the Iraqi government is headquartered.

The struggles between the Sunnis and Shiites are an expression of the goals of the two major powers in the region. Shiite Iran and Sunni Saudi Arabia. On Dec. 16, 2011, the Iraqi National Movement (INM), the second-largest block in Iraqi Parliament, withdrew in protest of Prime Minister al-Maliki's concentration of power and the order for Vice President al-Hashimi's arrest. The mostly-Sunni INM gained the most seats by a slim margin in the controversial 2010 election but was not able to form a government leading to the appointment of al-Maliki as Prime Minister after the merger of two Shiite parties.

The Sunnis and Shiites are not alone in wanting to push their own agendas. In the north of Iraq, the Kurds are pursuing greater autonomy. Kurdistan is on a mission to gain all the trappings of a modern nation with their own flag, army, government and, most importantly, oil reserves.

The men and women of America's Armed Forces who served in Iraq are

proud of the work they have done, and rightly so.

"We have given everything possible that we can to make that nation a better place and it's no longer needed for a U.S. presence. The governments and security forces are as developed as we could have possibly made them, and the people actually feel secure," said veteran and Schoolcraft student Mark Skotak.

The job of governing, securing and maintaining Iraq is now fully in Iraqi hands. However, there are formidable tasks ahead of them.

"We are never going to end terror in the Middle East ... but for the last 10 years we've done a phenomenal job improving the living conditions of the Iraqi people and training and providing the Iraqi Security Forces with the resources to make them successful," said Skotak.

Still, the challenges facing this new Iraq may be too much to be overcome. The extremely deep-rooted divides, coupled with a need for foreign investment, infrastructure and an unemployment rate (estimated) around 30 percent means that Iraq will have a difficult future. This is a future that many Iraqis see as being not much different from the past decade, perhaps, with another despot or even a string of them as Iran and Saudi Arabia vie for influence in the region. The unfortunate yet likely outcome is that Iraq will not become, as President Obama hoped, "[a] democratic model for the entire region."

On Jan. 13, the luxury cruise liner Costa Concordia struck a coral reef off the western shores of Italy. The ship was carrying 3,200 passengers as well as 1,000 crew members.

The collision ripped a 26-foot gash in the side of the ship, causing the boat to sink at an angle. Initially, the ship attempted to get closer to shore but continued to tilt until it came to rest at a 70-degree angle.

The wreck brought 14 passengers and one crew member's lives to an end with other victims "missing" and presumed dead. Miraculously, three people were rescued from within the sunken ship, 24 hours after the accident.

The ship's captain, Francesco Schettino, was arrested on preliminary charges of multiple manslaughter due in part to his failure to issue a distress call in a timely fashion. He was also arrested on failure to aid passengers because he fled the ship. Whatever happened to "The captain goes down with his ship?"

There's terror in Hollywood. On Tuesday, Jan. 17, two women walking their dogs beneath the iconic Hollywood sign in Griffith Park made a gruesome discovery: a severed head in a plastic bag. Police were immediately called in. The following day, two hands were discovered – one by a cadaver sniffing dog, and the other by a crime scene investigator. Later that day, a coroner investigator discovered the feet.

They have identified the remains as that of 66-year old Harvey Medellin, a retired airline worker who lived in the area. Police are certain that all the limbs belong to the same person but have been unable to determine how the man died. However, due to the condition the limbs and head were at the time of discovery, they believe it to be a "fresh kill."

Detroit International Bridge Company owner Manuel "Matty" Moroun was released from jail on Friday, Jan. 13, after spending the night behind bars. Moroun and DIBC president Dan Stamper were both jailed for failing to comply with the completion of the Gateway project. The project was intended to connect the Ambassador Bridge to nearby freeways, thus cutting down on congestion in the neighboring areas. People living in nearby areas claim that the increased commercial commuting brings large amounts of pollution and hazardous traffic to the areas surround the bridge. "I'm fine," Moroun told reporters upon release. "I love our country. It's the best country in the world." "I'm happy to see the right people being put in jail for once," said Joe McGuire, a member of Occupy Detroit's Direct Action committee. 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One year greener What have the charging stations been up to?

The electric car charging stations were first installed on campus in early December 2010. They were to serve as a centralized location for environmentally-conscious people to charge their electric battery-powered or hybrid vehicles.

In the first nine months of the stations' operation, they sat virtually untouched, averaging less than six hours of use per month. However, that all changed when the fall semester hit in September. "Our four stations were occupied for a total of 77 hours in September," said Dean Richard Weinkauf, Vice President of Instruction and the charging station's coordinator.

Since the beginning of the 2011 fall semester, there have been hundreds of hours spent on the charging station, showing that the investment in the stations are beginning to pay off. During that semester, the stations averaged over 125 hours per month. November was the busiest month for the stations with over 180 hours of usage.

By visiting the Michigan Electric Vehicle Show's site (MichiganEVshow.org), students can see a log of how extensively the charging stations are being used. Once there, simply clicking on the "Charging" tab and then clicking on the link to the Electric Vehicle Charging Station Dashboard shows in extensive detail how many hours have been spent using the stations and other information. The log is updated on a daily basis. It also displays how much each of the charging stations around campus are being used, as well as how much total energy has been used since the station's inception in 2010. Chargepoint, the company who owns the stations, uses these same figures to measure how many carbon pollutant emissions have been prevented from being released into our environment. Their results have so far amounted to 1,747 kilograms of greenhouse gases prevented.

"They monitor the charging stations' usage and give

me a ton of data about how these things are being used, and then I just plug it into this dashboard," said Weinkauf, referring to Chargepoint. He does, however, point out that the stations don't actually tell you how much electricity is being used.

Currently, there are at least three or four regular users of the Schoolcraft stations. The most-used location is at the North Parking Lot near the VisTaTech Center, suggesting the users are those who come for meetings and classes at the VisTaTech and Applied Science buildings.

Even in light of these successes, there are some

shortcomings. The sad reality is that, for automakers, these types of cars actually cost more to make than they make back through sales. This is because this type of technology is still in its infancy. Weinkauf predicts that these costs will likely go down as the market grows. Roughly 40,000 of these vehicles are sold every year and the numbers are growing. In the meantime, automakers such as Chevrolet, Toyota and Nissan will continue on with their approach to driving down the costs of their hi-tech goodies for consumers while Ford will take a multi-pronged approach with their very popular Ford Focus.

experiences, activities, projects and enjoyments which would otherwise have consisted one's future." This theory explains why society views this as the worst of all crimes and, as Marquise pointed out, why people diagnosed with a terminal illness think of dying as a very bad thing.

This argument does not rest on the assumption that a fetus is or is not human, as most pro-lifers and pro-choicers argue. Instead, it asserts that since every fetus has the potential to grow into a human being, it obviously is wrong to deprive it of that future as a human being. It is not necessary to say that since it is wrong to kill a person it is also wrong the kill a soon-to-be person, it is simply wrong to kill a thing that will grow to have a "valuable future like ours," as Marquise said.

inexcusable to kill the elderly or the comatose. Here, it is important to understand the difference between a necessary condition and a sufficient one. It is acceptable to not kill someone because they have a future, but it is not necessarily the only reason not to kill someone. So Marquise's future-like-ours view does stand as a sufficient condition to deem abortion immoral. Likewise, a fetus's desire to live need not be taken into account for the same reason it is not okay to kill someone who is suicidal. That individual may acquire the will to live sometime in the future.

The right to life is the most valuable of all rights. It is not okay for a woman to kill her two-year-old daughter because the child limits her career options. The woman does have the right to pursue her happiness in her chosen career, but not at the expense of someone else's life. Because this is clearly the case, Marquis said it is never okay to deprive a fetus, person or not, for the same reason.

stand the difference between unjust and "self-centered and callous," as Thomson puts it. Imagine that same policy maker was across the room from you, and you only had to be attached to him for ten minutes. Is it illegal for you to refuse? No, but it would be terribly callous to stand a few feet from a person and watch them die, knowing that a small inconvenience on your time could save him. If you were to save this man's life, would you be considered a hero? No, you would have behaved in a minimally decent way.

Nor is anyone by law required to give blood, or donate their organs after they die. Doing so would cause little inconvenience, but not doing so denies others of an essential resource they need to sustain life. People requiring organ and blood transfusion have a right to life, yet they do not have the right to anyone else's organs or blood unless the donor allows.

It can be said that a woman finding herself pregnant after engaging in intercourse has opened herself to the possibility of a baby. Or perhaps since the fetus is dependent on its mother there exists some special responsibility. There are, after all, laws that make people responsible for their children. Thomson said such responsibility cannot exist unless a person assumes it. "But if they have taken all necessary precautions against having a child," Thomson insists, "they do not simply by virtue of their biological relationship to the child who comes into existence have a special responsibility for it."

Finally, a pro-choicer may argue that this theory cannot be valid because it does not explain why it is person" and "callous person:" these are some distinctions Thomson said must be made when considering the abortion debate. By law, no one is required to act to save someone else's life when doing so requires threatening their own. Doing so would be considered heroic, it is going above and beyond any obligations a person has for another's life.

The Internet, government, and why you should be afraid

On Jan. 18, the online world went dark in protest of the Stop Online Piracy Act (SOPA) and the Protect Intellectual Property Act (PIPA). Wikipedia blacked out its entire site, while Google displayed a large censor bar over its familiar logo. Those sites, along with dozens of others (including Wired, Craigslist, BoingBoing, Reddit and FunnyOrDie), participated in the "SOPA blackout," altering their front pages - and in some cases removing them entirely – as an act of defiance against the proposed bills. The reason for all this is that the bills, which seem ostensibly noble in their intent, would give the government unprecedented power to censor websites that could potentially cripple the Internet as the ultimate source of free thought and open information.

as SOPA was delayed indefinitely, pending a redraft of the bill. So, all's well that ends well, right? Well, not quite.

On Jan. 19, the plot thickened considerably. In an M. Night Shyamalan-style twist, government agents, with help from various international police groups, shut down the file sharing website Megaupload.com in one fell swoop. The takedown included the arrest of four Megaupload executives including the founder, Kim Dotcom, on charges of setting up a systemized network of copyright infringement. This raised the obvious question, "What is the need for a new bill when you can take down a site as enormous as Megaupload (which, by the way, accounted for a whopping 4% of total Internet traffic, thanks to its high-bandwidth videos) with the click of a mouse?"

Of course, the glaring subtext is the wondrously impeccable timing of the feds in conjunction with the SOPA blackout. A heavy-pirating site gets shut down one day after a mass protest of an anti-piracy bill? How curious.

The idea that this was the culmination of a years-long operation that just coincidentally ended at this particular time, or that Megaupload just so happened to slip up at precisely the wrong moment is ridiculous. After all, Megaupload was never a particularly cautious site. Their piracy racket has been just short of public for the last few years. A closer inspection reveals that the evidence to initiate the takedown

The plan appears to have worked,

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and make the arrests could have been available for quite some time. It's fair to deduce this was an operation that had been sitting in the wings for quite a while.

As cynical as it may be, the conclusion that leaps to mind is the feds were waiting for SOPA to pass so they could spring the trap on Megaupload and claim, "You see? It works! We took down a major piracy ring!" However, when the SOPA backlash struck and it became apparent that there was too much negative response for the bill to go through, they had to change gears. So in a move of delicious evil genius, the feds decided to strike swiftly, in the wake of celebration, to teach those free-Internet, pirate-loving, copyright-infringing troublemakers a lesson. "You may have won your little battle but don't get too comfy. We can still screw with you anytime we want." This is pure speculation of course but it makes for a rather nice story.

However, the aftermath was very real. The ripple of fear the feds were presumably hoping for spread almost instantaneously. In the next few days, nine other websites (including Filesonic, Uploaded.to, VideoBB and FileJungle) all restricted or downright halted their file-sharing services of their own volition. This ranged from upload and download restrictions to the mass deletion of thousands of files and accounts. One of the largest remaining file-hosting sites, MediaFire, also showed signs of panic, deleting all the music from its Angrychairs Redux blog. We can only predict which site will fold next.

The moral of this ongoing story is that if a government lacks power, it will look for an excuse to get it. And if a government has power, all they need is an excuse to use it. Simply look at the PATRIOT Act or the FCC to see the level of restraint the government tends to display in these situations. The simple truth is that in cases where a website displays obvious evidence of illegal activity, the government can step right in and take care of it, as shown by Megaupload. There's no need for such egregious additions to the government's armaments, especially not in the form of a bill as poorly-constructed as SOPA. As James Madison said, "The essence of Government is power; and power, lodged as it must be in human hands, will ever be liable to abuse." Here's hoping that redraft takes a good, long time.

Headshots:

Always have a black and white shot of you with a serious look.

Have a colored one of you that best shows you in an "everyday" kind of way.

Make sure the backgrounds for the headshots are not distracting in any way.

Take a few different styles and poses for the color and mix it up with some from the waist up or a full-body shot.

Before auditions read ahead and check what the director is looking for in a headshot. For instance you don't want to show up with a black and white photo when everyone else took a colored digital photo there.

Résumé:

Never lie on a résumé. Always list special accents or

techniques you are trained to do. If you can salsa dance or put your leg behind your head, remember to list that.

If you can do behind-the-scenes assistance put that down. These can include makeup, building sets or pyrotechnics. Let a director know what you are capable of doing.

Always put all your contact information at the very top and in a clear font.

List all experience and training. If you have little experience that is okay, so long as you list extensive training.

Keep it organized. List film credits, stage credits and crew credits clearly.

Read through it many times, absorb as much as you can about the characters and choose the character that speaks to you best. As each person steps forward and reads through the script, it gets easier and my nerves calm. Then when they call my name, the butterflies return ... with force. I tamp down my nerves so that when I hold the script, it does not shake and give away that I'm anxious. I step into the spotlight set for the stage and do my best to read through the lines fluidly. We are given no feedback, only simply told to sit back down.

Each group reads – some read a second time. The director then stands up at the back of the theater and informs us of the process for what comes after the audition. He says to check the cast list the next day, reminding us that not everyone is cut out for that particular show, and to keep trying if we are not cast in this one. My fears are climbing out of my stomach and into my throat again. I feel like tomorrow could be the most exciting and intimidating day of my life. *To be continued...*

So what better way to show your support for the Giants tasty dishes. Here are recipes for both styles of clam chowder

Manhattan Clam Chowder

"Ingredients:

- 8 pounds quahog or large cherrystone clams, scrubbed and rinsed, opened clams discarded
- 4 slices bacon, cut into 1/2-inch lengths
- 2 cups finely chopped onion
- 1 cup finely chopped celery
- 1/2 cup chopped bell pepper
- 3/4 cup diced carrot
- 1 1/2 tablespoons minced garlic
- 3 bay leaves
- 1 1/2 teaspoons dried oregano leaves
- 4 sprigs fresh thyme
- 1/2 teaspoon crushed red pepper
- 1 1/4 pounds potatoes, peeled and cut into 1/2-inch cubes (about 3 cups)
- 1 cup chicken stock
- 3 cups peeled, seeded and chopped tomatoes or 1 (28-ounce) can whole tomatoes, chopped and juices reserved
- 1/4 cup chopped parsley leaves
- Freshly ground black pepper
- Salt

Directions:

In a large stockpot bring 2 cups of water to a boil. Add clams, cover and cook for 5 minutes. Uncover, quickly stir clams well with a wooden spoon, and recover. Allow clams to cook 5 to 10 minutes longer (this will depend on the type and size of clams you are using), or until most of the clams are opened. Transfer clams to a large bowl or baking dish and strain broth through a fine-meshed sieve into a bowl. (You should have about 6 cups of clam broth. If not, add enough water to bring the volume up to 6 cups.) When clams are cool enough to handle, remove them from their shells and chop into 1/2-inch pieces. Set clams and broth aside.

In a large heavy pot, add bacon and render until golden and crispy. Pour off all fat except 4 tablespoons. Add onions, celery, bell pepper and carrots and cook for 10 minutes, until vegetables are softened. Do not allow to color. Add garlic, bay leaves, oregano, thyme and crushed red pepper and cook an additional 2 minutes. Increase heat to high and add potatoes, reserved clam broth, and chicken stock and bring to a boil, covered. Cook for 20 minutes, or until potatoes are tender and the broth has thickened somewhat. Add tomatoes and continue to cook for 10 to 15 minutes. Remove the pot from the heat and add reserved clams and parsley and season with pepper and salt, if necessary. Allow chowder to sit for up to 1 hour to allow flavors to meld, then reheat slowly over low fire if necessary. Do not allow to boil."

Further north, lobster rolls and oysters reign supreme. New England's coastline brings in a wealth of seafood, from cod to clams and everything in between. Here are some of the best foods from New England to chow on while you root for the Pats.

New England Clam Chowder

"Ingredients:

- 8 pounds small quahogs or large cherrystone clams, scrubbed and rinsed, opened clams discarded
- 4 slices bacon, cut into 1/2-inch pieces
- 3 tablespoons unsalted butter
- 2 cups finely chopped yellow onions
- 1 cup finely chopped celery
- 1 1/2 teaspoons minced garlic
- 6 sprigs fresh thyme leaves
- 2 bay leaves
- 3 cups 1/2-inch cubed, peeled potatoes, about 1 1/4 pounds
- 2 cups heavy cream
- 1/4 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
- Salt
- 6 tablespoons cold unsalted butter, cut into 1 1/2-teaspoon pieces
- 1/4 cup minced parsley leaves
- 1/4 cup finely chopped chives or green onions

Directions:

In a large stockpot bring 2 cups of water to a boil. Add clams, cover and cook for 5 minutes. Uncover, quickly stir clams with a wooden spoon. Cover and cook 5 to 10 minutes longer (this will depend on the type and size of clams you are using), or until most of the clams are opened.

Transfer the clams to a large bowl or baking dish and strain the broth twice through a fine-mesh sieve into a bowl, being careful to strain out the sand. (You should have about 6 cups of clam broth. If not, add enough water to bring the volume up to 6 cups.) When the clams are cool enough to handle, remove them from their shells and chop into 1/2-inch pieces. Set clams and broth aside.

In a large heavy pot cook the bacon until crisp and the fat is rendered. Pour off all bacon fat except 2 tablespoons. Add the butter, onions and celery and cook until softened, about 5 minutes. Add the garlic, thyme and bay leaves, and cook until the vegetables are thoroughly wilted, about 3 minutes, being careful not to brown. Add the potatoes and reserved clam broth, and bring to a boil. Lower the heat, cover, and simmer for 20 to 30 minutes, or until the broth thickens slightly and the potatoes are very tender. (If you like a thicker broth, mash some of the potatoes against the side of the pot with a wooden spoon.) Remove from the heat, stir in clams and heavy cream and season with pepper and salt, if necessary.

Set aside for 1 hour, covered, to allow the flavors to marry. Place the pot over low heat, and slowly reheat, being careful not to bring to the boil. Serve hot, garnished with 1 or 2 pats of butter, parsley and chives."

Lobster rolls – A New England tradition, lobster rolls are served on a hotdog bun, with chopped bits of lobster and butter or mayonnaise. Originating as working-class staple, and mostly associated with Maine, now lobster rolls are now enjoyed by all New Englanders.

Baked Beans – Boston is called Bean Town for a reason. Baked beans from Boston are prepared using either maple syrup or molasses, and make the perfect side dish for any meal. They are a good, easily-made food that will serve as the perfect complement to any Super Bowl spread.

"Beauty and the Beast" redux

The classic film returns with an additional dimension

In honor of Black History Month, here are some classic films that show the strife and growth of society over the years through the eyes of African Americans. Though history has noted the struggle of this ethnicity, it has been through cinema that the masses have seen the harsh truth and sometimes the light-hearted moments for black Americans.

"Do the Right Thing" (1989)

One of the most well-known contemporary directors is Spike Lee. He is known for great works like "Jungle Fever" and "Malcolm X." He confronts race head-on and does not try to hide the issues. Lee tackles racism in one of his earliest works, "Do the Right Thing." It's a story of the tensions between blacks and Italians on a sweltering hot day in a Brooklyn neighborhood.

The story depicts a "grim social realism," but Lee tells the story with humor, color and music. One of the best characters is the local disc jockey, played by Samuel L. Jackson, who provides the neighborhood's soundtrack. Spike Lee does a beautiful job with the movie, and depicts the violent tension between the two races in the neighborhood. This movie is realistic – there are no villains or heroes, just humans. The point of the film is not to connect with the characters, but to understand what they are feeling.

"A Raisin in the Sun" (2008)

Before the civil rights movement, black actors or shows featuring black heritage were rarely seen on Broadway. African American roles – if there were any – were usually small, comedic and stereotypical in musicals and plays. However, in 1959 Lorraine Hansberry modernized theatre with her play "A Raisin in the Sun." The play centers on the Younger family and the decisions they face when their father's life insurance check arrives. There have been many adaptations, but one of the best was the 2008 television movie starring Sean Combs and Phylicia Rashad.

"A Raisin in the Sun" was the first story to create this sort of realistic portrayal of American life. It explores the tension between whites and black society. The story also shows firsthand how African American families with low income survived living in an oppressive and hostile white society. The film was able to capture this in a sincere and authentic way with the help of surprising talent from Sean Combs, better known as Diddy. He plays Walter, who progresses the most during the movie. He is selfish and does not realize how his actions cause pain to the rest of his family. It seems more real than other adaptations. The scenery really captures the feel of a postwar society. ASHAD

"Guess Who's Coming to Dinner"

During the 50s and 60s, the practice of interracial dating was not only frowned upon, but even talking about it was considered taboo. It was illegal in seventeen states at the time to get even married to another person not of the same race. And in the movie "Guess Who Coming to Dinner," they put a spotlight on the controversial topic. Spencer Tracy and Katharine Hepburn reunite as Matt Drayton and Christina Drayton, a traditional mother and father who learn that their daughter (Katharine Houghton) is engaged to Dr. John Prentice (Sidney Poitier).

This movie was filmed during the last few months of Tracy's life, his health was failing rapidly and those on set were unsure if he would be able to complete the movie. It was a bittersweet wrap on the film, for Tracy made it through filming, but died only 14 days later. The film received enormous support and was a box office hit. Katharine Hepburn even received the Academy Award for Best Actress from her as Mrs. Drayton. And the film had outstanding performances by the young Portier, who had to overcome his nerves when performing in front of those he called "giants" of Hollywood, and Katharine Houghton, who was also Hepburn's niece. In the final scene Tracey, despite his deteriorating health, delivers a beautiful and touching performance alongside his long time companion Hepburn, which will cause many viewers to shed some tears.

JC Brooks & the Uptown Sound

"Want More"

If this album does not make you want to dance, you might want to check for a pulse. JC Brooks & the Uptown Sound is a relatively obscure indie band out of Chicago, however their popularity has multiplied exponentially ever since receiving the thumbs up from Jeff Tweedy of Wilco for their powerful take on his "I Am Trying To Break Your Heart." Since then, the group has opened for a variety of acts, from Buddy Guy and Robert Plant to JJ Grey and Mofro to Fitz & the Tantrums and Lee Fields. They even played Rahm Emmanuel's inauguration concert, at the mayor-elect's request. Their sound could be called "garage funk" or "postpunk soul," and while the core trio of instrumentalists create an impeccably tight backdrop, it is the vocal strength of JC Brooks that make this ensemble a "must hear." Brooks supplies all of the gritty emotion of legends like Otis Redding and Marvin Gaye and owns a wicked falsetto that sets him apart from most vocalists in the industry.

The album opens with the title track, an unambiguously primal groove with James Brown shout. The next song, "Everything Will Be Fine," may be the band's most radio-ready track. It is carried by the charismatic tempo of a ska backbeat, fleshed out with a funky melody, and finished with positive and honest lyrics – an uplifting composition to say the least. "I Got High" bears a smooth Motown feel, with melodic percussion, a peppering of brass, and a pleading sort of tone in Brooks' vocals.

Tweedy's "I Am Trying to Break Your Heart" is the most valuable track on this album, not only because it launched the band into favor of some of the top billed names in the business, but because it reveals the brilliantly creative vision of the group. It is a definite departure from Wilco's slow and spacey takes on the song. "Sister Ray Charles" is Brooks' favorite song on the album. It is a sample of the bands jagged-edged R&B style, with all the guts and glory of upbeat gospel, and the influence of old school funk. All good things must come to an end and JC Brooks & the Uptown Sound close with the charming "shoop shoobie doo woos" of "Awake," a dedication to author and social activist, Howard Zinn.

On Dec. 6, 2011, Dan Auerbach and Patrick Carney, better known as the The Black Keys, unleashed their latest brainchild to an expectant word. And the world was not disappointed. But it doesn't matter what Auerbach is saying – it's the way he says it that makes this music feel so right. He has a rich, textured voice that brings to mind a post-Beatles John Lennon and lends itself perfectly both to the surfer-rock single "Lonely Boy" and the rock ballad, "Little Black Submarines."

Indeed, "Little Black Submarines" may be the album's strongest track. At first, Auerbach croons sweetly, as if he were singing a lullaby, then he seems to attack the words with aggression as the tempo rises. Here the lyrics are the strongest, and the listener may connect to their vulnerability, recognizing some very raw human emotion. The second half of the piece picks up considerably in tempo and volume. The vulnerability gives way to anger as the drums kick in and the guitar rhythms become more antagonistic. The song also carries a respectable guitar solo. This track begs to be played over and over: again, and even if the rest of the album were garbage (which it is not) this track would still be worth the money.

"Purple Tape" Genre: Alternative Pop



The hit single "Stay" by Lisa Loeb found its way not only into the 1994 movie "Reality Bites," but also to radios everywhere. Ethan Hawke, who was a friend of Loeb's, passed this song on to the movie's soundtrack and Loeb became the first unsigned music artist to have a number one hit single. This was the kick-start to a career that many did not know had been going on for years prior to this single's release.

Two years before "Stay" hit our living room radios Loeb self-released her first solo album on cassette, "Purple Tape." After being informed by her fans that their "Purple Tapes" had worn out, she decided to rerelease it in CD format in 2008. This special edition release also has an additional disc of Loeb's interviews on her music.

She takes listeners through her beginnings to her journey from Texas to New York and her battle with depression that followed her everywhere. Loeb also challenges her audiences to see more than just a pretty girl with a guitar, and view her as the serious artist she is.

The best of iOS Three exquisite distractions for the iPhone and iPad

While cellphone gaming was once scoffed upon (does anyone remember the N-Gage?) Apple's mobile operating system (iOS) and ever-expanding App Store have made the iPhone and iPad

strong contenders in the portable gaming realm. If you're looking for grand quests, deeply-engaging stories and state-of-the-art graphics ... well, you might want to look elsewhere. However, if you're looking to kill a few minutes between classes – or a few hours – these are some excellent time-wasters that will have you coming back for more.

"Jetpack Joyride"

"Jetpack Joyride" provides an excellent example of two key concepts of gaming: simplicity can be extremely effective, and everything is made better with a machine gun jetpack.



The gameplay is straightforward. You play a small man with a jetpack (initially propelled by bullets) who is constantly running right, and your objective is to avoid obstacles for as long as possible, collecting coins and upgrades along the way. The controls are as simple as it gets: touch the screen to move up, let go to move down.

It's a basic premise that has been done many times before, however "Joyride" features a number of elements that transform it from an amusing distraction to a surprisingly engaging experience. The most crucial addition is the mission system, in which you level up by completing challenges such as collecting a certain amount of coins or rubbing your head against the ceiling for a certain distance. Working towards different goals adds a lot to the game, as you're not just doing the same thing over and over again ... even though you are.

There are also vehicles to spice things up, ranging from the Crazy Freaking Teleporter to the Gravity Suit to a fire-breathing mechanical dragon named Cuddles. Each vehicle utilizes the one-button controls in a different way, and mastering each becomes a necessity as you move up the ranks.

While deceptively simple in nature, "Jetpack Joyride" is a wonderful little title packed with tons of twitchy action, plenty of replay value, pixel-perfect graphics and a catchy soundtrack. The fact that it's also a free download makes this a no-brainer – pick it up as soon as you get the chance. surprisingly effective, converting the touch screen into a controller without sacrificing too much screen space or playability.

There are several unlockable extras, including achievements and the ability to play as Tails. You also get the option to choose between the Japanese and U.S. soundtracks, both of which are excellent. These additions make "Sonic CD" a worthwhile pickup even if you have the original. Simply put, "Sonic CD" is a classic and at \$4.99, it's a steal. If you've never played it before, this is one download you won't want to miss.

"World of Goo HD"

Originating as a conceptual entry in the inaugural Experimental Gameplay Project, which gives indie game designers seven days to create an experimental game, "World of Goo" took the gaming world by storm with its unique combination



of inventive puzzles, a superb visual style and delicious off-kilter humor.

This puzzling construction game has you controlling little balls of goo, which can be connected together to form structures. Each stage typically involves creating a bridge or framework to transport loose goo balls to the goo pipe where they are sucked up. As you progress, the gaps you have to traverse become increasingly complex and dangerous.

A hair-thin thread holds lives of the characters together, and viewers are perpetually kept on edge, as the tiniest break in this fragile web will send a ripple through an entire community. Equally captivating is the need to know just how far Emily Thorne's drive for justice will take her. Each series is riveting, and both "Revenge" and "Ringer" satisfy an appetite for a good story. In terms of acting ability, "Revenge" has a small edge over "Ringer." The production quality of "Ringer" is what may have landed it a spot on CBS's affiliate rather than the major network itself, but fortunately, there is plenty of love for campy drama. If the two were scheduled for the same time slot, "Revenge" would be the likely favorite with themes that appeal to the most basic nature of humanity. SC's enigmatic forward makes his bid

Yet and still, in the midst of our allure, how easily we seem to forget the fact that this enchanting star has many faces.

In the sports world today, a Lebron James-Kobe Bryant-ized society, the superstar position is often raised by too many fans' eyes to a pantheon-like status all by itself. However, due to the pedestal of perfection that we fans put these stars on, we unconsciously overlook the finite qualities that make these "stars" mortal men.

From the bleachers

One can't help but to see Schoolcraft's own power forward, Karl Moore, as an adequate fit for the rank of star material. Moore is ranked second in Division II NJCAA basketball for rebounds per game with 13.3 and ranked 9th in scoring with 22.5 points per game. On the bench

But one thing we can be sure of is this star isn't perfect. "Karl Moore has potential to be the best in the NJCAA," remarked men's coach Randy Henry. Potential is something Moore has a seemingly endless amount of. It's how far along in the process of him transforming that potential into raw capability and talent that sometimes frustrates those who know Moore best. "Still I want to see more production from him on the defensive end. If Karl were to put as much effort into his defensive game as he does into producing on the offensive end, he would be one of the greatest threats in the Region 12 division," says Henry. The helpful criticism is accurate seeing how the 6'7" forward has only produced .57 blocks per game thus far in this season. Lenderick Witcher, freshman guard, has praise for Moore, but also recognizes room for improvement. "Moore is an incredible rebounder, but still I'd love to see him pass the rock more." For all of his scoring prowess, Moore only averages less than a single assist per game, an incredibly small number considering all of the attention and rebounds the power forward draws under the basket. "At the end of the day it's all about the team," Witcher went on to say.

From the heart

Moore is well aware of his team but there's another on which he's focused. Behind the crowd-pleasing, rebounding assassin and past the star with room for improvement, there lies another side that few ever really see. When asked what fueled his onthe-court passion and his off-the-court attitude and mentality, Moore mentioned his young child.

"My motivation is my eight-month-old daughter, Heaven Marie Moore. To me basketball is my way out. I do what I do with hopes that she won't have to grow up and experience the same things that I did." At first glance, one would rarely fathom such a story from this 6'7" baller. Being a father adds an unexpected layer to Moore's character. But he wasn't done there. In addition to his family, Moore made sure to emphasis his special and sincere dedication to God. "I want to be the first member of my church to donate \$1 million. I always told God, if He could use anybody, I hope He would use me. I really just want to be blessed so I can bless

others."

For those fortunate enough to know all of these sides of Moore, he's much more than a fan favorite, a teammate or a young father. He's a complex combination of all three and more. Moore may be a star at the College, but he'll have to mature as a person, a teammate and player to take his game to the next level and reach that potential so many others have seen. His play style is ferocious, his potential is incomparable and his motivation is based on faith and family. Now it's only a question of whether Moore can harness all of these facets and turn them into singular greatness. At the very least, a lot of people will be watching.

Domonique Jones and Shawnicka Thomas show their loyalty by showing up to every game and putting in their best effort whether it's in practice or in an actual game. The effort they show makes them a talented duo and their hard work makes them a tough opponent for other teams on a nightly basis. Those tangibles alone can make a team good but, with great teammates surrounding Jones and Thomas, the team has a legitimate shot at winning the hardwood championship that every team desires.

And that brings us to respect, something that is demanded when facing this dynamic duo. Jones and Thomas have demonstrated the dedication necessary to compete for a championship and the feeling is mutual around the locker room. This team can go all the way if they continue to ride the momentum of a winning record and continue to get stellar performances from their forward duo. With playoffs within reach, expect the star forwards to do whatever it takes to put the Lady Ocelots in a position to win.
