American Harvest Restaurant wins fifth straight title

For the fifth consecutive year, Schoolcraft's own American Harvest Restaurant, located in the Vista Tech Center, has won first place in Open Table's annual Diner's Choice awards for Best Lunch in Michigan. It was also granted a Diner's Choice Restaurant award and the Fit of Foodies award.

Open Table is a website that coordinates reservations for over 31,000 restaurants nationwide, and invites its users, both the casual diner and the food critic alike, to review the restaurants they visit. Reviews are accepted only from confirmed diners, and the site creates an aggregate score for all its affiliated restaurants. Currently, the American Harvest Restaurant has an aggregate score of 4.5 of 5 from a total of 82 reviews. Each year, Open Table surveys its users to vote on categories such as Best Lunch, Most Romantic, and

Best Service.

User comments on Open Table include such reviews as "Very imaginative & creative taste combinations & the presentations were outstanding. Recommended for couples, small groups, but not young children," from user Gourmetastict and "This is a great dining experience, with a creative seasonal menu and reasonable prices. The Schoolcraft College culinary students gain the experience of food prep in a real-world setting under the direction of their teachers," from user Tanglewood.

Part of what makes the American Harvest Restaurant unique is that it is not your run-of-the-mill upscale eatery. The restaurant is student operated, where aspiring chefs, sauciers, and pastry chefs bustle about to prepare meals that both look and taste great, while at the same time earning valuable experience

and knowledge necessary to advance their culinary skills. Supervised by renown master and executive chefs, the students prepare a range of dishes of both foreign and domestic provenance made to excite the palates of the often professional clientele and professional foodies. It is not uncommon to see students being critiqued while patrons dine among them.

Margaret Fleming, the Dining Room instructor, has been with Schoolcraft since 1995. "After going through the program myself, it's an honor to be a part of it now as an instructor."

Fleming teaches students the importance of maintaining the front of the house, which consists of the servers and hostesses, and the back of the house, which includes the preparation of the food. She also instructs students in wine service, customer service, and the process of hiring proper staff, all important for starting a restaurant of their own.

"The Diner's Choice awards set us apart from any other program. We create chefs of the future."

On their busiest days, the American Harvest can see over 60 reservations. Holiday seasons are their busiest, and

making reservations is preferred over walk-ins.

The clientele that frequents American Harvest runs the gamut from college students, local businesses, community members, and church groups.

"Our up-scale menu is designed for a distinguished palate," says Fleming. "The plan is for each of our customers to have the ultimate dining experience."

Regulars at American Harvest tend to be steadfast and loyal with their patronage. Frank and Marie Nido have been dining at Schoolcraft since 1993.

"The quality of the food, the presentation—I like it all," said Mrs. Nido.

"This is our third time coming this week. It's changed a little since we started coming, the set-up is a little different. We enjoy meeting all of the kids."

Food isn't the only thing going for the restaurant; the atmosphere is both inviting yet intimate, serving as the perfect venue for tables of two to twenty. The entryway sweeps into a wide dining room, all of which has a view of the kitchens, which serves as a constant

UNREST IN UKRAINE

The Ukraine, sandwiched between Russia and the rest of Europe, faces a crisis. According to the "Wall Street Journal", the unrest began at the end of 2013 when Ukrainian President Viktor Yanukovich rejected European trade in favor of a 15 billion dollar bailout from Russia. The pro-European western side of Ukraine protested, forcing President Yanukovich to flee the country and seek refuge in Russia towards the end of February. Following his exile, the Ukrainian parliament voted to impeach President Yanukovich and establish an election on May 25.

This upset the pro-Russian eastern end of Ukraine and Russia itself. Ukraine is valuable to Russia because the bulk of Russia's natural gas pipelines run through Ukraine. If Russia lost control of these pipelines, they would lose out in providing the rest of Europe with nearly a quarter of its natural gas supply. Russia cut the supply of natural gas to the Ukraine and the rest of Europe in 2006 and 2009 as a result of a payment dispute, which shows the political and economic investment they have within Ukraine.

There is a European initiative to increase democracy and free trade with Ukraine. Because the Ukraine is sandwiched between Russia and the rest of Europe, Ukrainians have accused Russia of using them as a bargaining chip with the rest of Europe.

CRIMEA AND ITS IMPORTANCE

Crimea is a peninsula protruding off the southern end of Ukraine. The "Autonomous Republic of Crimea" (as it is formally known) was invaded by Russian troops in early March with the intent to join Crimea with Russia. The mission apparently worked, as Crimea voted on March 17 to secede from Ukraine and reunite with Russia.

Because of this, the Ukraine is threatening to go nuclear, according to "USA Today". The U.S., United Kingdom, and Russia agreed to the "Budapest Memorandum on Security Assistance" in 1994 to disarm the Ukrainian nuclear arsenal in exchange for their "territorial integrity." The same pact, however, prohibited a takeover of Crimea. With Russian forces occupying Crimea and Crimea usurping the rule of the Ukraine, the Ukraine promises to arm themselves with nuclear weapons. This threat will be carried out if the West does not honor their end of the bargain, which was to prevent the Russian occupation. This sentiment grew with the Russian threat of invading eastern Ukraine itself, according to the same article. According to "USA Today", "...the signatories promised that none of them would threaten or use force to alter the territorial integrity or political independence of Ukraine." The pact said nothing about other countries acting on behalf of Ukraine. Russian president Vladimir Putin maintains that this new Ukrainian government, after ousting Yanukovich, is illegitimate, and thus the pact does not apply to them.

IMPLICATIONS

While Crimea is considered an independent republic, and is mostly pro-Russian, the land is a part of the Ukraine. President Barack Obama has

There will be several giveaways and raffle prizes handed out during the event. There will also be a poster competition based on this year's theme with two winners taking home a \$250 SCF scholarship. A MSU Museum exhibit, "Michigan Eats," will also be on display.

On March 26, there will be a screening and discussion on the documentary "Ingredients," which is based on the local food movement. The documentary screening will occur on Wednesday, March 26, in VT550 at 1 p.m. and 3 p.m. (two screenings of the video)."

Working towards a cleaner future, Schoolcraft does its part in the community. Students are encouraged to participate in Earth Day activities and attend this informative and exciting event. ■



Is there a doctor in the house?

Health care reform affects college faculty and students

President Barack Obama's Affordable Care Act (ACA) has been received by Americans with mixed reviews.

Recently, colleges across the country have spoken out against the act, particularly as it applies to student health plans and faculty insurance requirements, although the ACA—commonly referred to as "Obamacare"—does carry benefits for young adults. Most notably, people in this age demographic will be covered under their parents' insurance until the age of 26.


"This could give the grad some time to gain some experience in a position, receive a good salary, and not have to worry about benefits for some time," said Eric Oakland, benefits consultant at the Ruggieri Consulting Group.

"If a student can't find the

perfect job right away, then it allows them to be more selective in their choice because one of the major expenses they would face would be taken care of by being on their parents' plan."

However, college students who rely on insurance provided through their schools may see different effects. Some colleges, particularly private liberal arts colleges, are considering eliminating student health plans due to the increased costs under the ACA. According to the Wall Street Journal, the costs of these plans could increase by as much as 1,112 percent.

Covering college students' health care is a fairly easy task, considering these students are generally at the peak of health, according to Forbes.com. Therefore, students are typically offered "limited benefit" plans with a set cap, usually around \$10,000. As a result,



plans are inexpensive and affordable on nearly any budget.

Caps this low can be problematic due to hospital fees. If a student had to be admitted to a hospital, a cap of \$10,000 would not cover the cost of care. The ACA, however, prohibits such caps. From 2013 to 2014 caps cannot be set below \$500,000, according to Forbes.com. After 2014 they will be eliminated entirely.

Under Obamacare, adults have preventive care, including physicals, inoculations

and various health screenings.

Some colleges have cut adjunct faculty hours to avoid paying for their health care insurance. The ACA considers an employee "full-time" if they work 30 hours or more per week, according to The Huffington Post.

Employer-assisted health insurance must be provided to all full-time individuals.

Part-time employees may

LARCENY-THEFT

At 12:12 p.m. on Feb. 19 a student entered the women's restroom in the 200 corridor of the Liberal Arts Building. She placed two text books and two spiral-bound notebooks on the sink while she attended her needs. She then went to the vending area, where she put the books down a second time while making her selections. She then picked up the books and went to her next class, where she noticed that one of the text books was missing. She reported the missing book to Dean Cheryl Hawkins. She met with an officer from Schoolcraft College Police Authority and the two looked in all of the areas she had gone. The officer reviewed the video footage and found she had left the restroom with all four books. However, no footage is available for the vending area; she did not have her name in the books. The bookstore was notified of the possibility of someone turning in the missing book.

POSSESSION OF A DANGEROUS WEAPON

On the afternoon of Mar. 3 two SCPA officers responded to the Student Activities Office for a report of a possible student in possession of a TASER. When the officers arrived staff told the officers that they had heard a loud "zapping" sound and observed a student as she placed a dark object into a book bag. They then pointed out the student, who was in the company of another student. The officers approached the two students and advised them that they were responding to a report of an alleged TASER in the

possession of one of the students and asked if they had a stun-gun in their possession. Both students denied having a stun-gun. One student offered up her bag and told the officers they could search it, which they did without finding any contraband. Another book bag was on a nearby chair where the two women were and an officer asked who the bag belonged to. One of the women identified the bag as her own, whereupon the officer asked if he may search it; she assented to the search. During the search of the bag a stun-gun was discovered in a side pocket. The woman admitted that the device was her property. She admitted she had the device out of the bag when it activated unintentionally. The officer took possession of the stun-gun and asked the student to return to the SCPA office with them to fill out a statement form. Livonia Police were notified of the incident and at about 5:00 p.m. Livonia Police arrived at the SCPA office where he took custody of the student, arresting her for unlawful possession of a stun-gun. The case has been forwarded to student services for review.

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


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LinkedIn: Employees of the future

are presented with dozens of listings for the professional "connections" that they might not have known they had. reminder of Schoolcraft's philosophy of openness as well as serving to pique the curiosity of patrons. Large floor-to-ceiling windows allow natural light to bring out the many vibrant colors in the dishes while accenting the ambient lighting of the venue.

Foodies will love the fact that no two menus are ever the same. Students prepare new dishes with every meal, with a handful of more experienced students responsible for any particular entrée, and each menu is a testament to said students' talent and creativity. Patrons William and Elaine Hayes said, "We've been coming here for years and years. Even when it was the old place.

We love the food and we take a lot of it home to save ourselves cooking."

The dishes are assigned to meet criteria established by the College's internationally acclaimed culinary staff, and are judged on everything from flavor and presentation. Staff members like Certified Executive Chef Shawn Loving, once the personal chef to the 2008 US Olympic team, are always on hand, using their sharp eyes—and tongues—to make sure everything from food to service is up to par.

According to Mark Waynick, culinary student, his favorite part of the job is, "The different types of people we get in here. We learn a lot from the diversity of the customers that come in."

While it may be difficult for students to enter and succeed

in the fast-paced, cut-throat world of culinary arts, Schoolcraft students are blessed to have two Certified Master Chefs, including Brian Beland and Jeffrey Gabriel. Currently, there are only 66 CMCs in the US, and each is accredited through a rigorous process by the American Culinary Federation, and must recertify every five years. Joining them are Certified Executive Chefs (CEC) Shawn Loving, Chris Misiak, Brian Polcyn, Certified Master Pastry Chef Joseph Decker, and Chef Marcus Haight, who is both a CEC and Certified Executive Pastry Chef.

With such talent at the helm, it is no wonder the American Harvest Restaurant has pulled ahead of local competitors such as Andiamo's, Gaucho Steakhouse, and Mitchell's Fish Market. Part of American Harvest's edge is its high quality and low price. For an average of \$15 a person at lunch, patrons can enjoy gourmet food, including a beverage and a stunning dessert, though prices can fluctuate. Dinner runs at around \$30 a plate and is presented as a large buffet. For less adventurous diners, the dinner buffets are themed, with upcoming selections including European and South American dishes, as well as certain selections on a to-be-determined basis as students complete practical trials.



Everyone is welcome at the American Harvest restaurant, students included. While not required, reservations are highly recommended, as seats fill up fast. The dress code is officially "casual," though the quality of the venue almost begs for a bit more, as most of the clientele is dressed in professional attire. The restaurant is open for lunch Tuesday through Friday with three seatings every fifteen minutes starting at 11:45. Seating opens for dinner at 5:30 p.m. The restaurant is closed Saturday through Monday, and on select dates, which are subject to change. Whether you are a foodie in search of a new experience or simply looking for an amazing meal that won't break the bank, the American Harvest Restaurant is for you. only work up to 29 hours per week without having to be covered by their employers. Assistant faculty may only teach up to 10 credits per semester in order to receive "part-time" status. Community colleges that typically employ more adjunct instructors than other colleges and universities are feeling the effects of this law.

It is important to note that

the Affordable Care Act is in its infancy and subject to revision. This was stressed by Susan Cyrulnik, Benefits Manager in the Human Resources Department Schoolcraft College: "Laws are very complex and difficult to interpret. We must work closely with an insurance broker and spend a lot of time learning new laws."

As 2014 progresses, so will the debate about how Obamacare will affect Americans both today and into the future. ■

Fortunately for women, this is one of the few industries where they dominate. Female models earn up to 148 percent more than male models, according to Payscale.com. Earning 83 million in 2013, Forbes reports that nearly half of that sum was accumulated by one woman: Gisele Bündchen at 42 million. She, and every woman on the list, is in their thirties as well. Sensing a pattern?

It's bizarre how America celebrates youth and penalizes the natural progression of

age as though it is optional, or a symptom of laziness rather than of life. One is encouraged to act their age, but is slighted for looking their age. "Ah, I hear [insert celebrity name here] got Botox to stave off the oldness. How shameful, yet how exciting for them!"

Is it like professional football, where you get paid an obscene amount of money to put yourself in harm's way? Is that why modeling is so lucrative in the United States, where a pouty lip and sharp cheekbones can set you up financially for the rest of your life?

You're going to grow up America. You're simply terrified to go outside without your makeup on. Put down the face cream, step away from the Grace Kelly shades and ludicrous babushkas, and let it happen. ■

Lent - A time of praying, fasting, and almsgiving

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A season everyone can benefit from

Lent has begun, and the six-week Christian tradition lingers in the minds of many. Christian or not, the preparation for Easter presents valuable lessons to be learned, and much can be gained by participating in Lenten practices.

Since the earliest times of Christianity, there is evidence of Lenten preparation for Easter. The origins come from the idea that Jesus survived forty days and forty nights of fasting in the Judean Desert while being tempted by Satan, which is detailed in the gospels of Matthew, Mark, and Luke.

Like all Christian holidays and holy days, Lent has changed over the years, but its purpose has always been the same: penitence and self-examination, demonstrated by self-denial, in preparation for Easter, or Jesus' resurrection.

Until the 600s, Lent began on Quadragesima (Fortieth)

Sunday, but Gregory the Great (c.540-604) moved it to a Wednesday, now called Ash Wednesday, to secure the exact number of forty days in Lent—not counting Sundays, which were feast days, according to "Christianity Today". Sundays are excluded from the reckoning of the forty days because Sunday is considered to be the day Christ arose, making it inappropriate for people to fast and mourn their sins because Christians believe that one must celebrate his resurrection for our salvation.

The sixth Sunday of Lent, known as Palm Sunday, is the beginning of holy week. On this day, most Christian denominations rejoice the triumphal entry of Jesus Christ into Jerusalem the week before his death and resurrection.

Palm Sunday is followed by Holy (or Maundy) Thursday, which reflects Christ's last supper with his disciples. According to tradition, Jesus washed his disciples' feet and told them to serve others as he served him. Most importantly, it was the night he instituted the sacrament of confession, an institution that remains today.

The following day, Good Friday, commemorates the crucifixion of Jesus Christ on Calvary Hill. Holy Saturday, the day after Good Friday, honors the day that Jesus' body lay in

the tomb. This is followed by Easter Sunday—the day Christians celebrate Jesus' resurrection from the dead.

The forty-day period of Lent is set aside as a season of soul-searching and repentance for nearly all Christians, but everyone has their own way of preparing for Easter.

In the early Church, Lent was a time where new converts were instructed in faith and prepared to be baptized on Easter.

Now, Lent is known as a time of fasting, praying, and almsgiving. Typically, one will choose a food item or activity to give up for the duration of Lent in honor of Jesus fasting in the desert, as well as giving up meat on Ash Wednesday and all Fridays. Christians also use this time to go out of their way to pray—especially repent—and serve others more often than usual.

Aside from doing traditional Lenten practices, everyone, even those who question their faith or have non-Christian beliefs, can learn something with their participation in the season in their own way. Instead of giving up the traditional McDonald's trips, pop, Facebook, smoking, or one's favorite TV show, try giving up a habit that is not what God is calling us to be and the one that will benefit more than just yourself.

Fast from gossip or dishonesty and start always being truthful and honest, refrain from foul language and put-downs; start affirming the good in other people, stop holding resentment and start practicing forgiveness, or give up being hurt or upset with people who have hurt or offended you and instead pray for the courage to forgive them.

One may also want to read daily reflections during Lent, participate in a charity, attend an intimate and informal weekday mass, experience stations of the cross at any church on Good Friday, partake in a fish fry, or make a commitment to try something new spiritually, such as going to a church of a different ethnicity than your own or reading the entire Gospel of Mark, the shortest Gospel and most concise story of Jesus' life. Instead of using extra cash to go out with friends or going shopping for new clothes or the latest video game, take the money that would normally be spent and give it to a charity of choice, or pay it forward to a stranger.

If you choose to participate in Lenten sacrifice, make it count. Do not participate in the forty-days of penitence and

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New Detroit Arena is just what the doctor ordered ... for me

He was able to get a start in America and begin a family. He was there to learn mathematics from me, and in exchange I asked him to teach me some of his language and about his homeland.

I believe it accomplished two things: I showed him that I cared enough about him to learn and use the words he taught me and I believe that in opening his mind to teaching me, I opened his mind to learning from me.

He would respond to my greeting in Fulani with "(w) ho is this that speaks to me in Fulani?" He always asked the question with a smile and I al-

ways felt a sense of satisfaction because he knew I cared about him as a person.

I challenge you to find an area of interest as a complement to your education. Is your primary interest in the arts? Reach out to science. Are you in a technical field? Teach yourself about the arts.

It is this diversity that will enrich you as a citizen of the world. The world is more than the latest fashion or movie. This does not devalue these things; it just puts them into perspective. Learn about different cultures because it will make you a more complete citizen of both the United States and of the world, and that is the true value of education and diversity. ■

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THIRD TIME'S THE CHARM

“Lords of Shadow 2” resurrects a near-dead franchise

Konami sought to reboot their legendary “Castlevania” franchise in 2010, but after two sloppy steps forward, it seemed that the legend had come to an end. With the aid of a reworked game engine, however, it seems that the Belmont family lives on.

Reawakening after centuries of sleep, the hero-turned-vampire Gabriel Belmont finds himself in a modern-day setting. With Satan’s return on the horizon, the man now known as Dracula must journey through the city seeking out the dark lord’s acolytes whilst regaining his powers by occasionally traveling back in time to his castle with the aid of his dead wife and son.

Unlike the original “Lords of Shadow,” the sequel offers a more open-world experience and allows players to bounce between the present day city and the ancient castle at will. The game offers several hours

of extra gameplay beyond the final blow being dealt, and has artwork, stat-increasing gems, and lore to collect throughout the game.

The combat of “Lords of Shadow 2” has few alterations to past titles in the series, though now players are forced to learn and utilize every possible combo in order to maximize the efficiency of each of the three weapons in the game. Additionally, the music, while still a far cry from the masterpieces of yesteryear—is still a massive improvement above the forgettable droning of the past two titles.

Unfortunately, there are still issues that need to be resolved.

The enemy design is beyond generic with many being less intimidating than most Tim Burton creations, the modern city stages are interchangeable with any other cityscape from any other game, and some of the enemies overuse unblockable attacks to the point of being completely unfair, especially later in the game when waves of energy can pass



through solid walls.

Another painful addition is the series’ continued reliance on unnecessary references. We get it Konami, the whole ‘30 lives’ code is cool and all but what was added to the game by referencing “Fear & Loathing in Las Vegas?”

Conversely, one of the game’s surprisingly good highlights is the interaction between Dracula himself

and his son who may or may not simply be a figment of his imagination. Despite being feared as the prince of darkness, it is obvious that Gabriel wishes that he could simply live a happy life with his family and at times he even breaks away from the task at hand just to offer aid to them.

This is by no means a perfect game but it is a huge step in the right direction. Rather

than being the final nail in the franchise’s coffin, “Castlevania: Lords of Shadow 2” actually pulls a few out. Where the series goes from here is anybody’s guess, but so long as the ground plan established in this game is followed then fans will have little to worry about. ■



The Walking Dead keeps on walking

Midseason premiere gives viewers a change of scenery

The mid-Season 4 finale that aired Dec. 1, 2013 left fans of the Walking Dead clamoring for answers.

The callous and enigmatic Governor, forcing the residents of the prison to scatter, had decimated the prison. There was debate about who would make it to the next half of the season; the certainty of several characters' survival was not clear when the credits rolled at the end of the midseason finale.

"Nothing here is vegetarian"

An appetizer for the new season of "Hannibal"

Based on the popular "Red Dragon" series by Thomas Harris, "Hannibal" follows special agent Will Graham as he works with the FBI to find notorious serial killers—namely the Chesapeake Ripper and the Copycat Killer.

The show starts before the "Silence of the Lambs" era of the series and, according to executive producer Bryan Fuller, the show will end where "The Silence of the Lambs" begins.

In the first season, Will Graham becomes the patient of an eccentric psychiatrist, Hannibal Lecter, and then begins a downward spiral as he becomes ill. Graham is then manipulated by Lecter and framed as the Copycat Killer.

Considered an alternate universe to the book series, the show does not directly follow the book's plot; the most notable change being that multiple characters have had their genders changed. The show takes all the grisly, dark aspects of the book and adds stunning cinematography and a perfect soundtrack to make the show become a deep psychological thriller that hooks viewers' attention.

The bar was set high for season two after the intense and heart wrenching conclusion of season one with the final

episode ending in the iconic scene from "The Silence of the Lambs" but with a slight twist: Graham is behind bars instead of Dr. Lecter. Though not even halfway through season two, it has not disappointed. Graham's arrest has caused a lot of stress on many other characters and the murders have become even more complex.

The cast includes Hugh Dancy as Graham, Mads Mikkelsen as Lecter, Gillian Anderson as Bedelia Du Maurier, Laurence Fishburne as Jack Crawford, Lara Jean Chorostecky as Freddie Lounds, Hettienne Park as Beverly Katz, and Caroline Dhavernas as Alana Bloom. The ensemble has been highly acclaimed, especially Mads Mikkelsen's and Hugh Dancy's performances. Their acting has been compared to Anthony Hopkins' and Edward Norton's renowned performances in the 2002 film "Red Dragon."

Mikkelsen gives Lecter an air of sophistication with a subtle yet always present threat of danger, as compared to Hopkins' Joker-like and more rugged air. Dancy captures Graham's downward spiral perfectly and even among all the grotesque murder scenes and blood, his character still has a strange innocence to him. Mikkelsen's and Dancy's on-screen chemistry has been considered even better than Hopkins' and

"Hannibal" is currently on its second season and airs on NBC Friday nights at 10 p.m. ■

While Batman has starred in some pretty awful plots, he has also had the chance to redeem himself by starring in great narratives. From graphic novels to TV shows, the Dark Knight has managed to produce many memorable stories, which people still remember to this day.

10. "A Death in the Family" (Batman #426-429 by Jim Starlin and Jim Aparo): Ask any fan what was one of the biggest mistakes in Batman history, and they will probably tell you that it was the creation of the second Robin, Jason Todd. While Jason was somewhat popular under Max Allan Collin's scripts, Jim Starlin turned him into an unlikeable, homicidal jerk. This plot was created to determine his fate ... and did not end well for him. In the story, Jason learns that the woman he thought was his mother was actually a stepmother, and that his real mother one of three women on a list (one suspect being Black Canary's archenemy, Lady Shiva). When his fiancée Julie tries to kill a man, Bruce Wayne takes a creepy doctor's advice to go on vacation in Transylvania. It is soon revealed that the Monk, a vampire, is behind Julie's behavior and Batman must put a stop to the bloodsucking baddie's plans. Artist-writer Matt Wagner recently modernized the story, but nothing beats the original, which went beyond Batman's normal adventures.

8. Batman: Mask of the Phantasm: How could this NOT be on the list? While it did not fare well at the box office, there is not a Batman fan alive who does not love this movie. When a new vigilante begins killing mobsters, Batman is blamed for the killings and must clear his name. Coincidentally (yeah right), Bruce Wayne's first love, Andrea Beaumont, is back in town, bringing back memories that show what ultimately made Bruce become the Guardian



of Gotham. A well-written script, great animation, and very compelling characters are what make this a perfect Batman story.

7. The Batman/Green Hornet Crossover (Batman (1966 series) episodes 85 and 86): Yes, this happened. This seems to be changing with the announcement of a Netflix series based on Daredevil, Luke Cage, Iron Fist, and Jessica Jones, to be followed by a "Defenders" miniseries, plus a planned "Guardians of the Galaxy" cartoon, all showing that Marvel might be following DC's steps by focusing on lesser known or obscure characters.

If the Netflix shows are successful, who knows what other characters could get their own shows? Here are five franchises worthy of that honor:

1. Moon Knight: Created by writer Doug Moench (more known for his legendary run on "Deadly Hands of Kung-Fu," as well as work on the Batman titles and various stories in "Creepy" and "Eerie") and artist Don Perlin, Moon Knight first made his debut in the pages of the horror-action series "Werewolf by Night," before a two issue run in "Marvel Spot-

light" and a backup feature in the "Hulk" magazine, and prior to landing his own title in 1980. Originally a mercenary name Marc Spector, the man who would be Moon Knight was left for dead in the desert when his conscience made him defy his boss, Raoul Bushman. Rescued by a cult that worshiped the Egyptian moon god of justice, Khonsu, Marc was given a second chance at life, and became Khonsu's avatar. Besides his white and silver clad antihero alter ego, Marc has two other secret identities: billionaire Steven Grant, whose moolah came from the treasures he secured in his first adventure, and cabbie Jake Locksley, which is used to gather underworld intel. In his career, Moon Knight has teamed up with the likes of Spider-Man and the Thing, and was a member of both the Defenders and the West Coast Avengers for a while. But the one thing that sets Moony apart from his fellow Marvel heroes is that his enemies tend to be more grounded in reality than most other heroes (that, and he has some questionable mental health). Yes, he has also fought supernatural creatures, robots, time travelers, and other clichés, but Moon Knight's enemies tend to be the likes of terrorists or serial killers. And with the success of "Arrow," Moon Knight could

be Marvel Entertainment's response to the DC series. Plus, he would probably be the first Jewish superhero to get his own TV series, so mazel tov, Moony!

2. Power Pack: Sort of a Beetleborgs prototype, Power Pack is unique among the family type super teams as ... they are a bunch of grade school kids. Created by writer Louise Simonson (known for her work on the X-Men spinoff titles "X-Factor" and

"The New Mutants," and for her run on "Superman: The Man of Steel," during which she co-created the character Steel) and artist June Brigman (of "Brenda Starr" fame), Power Pack are the alter egos of the Power siblings Alex, Julie, Jack, and Katie. When their parents are kidnapped by the reptilian Snarks, the kids are each granted a different power from a dying alien (sound familiar?): Gee (Alex, later Zero-G) can psychically control

gravity; Lightspeed (Julie) has super speed and flight; Mass Master (Jack) has total control over his body's molecules, being able to shrink to a six inch height or assume a cloud like form; and Energizer (Katie) can generate and project explosive energy orbs. To date, only the original 1986-1991 series and the multiple All Ages Marvel Adventures miniseries

Panic! At the Disco rolls out fourth album

Panic! At the Disco has had its many ups and downs as a band. For the past 10 years, the band has released four albums, lost band members, and managed to make it to the top of charts. Friends Ryan Ross and Spencer Smith formed the rock band from Las Vegas in 2004. Spencer Smith and Brendon Urie are the only initial band members that still remain in the band. This was the result of many band members leaving the band along with the addition of some.

The original bassist for the band, Brent Wilson, was let go in 2006. The whole thing blew up into a huge debate as to the real reason why he was kicked out. An article published on MTV News in 2006, states that Brent Wilson said he was kicked out of the band, and that the alleged claim from the band was false. The band said that they came to an agreement as a band for Wilson to leave, "It was 100 percent a surprise to me. We were about to leave for a show in California, and they called me the night before and told me I was out of the band. The only reason they gave was that it was for musical purposes." The band later went on to say that he lacked responsibility and was not progressing musically. So in 2009 when Ryan Ross and Jon Walker announced they were leaving the band it came to a big shock to some fans. Panic! At the Disco posted on their Myspace page the announcement, "Ryan Ross and Jon Walker will be leaving Panic! at the Disco to embark on a musical excursion of their own." As said on an article in Rolling Stone, the fans were not taking the news well, as some found this to be the worst news ever.

Despite the departure from former band mates, they picked up some great musicians along the way. In 2009 they welcomed Dallan Weekes as the bass guitarist and synth controller. Since the founding of the band, they have released four albums including: "A Fever You Can't Sweat Out," "Pretty. Odd.," "Vices & Virtues," and "Too Weird to Live, Too Rare to Die!," all in which have a different sound to each one.

It all started with the release of "A Fever You Can't Sweat Out," this album included the track "I Write Sins Not

Tragedies," which was and still is one of Panic! At the Disco's most memorable songs to date. The song made it to number 7 on Billboard's Hot 100. On top of that, the music video for this single won music video of year at the 2006 MTV Video Music Award. Panic! At the Disco made a strong and impactful entrance to the music business. The album was released in 2005, after getting signed by Pete Wentz, lead singer of Fall Out Boy, onto his record label Fueled By Ramen. Panic! At the Disco had a very unique sound, but they had somewhat of a resemblance to Fall Out Boy. The band created a mixture of alternative with a catchy melody. Brendon Urie, the lead singer, brings his distinctive voice to tie it all together. With such a distinct and intriguing sound, it opened the door to the forthcoming success.

Their second album, "Pretty. Odd" had a mostly positive response, making it only to 24 on Billboard Alternative Albums chart, along with making it to 25 on the Billboard Rock Albums chart. From this album came another popular song for Panic! At the Disco, "Nine In the Afternoon." This song had a Beatles essence to it, an older upbeat style. This hit made it to number 36 on the Billboard Alternative Songs chart. Following the first album this album had a change of sound. "Pretty. Odd" had a harmonic sound, along with being upbeat, lively and cheerful.

In March of 2011, Panic! At the Disco release their third album, "Vices & Virtues." This album followed the loss of two band members, Ryan Ross and Jon Walker. "Vices & Virtues" was the beginning to a new sound for the band, it steered away from the whole 70's sound that they had in the previous album. The song "The Ballad of Mona Lisa" showed their rock side, still with their unexplainable unique sound and style. Although the band was faced with troubles some times, it was for the best. It was a major turnaround for Panic! At the Disco. "Vices & Virtues" certainly gave the band inspiration for their fourth and upcoming album.

"Too Weird to Live, Too Rare to Die!" was released October 2013 as Panic! At the Disco's fourth album. The album

are the most successful and recognizable. The former in particular touched on some pretty serious topics, similar to "New Mutants," among them being bullying, gun violence, homelessness, and drugs. If "Power Pack" does get a TV show, it should have the same style as the Marvel Adventures comics, but also touch on the aforementioned topics, like "Static Shock" did, creating a well-thought balance of action and drama (though the drugs thing might be forbidden by standards and practices).

3. The New Warriors: The Marvel response to the Teen Titans, the New Warriors are essentially "Teen Avengers," as each of the original members has a tie to the much larger Marvel Universe. Created by writer Tom DeFalco and artist/plotter Ron Frenz, the New Warriors first appeared in a two-part story in "Thor" during the "Acts of Vengeance" crossover event -- where they help the Asgardian Ace fight the Juggernaut; before getting their own series in 1990, which ran for seventy five issues; followed by several revivals, the most recent one being launched this year. The initial line-up composed of the Batman-Iron Man hybrid Night Thrasher; Nova (Rich Rider, not his successor Sam Alexander) a Spider-Man-Green Lantern combo; Firestar, who is recognizable to anyone who watched "Spider-Man and his Amazing Friends;" Justice (formerly Marvel Boy) a telekinetic teen with father issues, and a friendship with The Thing from The Fantastic Four; Namorita, cousin of The Sub-Mariner; and Speedball, a Steve Ditko creation who first appeared in a Spider-Man comic (kind of fitting, really). The inaugural run was helmed by former "Psi Force" writer Fabian Nicieza and then-current "Amazing Spider-Man" artist Mark Bagley, who are arguably the definitive creative team. When Nicieza wrote the characters, they talked and acted like real people, helped by Bagley's amazing artwork. If the team makes it to the small screen, the show should try to keep the spirit of the original series, and avoid being anything like "Ultimate Spider-Man." As a bonus, the animation should be done by the same people who gave us the "W.I.T.C.H." cartoon, for a balance of both action and humor.

4. Ghost Rider: Are you really surprised he is on this list? While the Nicholas Cage movies are still a mixed bag for fans, all comic readers can agree that the skull headed antihero needs his own TV show. Interestingly enough, Ghost Rider ALMOST got his own show once, which was to be a spinoff from the 1996 Hulk cartoon on UPN (remember that channel?)

with the episode "Innocent Blood," plus an earlier cameo in "The Fantastic Four" portion of the Marvel Action Hour, serving as a backdoor pilot for the series, which sadly never materialized. If a Ghost Rider cartoon does happen, it should be targeted to a more adult audience, due to ... well, you get the idea. And for added fan pleasure, the series MUST be done in anime style, since the Japanese really know how to make great horror-action shows.

5. Spider-Girl: In 1998, Tom DeFalco and Ron Frenz did an issue of "What If?" where, in an alternate future, Spider-Man and Mary Jane's daughter (long story, it happened in "The Clone Saga") takes up dear ol' dad's mantle as Spider-Girl. This is not that character.

This Spider-Girl is Anya Corazon, formerly Araña, who gained her powers via magic and had her own short lived series under her previous alias. Following both a brief depowering and a role in a Spider-Man story arc, she now wears the black and white costume of Spider-Girl and gained Spidey's powers (plus organic webbing) during the popular "Spider Island" storyline.

With a Spider-Girl TV series, there some possibilities present. First, Anya could be the first established Hispanic-American superhero to get her own TV series. Second, it could also be a tool to dump some of the villains who really do not work in Spider-Man's rogue gallery, such as Hunger, Shathra, Morlun, and Shardac, on someone they would work for. And finally, it also enables Marvel to do a TV series featuring a female protagonist for the first time since the late-1970s. ■

One of the first 'nuclear monster' films and the very first 'big bug' horror film, "Them" surprisingly stands strong to this day.



What's worse than a sassy spirit up to no good? A spirit that happens to be your deceased first wife.

Professor James Hartman and his comedic cast present Noel Coward's farcical occult comedy "Blithe Spirit."

Tommy Patrick Ryan and Elizabeth Tumminello, who both participated in the 2013 production of "Hamlet," return to the stage as Mr. Edward Condomine and second wife Ruth, a well-to-do English couple who invite the whimsical Madame Arcati, played by Cynthia Szczesny in her break-out Schoolcraft role, to perform a séance under false pretenses.

Joined by friends Dr. and

Mrs. Bradman, brought to life by returning performers Franz Margitza and Kristen Campbell, things go quickly awry when the group accidentally summon Edward's charmingly sassy deceased first wife Elvira, inspired by Ronya Rose Mallad. Hijinks ensue as Elvira, invisible and mute to all but Edward and the audience, competes for the affections of her former husband. It is clear to all that she has not encouraged her husband to move on. Meanwhile, Elizabeth Tumminello embodies the classical English gentlewoman, and convinced of her husband's insanity, desperately tries to avoid a scandal. Plot twists abound, and the whole story hinges upon the actions of Edward, the hilarious butler played by Sean Thomas.

Many of the faces on stage will be familiar, with over half of last semester's cast returning for this production. Not to be hampered by the horrendous winter weather, cast and crew came together

to put on yet another stellar show. "This is my 66th or 67th show, and this is one of my favorites," said

Hartman. The laugh-out-loud comedy continues the swing up from the more somber and dramatic productions

of the last few semesters. The whole cast brings to life the juxtaposition of proper 1940s English demeanor fraught hidden scandal that is sure to enthrall "Downton Abbey" fans while still entertaining those uninitiated to the charms of British comedy.

While any actor can memorize lines, it's the charisma and personality present in this cast that brings the play to life, or rather, unlife. Mallad's slinky, pouty Elvira evokes an archetypal spoiled, carefree princess while it is easy to see and hear the strain in the eyes and voice of Tumminello's Ruth as her husband is quickly overcome by madness. Szczesny brings the perfect blend of ethereal kookiness to Madame Arcati, and Thomas's comically exaggerated gait in the opening seat brings sets the mood right away. Ryan's performance is so authentic, it is not hard to imagine he really does have a nagging ghost over his shoulder at all times. The veteran cast brings pulse to the dead, and Szczesny, who auditioned "almost as a fluke" brings fresh blood to what she calls a "perfectly sized" cast.

"Blithe Spirit" will be playing a dinner theater show March 21, 22, 28, and 29. Tickets are \$27, and include dinner in the Vista Tech Center at 6:30 p.m.; performance-only tickets are also available for \$15. Additional shows without dinner will be

Schoolcraft speaks out against injustice

Pageturners supports prevention of violence against women

Dr. Lisa Jackson, a psychologist, refers to domestic violence as being, "not a girl problem, or a woman problem, but a human problem."

Members of the Liberal Arts faculty partnered with Pageturners on March 13 to host another panel discussion on the issue of violence against women in the VisTaTech Center. From 10-11:20 a.m., the panel discussion consisted of three professors, the Chief of Campus Security Police, and a guest speaker.

Professor Josselyn Moore, a professor of both Sociology and Anthropology, took an anthropological approach to her explanation of violence, saying that this type of violence is not specific to our superior species; rather it is prevalent throughout the animal kingdom. Moore remarked on the similarities of certain species of ape and monkeys that tend to have similar aggression to humans. Moore also stated

that some species of monkeys are more aggressive than others, and that females in the less aggressive species of monkeys devised plans to prevent themselves from being object-ed to violence from their male counterparts.

Sociology and Anthropology Professor Karen Schaumann discussed how "sex sells" and society makes it seem wrong to speak out about situations in which individuals feel uncomfortable. Reading aloud the lyrics to Robin Thicke's hit song "Blurred Lines," she spoke of the apparent misogyny prevalent in today's media. By making women into sexual objects, it is easier to justify violence against them.

Schaumann also mentioned the epidemic of rape in the Detroit area. Thousands of women and girls would be raped on their way to school, and this type of crime would go largely unreported. Those crimes that were reported would be mismanaged. While President Obama created the White

House Task Force to Protect Students from Sexual Assault, rape kits were still not being properly processed.

Chief of Schoolcraft Campus Police Authority Steve Kaufman took the stage to explain what support systems students had access to. He spoke of the many ways to contact campus police, and in what situations it was acceptable to also contact the authorities. Kaufman stressed the need for students to have certain help lines pre-programmed into phones to avoid scrambling for numbers during an emergency.

Ms. Catherine Bunker, guest speaker and Survival Advocate for the First Step Program, followed Kaufman in her slide-show explanation of how victims of domestic violence could prevent the experience and find the path toward recovery. Bunker spoke of an importance for victims understanding of the available resources in the community that cater to people who suffer from such abuse. One such outlet would be the First Step program, for which Bunker

is a current spokesperson.

Their slogan being "Peaceful Families, Safe Communities," the First Step program has been in place to aid victims of domestic violence since 1978. In 2013, First Step helped over 6,273 clients and responded to 17,353 calls from distressed individuals. "Our mission is to eliminate both domestic and sexual violence."

Bunker illuminated the complex and twisted relationship between an abuser and their victim, detailing the dynamic of how people can be manipulated. "It's about how well they can control their victim...victims are made to believe they should be ashamed of abuse, that they will be judged by it." Bunker went on to state how the abus-

Secrets of the Quill

My English teacher asked me to write a five-paragraph essay on a topic of my choosing. Although I had no difficulty in selecting the topic, I am having a very tough time deciding which aspects of it I should write about. Do you have any suggestions as to how I can overcome this difficulty?

— Too Many Words

Dear Too Many Words,
Narrowing down a broad topic is one of the greatest challenges that a writer can face, regardless of what subject is involved! There is always much more information available than is necessary for the success of the paper, making it quite a challenge to decide what is important and what isn't. Bearing in mind a few of the following suggestions will aid you immensely in penning a paper that balances detail and relevance.

Firstly, you will have to determine which particular aspect of your general topic is the essay's focal point. You may think this sounds painfully obvious, but it is actually quite easy to forget in the complex process of re-

searching and writing. Therefore, you should always remember that defining the scope of your paper is of top priority since it prevents the cramming of too much information into too small a space—in this case, five paragraphs—which can overwhelm and frustrate many an English student! To illustrate this concept, let's suppose that you choose to write a paper about automobiles. It won't be long before you realize that this ubiquitous mode of transportation has an enormous number of facets, running the complete gamut from automotive history and engineering to design and manufacturing. Instead of trying to incorporate every single one of these elements into a single five-paragraph paper (which is, to put it bluntly, impossible), center your efforts around only one of the sub-topics. Almost instantly, your assignment will seem much more manageable since you have isolated a topic that is specific enough to research and write about efficiently.

Writing an outline will also help you to pinpoint the focus of your paper. Although the mere mention of an outline elicits groans from English students because it adds an extra step to the already difficult process of writing a paper, it actually makes your assignment much easier by establishing its

basic framework. Look at it from this perspective: if you know what you're writing about sentence-by-sentence and paragraph-by-paragraph, filling a few pages does not seem like nearly as impossible of a task! And, most importantly, it will force you to choose which aspects of the general topic will be included in your paper.

One final suggestion for narrowing down a broad subject would be relying on your own personal knowledge of it. Remember that, in this instance, you have the luxury of writing about a subject of your choice! Take advantage of this exciting opportunity by delving into a topic that you thoroughly understand and have a high degree of enthusiasm for. If you do so, the most important points will almost naturally come to mind. Just rely on your creative instincts and have fun with your assignment!

ers would create a reality that the victim feels they have to succumb to, something different than the normal boundaries of society but it would seem very real to the victims. Rapists or those that instigate abuse in a relationship are master manipulators and charmers, who mold for themselves a persona in which they are not wrong to do what they are doing

In situations where rape victims are brought into the police, the resulting interview process would be similar to interrogating criminals, and some situations can be recounted as worse than the actual experience.

The angle taken by officers during such interviews would not be whether the crime took place but rather if the evidence would lead to success in court.

At the end of the presentation, there was a question and answer portion between the panelists and attendees. The first was asked by student Dillion Ochala, who asked, "How do we go about changing society, especially in regards to victim blaming?"

Schaumann answered by saying that victim blaming is not a phenomena limited to violence and unconsented sexual acts. "Victim blaming is also attributed to the poverty-stricken. Our society tends to point fingers at their powerless, and there are institutions in place that

uphold these bullies." She suggested that the change in society must be done at an individual level for progress to be made.

Jackson interjected as well to answer this question, stating that as a society an environment must be made where men as well as women understand that rape should not occur. "Men should be taught to understand that they wouldn't want this to happen to their sister, or wife. We need to prevent social apathy."

Another point upon which Jackson spoke highly was encouraging a sexy form of consent. While she remarked that it is deemed unflattering and "uncool" to assert one's consent, saying an enthusiastic yes to sex would prevent the "blurred

lines" that prevent distinctions between rape and permission.

The Q&A took a more serious tone when the question was raised if there was a distinction between a dysfunctional household and abuse.

"Neglect is a form of child abuse," said Jackson. "The definition does not matter if it doesn't work for you. As young adults, you have the opportunity to not perpetrate these problems into your life and to take responsibility for your actions. Make it work for you."

Cleaning for your health

Spring cleaning without harsh chemicals

Spring Cleaning is a tradition that finds its origins throughout various cultures. It has been associated with various holidays and the new year of certain calendars. In the U.S. Spring Cleaning gained popularity because homes were shut up tight to keep the heat in over the long winter months. People used to use coal, oil, and wood to heat their homes and candles to provide light. Both of which created a dusty and sooty atmosphere. On the first warm and dry day of spring, all members of the household would gather together, open up the house to air it out, and do some major cleaning.

Today, people still keep their homes shut tight during the winter, although homeowners do not have the same soot and ash issues to deal with thanks to modern heating systems. New pollutants have taken their place. During the Spring Cleaning ritual, people scrub their homes from top to bottom to remove the filth and help keep their families safe. However, the chemical cleaners that most people use cause allergies, can suppress the immune system, and often do more harm than good. The good news is that natural cleaning alternatives are coming back into popularity, so they are more readily available. Plus, natural cleaning products can be homemade utilizing a few simple ingredients.

With a few basic ingredients, including white vinegar, baking soda, hydrogen peroxide, castile soap and lemons, homeowners can prepare both economical and healthier household cleaners. These few ingredients can be combined to produce many different natural cleaning recipes. Certain types of essential oils can be added as well to provide a pleasant scent and incorporate disinfectant qualities. All of these ingredients are relatively inexpensive and easy to obtain.

WHITE VINEGAR

White vinegar serves as an all-purpose cleaner and deodorizer. It can be used to clean virtually everything

in the bathroom: the toilet, tub, sink, countertops, even certain flooring. Vinegar removes soap and hard water stains, cleans and disinfects countertops, sinks, and other appliances. Mix together equal parts vinegar and water in a spray bottle to make a powerful disinfectant. Before cleaning test a small area of the surface to make sure no color change results. Be careful because undiluted vinegar could potentially eat away at tile grout over time, and vinegar is not recommended for use on wood or waxed floors as the acidity can dull the shine of these surfaces.

Don't worry about your home smelling like vinegar; the vinegar smell vanishes once the surface is dry. If a more pleasant aroma is desired essential oils can be added for their scent qualities and antibacterial/disinfecting properties as well. Popular choices include lemon, lavender, peppermint, and tea tree oil. Lavender has the added bonus of relaxing and distressing properties, peppermint naturally keeps away insects, and lemon essential oil naturally brightens, removes stains, and is excellent at cutting through grease. All of these oils feature antibacterial and antifungal properties.

CASTILE SOAP

Castile soap, another great all-purpose cleaner, is oil based soap. It is an effective degreaser and can be used all over the home. Like vinegar, castile soap can be customized with essential oils to create an amazingly scented, pet and child friendly cleaning product. Castile soap can be blended with the vinegar and water solution above to provide a more intense clean.

TEA TREE OIL

Mold and mildew can be removed by scrubbing with a simple mixture consisting of two teaspoons tea tree oil and two cups water mixed well. Pour the mixture into a spray bottle, and lightly spray the mixture on any surface with visible mold or mildew, let it sit so it can break down these substances. This mixture can also get rid of musty smells. The tea tree oil breaks down mold and mildew, instead of

merely covering the issue with a chemical smell.

BAKING SODA

Baking soda is an effective odor eliminator. Place an open box in the freezer or refrigerator to absorb food odors. Sprinkle some in the bottom of the trashcan to absorb the smells. Eliminate carpet odors by sprinkling baking soda on the carpet, letting it sit for a few hours, and then vacuuming. Baking soda also serves as a mild abrasive. It can be used to scour pots and pans, bathtubs and sinks, but is gentle enough to not scratch these surfaces. Use lemon juice and baking soda to scrub and degrease cookware. Mix water and baking soda paste to create a paste to clean the oven. Simply, sprinkle a layer of baking soda over the bottom of the oven, spray water over the baking soda, wait a couple of hours before wiping away grease stains and burnt on food.



HYDROGEN PEROXIDE

Hydrogen peroxide is a disinfectant and an effective stain remover. It can be used to disinfect household surfaces, such as kitchen counters and appliances. Use caution when applying hydrogen peroxide on wood surfaces; always test a small inconspicuous area first. Use 3% hydrogen peroxide for cleaning, a stronger mix can damage surfaces. Pour hydrogen peroxide into a spray bottle, spray

lightly on surfaces, let it set for a few minutes to activate its cleaning and disinfecting properties, and wipe away. Hydrogen peroxide is a powerful stain remover. Simply, soak the stain in hydrogen peroxide before washing. It is especially effective at dissolving blood stains because it breaks down the proteins found in blood. Add a cup of hydrogen peroxide to a load of whites to help keep them bright.

Natural, homemade cleaning mixtures are effective, inexpensive, and considerably healthier than using harsh chemical cleaners. Take a trip to the local grocery store and pick up a few basic ingredients and whip up some clean this spring.



Creating an Awareness of Violence Against Women

Creating an Awareness of Violence Against Women Domestic violence is something we hope never to encounter ourselves. Here are some startling statistics about domestic violence in Michigan: According to the Michigan Coalition Against Domestic and Sexual Violence (MCADSV), about 4 of every 10 females seen in emergency departments for injuries related to an assault were there because of intimate partner violence. According to the Uniform Crime Report program on rape victims in Michigan, the victim and offender were acquaintances in 25% of cases (MCADSV). The Michigan State Police reported 95,000 domestic violence offenses in 2011 (USA Today). However, many offenses are unreported. It is estimated that yearly, there are 22,328 domestic violence

cases handled in Michigan's prosecuting attorney offices (MCADSV). Not all victims of domestic violence live with their partners, and men are victims, too. Domestic violence also occurs in same-sex relationships. In addition to physical abuse, victims of relationship violence may be sexually abused or verbally abused. Some people are reluctant to intervene on behalf of a friend or family member. If you or someone you know is a victim of domestic abuse, please reach out for help. If you are in imminent physical danger, call 911 and try to get to safety. Otherwise, seek assistance. Schoolcraft College counselors are available to meet with you and recommend resources in the community. You may contact a counselor by calling 734-462-4429.

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
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Age appropriate college scholarship offers

Eighth grade too young for college scholarship offers

In life there are few guarantees.

During the fall of 2018, the 45th President of the United States will be almost halfway through their first term.

That is the only guarantee that can be said of the 2018 fall as of now.

On Feb. 22 of 2014, eighth grade quarterback Zadock Dinkelmann accepted a scholarship offer from Louisiana State University.

Dinkelmann would be a true freshman for the 2018 season. But there is no guarantee that he will still want to attend LSU or the coaching staff will that offered him will still be there.

Just ten years ago it was unheard of to offer an incoming junior a scholarship, but today freshman and sophomores are regularly receiving offers from Division 1 college football teams.

For instance, take current freshman quarterback Danny Clark (Massillon, OH).

Clark was offered a scholarship to Ohio State at a Buckeye practice on Dec. 13, 2013 and accepted on the spot.

FAST FORWARD

The first example of an extraordinarily young college football commitment was in 2010 when 13-year-old seventh-grade quarterback David Sills committed to the University of Southern California.

Sills, now a high school junior, remains committed to USC, but faces two chief concerns on both sides of offering a young prospect.

According to Rivals.com, Sills isn't ranked in their top 250 prospects in the class of 2015 and is listed as the 12th ranked quarterback.

Obviously Sills hasn't developed as offering head coach Lane Kiffin had thought. Kiffin is set to be the University of Alabama offensive coordinator in 2014.

If that's not bad enough from USC's perspective, Sills' could be worse.

Normally, a recruiting class only can fit one quarterback, but USC has also received a commitment from the #8 player in the '15 class, quarterback Ricky Town.

Henry steps down

Respected coach set to start new chapter in life

Randy Henry stepped down as head coach of the men's basketball team during a postseason team meeting on March 7.

"I've done all I can do in basketball and I've had a good run at it. I wanted to move on to something different," Henry said.

Henry cited his desire to devote more time to business opportunities and to his work with his Bridging Athletics and Learning Life skills (B.A.L.L.) Foundation.

The local non-profit organization, which he founded, helps metro Detroit youth develop athletic, learning, and life skills.

Henry, a former draft pick of the Detroit Pistons, runs B.A.L.L. camps around Detroit where students learn about life skills and basketball. In order to get to the basketball part of the camp, students have to go through a class portion of the camp where life lessons are taught.

"I'm looking to increase my B.A.L.L. foundation. It's different than most camps. You go to class from 9:00 to 11:30. Anything from conflict resolution, anger management, banking, nutrition," Henry said. "From 12:30 to 3:30 you can do basketball or volleyball. The educational piece is the front-end, the most important. If you miss the morning, you might as well go home. That's not going to

happen."

Athletic Director Sid Fox announced Henry's resignation in an email on March 7.

"He is a charismatic coach who always took pride in representing the college and did so with class," Fox said.

Regardless of the outcome, Henry's teams handled themselves with class and sportsmanship.

In addition to Henry's class, he put academics at the top of the pyramid of his coaching philosophies.

"The academic progress of his student-athletes always came first. He was a consistent supporter and advocate of our Student-Athlete Support System, which provides academic support for all of our student-athletes," Fox said.

With Fox's support, Henry built a program where student-athletes either achieved or didn't get to suit up on game night.

"He [Fox] and I had a commitment that we were trying to graduate kids, we were get kids into a better place in life," Henry said. "I was more excited at graduation than when we got a big win."

Henry compiled a 68-134 record in seven seasons at the helm of Schoolcraft basketball. ■

TOP 5 OPTIONS (IF AVAILABLE)

5. Marqise Lee (WR, USC) 6'0 190 lbs - It was painfully evident at times during the past season how desperately the Lions need another wide receiver to complement Calvin Johnson. Nate Burleson's best days are obviously behind him and he has been released. Ryan Broyles hasn't been able to stay on the field since donning the Honolulu blue and silver. In order to prevent defenses from smothering Megatron, Detroit desperately needs another burner, and Lee has the speed to be just that.


4. C.J. Mosley (OLB, Alabama) 6'2 232 lbs- One of the most athletically gifted prospects in this year's class, with great instincts and motor to match. Although a bit undersized for the position, Mosley is excellent in both run support and pass coverage. He is a playmaker through and through. Injuries present another red flag here, unfortu-

nately. It also doesn't hurt that he comes from a successful college program like Alabama.

3. Justin Gilbert (CB, Oklahoma State) 6'0 202 lbs - Defensive back has been a spot of bother for Detroit for years now, especially outside, and a portion of Lions faithful are hoping to land the next Richard Sherman-esque lockdown corner. Gilbert has phenomenal speed to stay with any NFL receiver, but he lacks the physicality of a Sherman type and has also had some off-the-field problems. You know what they say, though, you can't coach speed.

Falling short

Men's Basketball struggled to utilize plethora of talent

The 2013-14 Men's basketball season came to an abrupt end on March 4 in the opening round of the NJCAA District 10 tournament in a loss to fifth-ranked Mott CC. Schoolcraft (14-15, 7-11 conf.) fell victim to a 105-55 drubbing, putting an emphatic stamp on the team's sixth losing record in the last seven seasons.

"It was disappointing we didn't achieve what we could have. But we had great talent," Head Coach Randy Henry said.

It was a disappointing end to a subpar season, one which saw a fairly promising start give way to a lackluster finish.

The Ocelot's opened with wins in ten of their first fourteen contests, questing for the MCCA crown that has eluded them since 2006.

The team's winning ways proved short-lived, however, as Schoolcraft went on to drop nine of their next twelve and

fall out of championship contention.

"That [getting away from good start] is the biggest question I have now. We thought we were on to something. The Muskegon Tournament we won both games by two points each. I thought we knew how to close games," Henry said.

Turnovers and poor shooting made it tough for Schoolcraft to get on any kind of roll all season.

"Poor shooting hurt us more than anything else. We shot a very low percentage. Turnovers were massive. We had as high as 38 in a game," Henry added.

If a win over Kirtland in the final home game provided any postseason momentum for the Ocelot's, it was quickly tempered, as they proceeded to lose the season's remaining two contests by a combined margin of 86 points.

While the '13-14 season was likely not the product that Henry had envisioned,

record-wise at least, there was still plenty to like about his players' performance throughout.

Schoolcraft finished the season averaging over 72 points per game, shooting just under 43% from the floor as a team.

Standout sophomore forward Terrence Coles led the offensive charge, racking up 17 points per game while converting on just over half of his attempts.

Other Sophomores Andrew Mapley, Joshua Campbell, and Terrell Sewell each averaged double-digit points themselves, helping provide Schoolcraft with an exceptionally efficient front-court offense.

Problems on the opposite end of the court were too

"We got down by too much in the first half and ran out of energy to continue our run we had going in the second half," Kinzer said.

LESSONS LEARNED

Momentum was a hard thing to come by all season for the Ocelots. Seemingly each time an element of the game went right, whether it was by way of big win or huge play, Schoolcraft had difficulties maintaining it.

"I think one of our biggest struggles

was being consistent in our play," Kinzer said.

"We would play great for 3 minutes of a game and then lose focus for 2 minutes, give up too many points or make too many turnovers."

Contributing to the lack of consistency was the compilation of self-inflicted focus gaffes.

"In a lot of our games we beat ourselves because of loss of focus throughout a game," Kinzer said.

Despite Schoolcraft's struggles their record indicated, they always kept one thing constant: work ethic.

"Work ethic is something you can't teach. I never saw them give up in a game they fought till the end," Kinzer said.

"Players stepped up in situations when I asked them to play a role they may not have done before. Our team was full of hard workers and that is what kept us going each day."

Successful Season
In Kinzer's eyes, the Ocelots season was successful even though they finished seven games below .500 and lost in the opening round of the playoffs.

"I believe we had a successful season. We finished with a record 7-11 in the league and made it to first round of playoffs."

At times success was seemingly miles away to the average onlooker, but Kinzer was proud of her team's ability to hang tough in the majority of games throughout the season.

Sticking with, but not always coming out with a victory against quality opponents is a trait of young teams like Schoolcraft.

"We were competitive with each team we played, we beat everybody on our regular season schedule at least once besides three teams in the league," Kinzer said.

Youth was an obstacle, but proved not to be a barrier for success.

Sara Gammons and Chelsea Wesley were in charge of steering the team, being two of the most consistent guards for Schoolcraft during the season.

The downfall was that they were both freshman. Both played extremely tough and smart, game in and game out making the Schoolcraft backcourt something that could create fear for MCCA opponents next season with both returning.

"Sara and Chelsea were key this season being freshmen, I think they both learned a lot and received a lot of experience. I will be looking for both of them to lead the incoming freshman that will be joining the team [next season]," Kinzer said.

With the return of Gammons and Wesley, the 2014-15 Ocelots should, at minimum, be in the running for strongest backcourt in the MCCA.

With each having a year under their belts by playing significant amounts as freshman, Gammons and Wesley's confidence should be sky-high next season.

"We are looking for Sara to lead again next season at the point guard position. Sara had so much game experience this season that I hope she will learn from and carry those experiences onto next season. I believe Sara can be one of the best point guards in the league," Kinzer said.

"Chelsea was one of our hardest workers this season. She has a killer mid-range jumper that she needs to look for more," Kinzer said.

GREAT GROUP

For Kinzer's first season, enjoyment came from a game-to-

game standpoint of watching development of players individually and the collectiveness of the team.

"Each one of our players improved on the court, whether it be basketball IQ wise or basketball fundamentals."

Indicating Schoolcraft's all-around success was their ability for each player to stay academically eligible for all 29 games.

One area of improvement that Kinzer was satisfied with was the capability to play multiple defenses and switch at any given time.

"Throughout the season we really improved on our defense, we were able to switch from defending man to man to zone or full court press."

Kinzer took a liking to the group of student-athletes that made up her first Schoolcraft team.

"I could not imagine a better group of kids on my team; I appreciate all the hard work that they put into the team and the commitment they made to the team." ■

much to overcome, however, as defensive breakdowns often led to lopsided defeats. Schoolcraft conceded over 100 points five different times throughout the season, including twice to Mott and Oakland.

Henry attributed some of his team's struggles to a mentality that team could turn it on during the bright lights of game night, when in fact that wasn't the case at all.

"The worse type of team you can be is a faucet team, turn it on, turn it off. If you're like that, the faucet has to always be on I felt that that happened to us a lot," Henry said. "We felt that at any second we could turn it on and make it happen. Once we started missing, we started pointing fingers and the cohesiveness went away."

Despite a solid offense in addition to better-than-average rebounding, the team often-times struggled to keep pace with some of the conference's offensive juggernauts, leading to insurmountable deficits.

Though the struggles endured this year were no doubt painful, next year's unit could reap the benefits of experience, as Schoolcraft plans to return roughly three-quarters of the team.

As yet another Schoolcraft basketball season concludes, so must the man leading the charge.

New rule needed

All of these kids getting offers before they are eligible for a driver's license drives the need for a new NCAA rule.

All college football programs big and small should have to follow a new NCAA rule about when they are allowed to offer a player a scholarship.

The rule should mandate that a college not

even be in any kind of contact with a recruit until July 1 of the summer going into their junior year. By then, they have matured and are able to think more like they will as a college student than they would in early high school.

This rule would eliminate the issues of a player like Sills earning an offer, yet being the essential second choice by the time they are ready to sign their National Letter of Intent.

March 31 of an athlete's junior year could be a day they could look forward to and train for their whole lives.

By March 31, the player would have taken his A.C.T. test and the current class of players would have already signed their NLI's.

The way the scholarship system is currently set up; there is no limit on when a player can be offered a scholarship to a university. This causes a ruthless recruiting war among college football powers into younger and younger kids. ■

Other members contributing to the team Academic All-American honors were Ethan Levack, Caton Hacker, and Jimmy Parks. ■

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







