Greater Possibilities

Jeffress Center demonstrates college commitment to expanding services

What was once a vision is now a reality. After a year of renovations, remodeling and relocation of many of the campus' business departments, the Jeffress Center is officially open. Located on the north side of campus on the corner of Seven Mile and Haggerty, the 110,000 sq. ft. facility is home to the campuses new flagship partnership, SC to U, as well as many of the campuses business and administrative offices.

A perfect name

At a Board of Trustees meeting in January 2014, the Schoolcraft Board of Trustees unanimously voted on a name for the new building. After 14 years of presidency and over 32 years of serving the Schoolcraft community, the structure was appropriately named after current President Dr. Conway A. Jeffress.

"I made the motion to name the building the Jeffress Center in honor of Schoolcraft's fourth president, Dr. Conway A. Jeffress," said Schoolcraft College Board Secretary James Fausone. "We have the opportunity to create a new name and brand for the building."

Under Jeffress' leadership, the college has seen several improvements including the renovation of the new building, creation the Public Safety Training Complex in 2013, construction the Biomedical Technology Center in 2008, remodel of the Bradner Library in 2005 and open the VisTaTech Center in September 2003. All of this has been done while keeping the college financially stable and maintaining an affordable tuition.

"I am excited about the opening of the Jeffress Center because it permits many other changes to occur on campus. Among the departments that have moved into the building is the Continuing Education and Professional Development Center. This allowed the demolition of the old structure and the creation of parking for students using the campus bookstore," said Jeffress. "There are many new services being offered supporting our students.

The Answer Center, the Veterans' Center, the restructured Women's Center and the Testing Center have all been made possible by our investment in this facility and the utilization of space on campus."

There are three separate wings labeled A, B and C that make up the building. The A wing is closest to the corner of Seven Mile and Haggerty and holds Schoolcraft's human resources. The B wing is the home of Wayne State University (WSU) and the C wing is University of Toledo (UT).

Many administrative and business offices have relocated to the Jeffress Center including the President's Office, Vice President and CFO, Marketing and Communications, Schoolcraft College Foundation, Business Development Center, Financial and Business Services, Risk Management, Campus Police Authority, Payroll, Facilities Management, Construction and Design and Finance and Purchasing. Ebola

The deadly Ebola Virus Disease (EVD) is breaking out primarily in villages of Central and West Africa, but is spreading geographically and has taken thousands of lives.

According to CNN on Sept. 5, there had been over 4,100 reported human cases and over 2,400 deaths since the discovery of the most recent breakout. The overall fatality rate is 53% according to the World Health Organization on Sept. 5.

The disease is transmitted from wild animals to humans, then from human-to-human. It is only moderately contagious because it cannot be transported through air, but it is extremely contagious. There is currently no vaccine or licensed specific treatment for infected patients.

ISIS

Islamic State in Iraq and Syria (ISIS) aims to create an Islamic state spreading across Sunni areas of Iraq and in Syria. The group is well-funded, well-armed, organized and brutal to those who oppose

Members include Sunnis dissatisfied by the Shia controlled government in Iraq, former soldiers of Saddam Hussein and sympathetic recruits from Europe and the

Thus far, the group has seized Mosul, which is Iraq's second largest city, and other cities controlling hundreds of square miles enforcing Sharia law. Sharia law states that schools must separate boys from girls, fast during Ramadan, not listen to music and women must wear full veils in public. ISIS tends to allow brutal justice as well, such as public executions. ISIS ignores international borders, having influence from Syria's Mediterranean coast to south Baghdad.

ISIS obtains money mainly through abducting western journalists and demanding high ransoms for themsome have been beheaded. The money helps finance a growth of suicide attacks and assassinations that diminish the political environment, the recruitment of Sunni tribal fighters and prison raids that release hundreds of fighters. ISIS attacks police patrols and kills political officials. The current 39 year-old leader, Abu Bakr al Baghdadi, plans to have larger-scaled attacks in the future.

To gain favor of the citizens, ISIS gives food and fuel to the less fortunate and organizes welfare programs, clinics recreational activities for children.

Community at Culinary Extravaganza supports culinary program

"The Extravaganza brings together students, professionals and the Southeastern Michigan community for a delightful afternoon of the finest culinary delicacies," said Beth Kohler, Director of Development for the Schoolcraft College Foundation. "In the past there have been a wide variety of samples to eat including seafood, sweets and many regional wines."

"[Attendees] will get exposed to a lot of restaurants in one place," said Gabriel. "We're going to have some of the best chefs in the area setting up tables and cooking. A lot of them are Schoolcraft alumni promoting their own restaurants, so the event is beneficial to everyone."

The Extravaganza will feature a "Tailgate Room" where guests can take in a live broadcast of that Sunday's Detroit Lions game and finals of the Ryder Cup golf tournament. There will also be a silent auction offering participants the opportunity to win exciting prizes such as gourmet dinner reservations and gift baskets filled with culinary goodies.

But the event is not just about sampling some of the delicious food that Metro Detroit has to offer—it is also about supporting a worthy cause. The majority of the event's proceeds go towards the College's culinary program, helping to pay for new cooking equipment, provide scholarships and offer new baccalaureate degrees for culinary students.

"The Extravaganza is a tremendous help to the culinary program," said Gabriel. "It helps us provide more students with financial assistance towards completing their degrees."

A symbiotic relationship for the culinary program and local restaurants is offered through the Extravaganza.

"Not only is [the Extravaganza] a wonderful opportu-

Opportunities Knock

Schoolcraft introduces new credit programs

While the convenient cost and location of Schoolcraft has attracted people from all over metro Detroit since 1961, aspiring students of all ages now have even more reasons to come. There has been a continual push towards more degree offerings throughout the years, and now students can enroll in certificate, associate and eventually a bachelor degree program in fall 2015.

elor degree program in fall 2015. With the launch of the Schoolcraft to U program, which links the college to the University of Toledo and Wayne State University, three new credit programs are now offered, including a skills certificate in plastic technology, a degree in education and credit courses in English as a Second Language.

Skills in high demand

The Plastic Technology Skills Certificate, a 16 credit hour program that generally takes two semesters to complete, exposes students to plastic materials, processes, safety, equipment and quality systems.

"Employers helped us design this program. We have been working hand-in-hand with them for over two years now developing this. They are a key component, in fact that's where we got our two teachers," said Gene Keyes, Schoolcraft's Head of Manufacturing. "I've learned a lot just working with these guys. These teachers know and are passionate about plastics. They know it inside and out, which is an eye-opener for me."

Today's plastic professionals must be able to think critically, solve problems and have thorough understanding of the technology used to produce products efficiently and with the highest quality, as well as know the fundamentals of production. This certificate trains new students for a higher skilled technician job in plastics, such as someone that sets up and troubleshoots machines, and also gives background in manufacturing and material science.

"There are a lot of jobs available in the plastics industry right

now and not enough people to fill them. There is a lot of potential for any student that wants to take the curriculum," said Armando Sardanopoli, plastics instructor. "It is a new program right now, but we plan to build it into a two-year transfer program also."

Educating future leaders

The Associate Degree for Education program, which is approximately 60 credit hours over two years, allows future teachers two options for obtaining the knowledge, skills and credentials they need to pursue a career in elementary or secondary education. Schoolcraft students can receive an associate in arts degree or an associate in science degree. These programs provide the basic general education courses at the freshman and sophomore level to transfer to a Bachelor program at specific institutions to qualify for teacher certification.

"We've had teacher education courses here [at Schoolcraft] for

a number of years where stupull-dents could come take a couple courses and then transfer, but what we wanted to do was, for students who were interested in someday becoming teachers, to have a program here where they could come and take a group of courses and transfer that to a four-year college and save quite a bit of time and money," said Dennis Genig, Schoolcraft's Director of Special Projects.

Not only can one achieve their associates, but after taking five select classes and completing a few basic requirements, one transferring to a university gets the designation as teacher education on their transcript.

International opportunities

Students from around the globe have the opportunity to develop strong communications skills in the English language, such as speaking, listening, reading and writing through the

Schoolcraft College is thrilled to announce another innovative program launching in September. Language Fellows has been created to benefit the expanding English as a Second Language (ESL) population. The Schoolcraft College Foundation made this possible by providing a generous grant.

Working in conjunction with the Writing Fellows, The Language Fellows' focus is entirely on Schoolcraft's English language learners. Dr. Deborah Daiek, Associate Dean of Learning Support Services, recognized the demand for the program after watching the population steadily grow over the past several years. Schoolcraft students represent all corners of the world, from Jordan to Japan, Afghanistan to India. The college is nothing less than a vibrant sea of multilingual and multicultural scholars.

The program offers a number of valuable services, including peer review, tutoring, computer lab assistance and classroom workshops designed to engage students in writing, grammar and punctuation. The Language Fellows also host bi-weekly group discussions, providing language learners the opportunity to converse on relevant topics.

These discussions focus on real world applications, such as ordering the linguine with clams from a hot new Italian bistro or debating with friends and family over why "The Big Bang Theory" is the best show on television.

Yes! The Language Fellows really do make learning grammar and punctuation entertaining and enjoyable. And Professor Niran Kheder, coordinator for both the Writing Fellows and the Language Fellows, has been dazzling students for decades with her engaging methods of instruction and her commitment to education. As the philosopher Nietzsche said, "Nothing succeeds in which high spirits play no part."

Brianne Radke, a graduate of Schoolcraft College, is currently pursuing a BS in Language, Literature and Writing with a minor in Psychology at Eastern Michigan University. She was delighted to return to Schoolcraft's Learning Assistance Center to help create the Language Fellows program.

When asked about the opportunity to work with Schoolcraft's language learners, Radke said, "Although the Writing Fellows have historically extended support to the ESL population, the introduction of this supplemental program will offer scaffolding specific to the needs of lan-



This newest branch of Learning Support Services is a much needed development, especially as the College's ESL curriculum has expanded."

in the unique position to meet the needs of international students in a way that far surpasses other options available to them. er amenities include a student lounge, faculty offices, study booths, numerous conference rooms and a boardroom for holding meetings.

"There are certain activities that are revenue generating. Two universities, Wayne State University and the University of Toledo, will occupy space. Additionally, we plan to open a Data Center, which will be advantageous for commercial enterprises to make use of both the space and power we have, which is now in abundance in the Center," said Jeffress. "The revenue created does not necessarily permit us to purchase new buildings, or anything that spectacular, but it does help to balance the budget and keep costs down and expand services."

Study rooms for student use, equipped with dry erase boards, are available for students enrolled in the partnership. UT even has large monitors with Internet access for videoconferences, which connect students back to the main campus located in Toledo and

for other counseling purposes.

Convenient education

The Jeffress Center does not only benefit Schoolcraft itself, but is a huge advantage for students wanting to transfer to a four-year college. While completing an associate's degree at Schoolcraft, students now have the opportunity to simultaneously achieve a bachelor's and/or master's degree from WSU or UT. Classes are available on Schoolcraft's main campus and taught by WSU and UT professors.

"I think the building itself gives University of Toledo an opportunity to work with those Schoolcraft students that are looking for any of the four degree choices that we have. That way they can stay on a familiar campus and won't have to worry about traveling back and forth to Toledo. It's a great option for students to stay close to home," said UT Enrollment Services Specialist Joe Guziolek.

Programs offered through the partnership are priced at

WSU or UT prices, and financial aid and scholarships are available. Word-of-mouth has been the primary marketing strategy used to educate the public about the agreement, but Jeffress said that banners and radio broadcastings will help spread the word in the fall semester.

"It's going to bring more students to Schoolcraft. I'm pursuing the Wayne State portion of the SC to U partnership and I get to use my Schoolcraft tuition rates and apply more of my business classes towards my degree from Wayne State," said Schoolcraft business major Ryan Lamont. "I only have to take [some of] their classes to get my bachelors over there. I can take more classes here with Schoolcraft rates than I can at Wayne State paying thousands of dollars."

Schoolcraft's continual emphasis on providing the highest quality educational opportunities to its students is evident with the addition of the Jeffress Center. Its integration into the campus expansion and development promises positive results in the future.

new English as a Second Language (ESL) courses at Schoolcraft.

"Part of the ESL program is not just teaching them the English language, but also helping them acclimate to the American culture," said Genig, who is in charge of ESL as well as the teacher education program. "We have a lot of other things in addition that we want to built into the program, like getting students comfortable with being in America, learning with Americans and living with other nationalities."

There are 13 courses and four levels available to prepare students for further education

opportunities or to enhance professional career goals. Upon entry of the program, students are tested on the basic English skills and placed into a level. A student with little to no understanding of English can take a level a semester and finish the entire program in two years, while others can take the last few courses in a semester to brush up their English skills.

There is a place for everyone at Schoolcraft, and this is only the beginning of the progress the college is making. In future years, community members can expect even more programs and course offerings to develop for students of all demographics.



Aside from counselors, people need to remember that professors are friends, not enemies. For every class, one should take time to introduce themself, ask questions and visit during office hours to be



"Growing up, my parents always said take care of your family," Stoddard said.



Skating on Thin Ice

Why the hidden gem of Detroit sports is in danger of relocating

Detroit sports have a lengthy history of winning traditions and building championship caliber teams. From the Red Wings being in the playoffs 23 straight years to the Tigers resurgence as one of Major League Baseball's biggest contenders, Detroit dominates in practically every sport. However, there is one team that is a dark horse when it comes to Detroit sports; the Plymouth Whalers.

The Plymouth Whalers have silently been one of the best teams in their league over the last 25 years. Since their incorporation into the Ontario Hockey League in 1989, the franchise has only missed the playoffs once, which was during their inaugural season. Since then, the Whalers have reached the playoffs for 23 consecutive years (a league record), appeared in the finals four times and won two league championships (1995 and 2007).

At the end of the 2013-14 season, rumors began circling that team owner Peter Karmanos was talking to investors who wanted to buy the franchise and move it to Hamilton, ON. The reason behind the possible sale and relocation was due to a lack of attendance. The team lacked a full capacity crowd for the majority of the season and seemed to struggle to draw the much-needed attention of the highly saturated Detroit sports market.

The conditions are right to sell the team, but many devoted fans would be heartbroken if their favorite players moved to Canada and no longer wore the blue and green sweaters. The fact that the Whalers are in talks of being sold raises a question.

Why would a successful franchise like this not flourish in such a hockey crazy community like metro Detroit?

It is understood that the team competes in a predominately Red Wings market and that alone takes a significant amount of the potential fan base, but it is sad that such a illustrious franchise could possibly be taken away from this area because of lack of attendance.

Sports fans are more concerned about the professional sporting events that take place at the same time the Whalers are playing, which is understandable, but even during the NHL lockouts of 2005 and 2012, the blue seats that surround the ice at Compuware Arena were not all occupied.

There is no reason why a team that has won over 60 percent of its games during its history should not be selling out a 4,500 seat arena in a community where hockey is almost like a second religion to many.

Part of the blame for the poor attendance goes to owner Peter Karmanos Jr, who also owns the Carolina Hurricanes of the NHL, the Florida Everblades of the ECHL and the Compuware Youth Hockey organization. However, his interest in the Whalers team has appeared to dwindle over the past few years because he does not provide the proper budget to effectively promote the franchise. Besides a few radio advertisements, the only other marketing tool that he has is word-of-mouth.

If Karmanos provided the necessary money to increase the marketing budget, a whole new realm of potential fans would be informed of the incredible franchise that is currently hidden in the shadows of Detroit sports. The seats would be full of screaming and cheering fans, and it would not be surprising to see Karmanos's eyes light up and his thoughts of selling the team to diminish.

The tunnel vision that Karmanos has from running this organization from a financial standpoint is obscuring the potential that it has, and is preventing it from growing into a thriving franchise.



Obama Deserves Foreign Policy Praise

President has kept cool throughout his term



"Thanks, Obama" has been a popular and funny phrase during President Barack Obama's first and second terms in office. Memes and pictures have surfaced all over the internet, sarcastically commemorating Obama for everything from joblessness to their morning toast being burned.

According to the polls across the political spectrum, Obama is struggling with low approval ratings in both domestic and foreign policy. The Marist College Institute for Public Opinion revealed that 61 percent of Americans disapprove of Obama's handling of foreign affairs, which is surprising.

Europe.

Although Obama has received criticism for being "soft" in foreign policy, he has actually kept America's peaceful interests in mind by not starting any useless wars. Thanks Obama for keeping America influential without pulling out the big guns.



Making the Grade

Eighty-five year old life-long learner set to fulfill educational goal

With only four classes to go to complete her associates and a 3.77 GPA, Westland resident Violet Janowski fell and broke her hip in her kitchen last fall and had to accept a zero. She is

currently 85 years old, has no intentions of giving up on her degree and plans to complete her associate of art in May 2015 at the age of 86.

"At her age, to do that, it's amazing," said her 62-year-old son, Ronald Janowski.

He went on to say that after the unlucky tumble his mother took a sociology class in the spring semester with Professor Karen Schaumann-Beltran. Due to the inury, his brother and he had to switch off driving Violet Janowski to class and helping

her with her walker.

"Violet is a joy to have in class. She comes to class prepared, and is a dedicated student. She is open to learning new things and applies what she is learning to the real world," said Professor Schaumann-Beltran.

Although Violet Janowski had not gone to school since her high school graduation in 1947, she began her college education 58 years later at Schoolcraft in 2005 after her husband passed away.

"I always wanted to go back, but wasn't able to," said Violet Janowski.

"The three of us [her sons] thought it was fantastic for her to go back to school. We are extremely proud," said Ronald Janowski. "She is not one to sit around."

Violet Janowski is now up and getting around well after months of resting. She read 16 books from the end of her spring class to the beginning of the fall

"Stay in school, and even though it's hard and you don't like it. You have to make up your mind because you have to think about what is going to happen later in life. If you don't have any kind of training or any kind of education, you're not going to make it in today's world. You got to keep up in this world," said Violet Janowski. "There's no sense getting stressed about it [homework]; you just have to do it. And if you don't understand it, go get help,"

Violet Janowski likes to study at night and on weekends, and her favorite classes are history related. If she takes 2 more psychology courses, she will also earn a psychology degree.

Violet Janowski regularly goes to the Radcliff Center in Garden City for help, and will take her last math course there this fall semester. She will complete her final class in the winter term to complete her Schoolcraft education.

"For my own sake, I want to graduate. I can say that I got my degree after all these years—that I made it. It would be easy to quit and forget about it, but that's not going to way with me," said Violet Janowski.

After earning her associate degree, Violet Janowski plans to volunteer in Livonia schools to help first and second graders learn to read.

"I just thought that I wanted to use my associate degree somewhere where it will be benefitting to other people," said Violet Janowski.

She also hopes to get back to mowing her own lawn and planting flowers in the near future as her hip heals and gains strength. Violet Janowski may also run for city council in Westland, as she tried to in the past, but missed a deadline.

While her educational journey was challenging, Violet Janowski has enjoyed attending Schoolcraft for the past nine years. Young or old, never let miniscule obstacles prevent dreams from coming true.

She said, "[It is important to attend] because of the cross-cultural aspects to them, and a fair amount of what we do in Anthropology shows up in Pageturners. It is one application of it and tests our ability to look at different cultures."

For the fall semester, "Chicken with Plums" by Marjane Satrapi, "The Sorrows of Young Werther" by Johann Wolfgang von Goerthe and "A Thousand Letters Home" by Teresa K. Irish are being discussed. All books are available for purchase at the Schoolcraft Book-

"Initially, the book club was

supported by the Women's Resource Center, library and the English Department. One book a year was dedicated to the national Phi Theta Kappa (PTK) honors topic, and the rest of the suggestions came from faculty, staff and Pageturners participants," said Professor Elzbieta Rybicka, who is the Pageturners Book Club Coordinator. "PTK students were trained to facilitate discussion groups and faculty and staff served on the Steering Committee."

Since then, Pageturners has implemented a wider focus and evolved into more than just a book club. "Today we share our love of reading through public programs such as discussions, author readings and signing events, panel discussions, film presentations, traveling presentations and other special events," said Rybicka.

Not only can one meet new people, get involved on campus and enhance their reading and comprehension skills by participating in discussions, Schoolcraft students can also submit an essay or piece of art for the chance to win one of two \$150 awards.

Schoolcraft student Jennifer Engels said, "I think it's extremely important to get


involved on campus. It looks really good on a college application. Besides looking really good, it helps you get more community spirit, it helps with your fellow students and faculty and it gets you more involved with the school."

Those interested in submitting a project for the awards must be enrolled at Schoolcraft for the fall and/or winter semester, attend at least one Pageturners book discussion and submit an application with either a creative essay or art piece inspired by a Pageturners book by March 16. All artwork and writing must be original, and the student's signature on the application is an acknowledgment of the originality of the work.

"This award has been created to motivate the students to read, be inspired and create back," said Rybicka.

A creative essay should be approximately 2,000 words or less, and a book review or summary will not be considered a valid entry. All artwork entries must be a drawing, painting, sculpture, collage, diorama or woodcuts. Video art, film, jewelry and photography are not considered valid submissions.

Supported by a grant from the Schoolcraft College Foun-



dation, Pageturners welcomes the community to join in on lively discussions and special events.

"If you join Pageturners Book Club, we will encourage you to read more, tempt you to explore outside genres you normally read and provide opportunities to make new friends," said Rybicka. "Together we will learn about

different cultures not only by reading books but also through sharing our different backgrounds and viewpoints."

Dear Writing Fellows, Whether we make references to words, time, or money, how much is enough?

-Trying to Make a **Difference**

Dear Trying to Make a Difference,

One of the most complex and controversial arguments for society is the concept of charity. When one agrees to live in a community, they make a contract with that community: Not only following its laws but also contributing to the expenses in order to maintain that community. Whether they go to repaving a road or a playground, taxes are a governmentally-enforced and generally understood outlet for sharing the wealth in a community. But the concept of charity is a less clear method of sharing the wealth, and because it is at its definition an optional display of financial affection, it is the easiest to ignore. While charity is understood to be an incredibly unselfish experience, naturally, there are debates as to how to classify a charitable individual. As with most interactions involving money, the question follows: How much is enough?

While we struggle with this demand, it is possible to consider scenarios that call for

charitable acts. If a homeless person asks for a quarter, am I obliged to give it? We are both members of the same society. Do I have an obligation to fulfill that request? What difference would one-fourth of a dollar make in their lives? Would it perhaps be better, instead of providing temporary relief for someone, to find a way for them to independently sustain themselves? If I give, how much is enough?

There are charities that specialize in exactly this kind of humanitarian pursuit. This kindness is to the Giving Keys, "The key to growing leaps and crossing over boundaries of social status and prejudice and complacency and narcissism." The company's main product is the refurbished keys, which may be engraved with any inspirational word the consumer chooses. According to the company, the keys are representative of those at the fringes of society, "that in a way we are all like these keys - unique, flawed, scarred, and at risk of being discarded." The money generated from the sale of the keys allows the organization to survive and retain employment to continue their charitable work. The goal is to take their employees and eventually move them into permanent housing. The organization is geared towards individuals looking to take responsibility for their present circumstances who demonstrate a sincere desire to change their lives.

The goal of the keys is to meet someone who you find is in need of the word on your key, whether it is kindness, love, hope, courage, fight, strength, or peace and to pay it forward in the form of the key. This key is representative of the charity that comes not simply from monetary donation but instead from truly caring about other people and giving them a piece of yourself.

An important aspect of this charity, and all successful organizations, is the concept of rehabilitation. The philosophy of the company, that takes used and discarded materials to create jewelry, is to rejuvenate the lives of those who work there.

There is a long-standing proverb about this principal. "Give a man a fish, and you feed him for a day; teach him how to fish, and you feed him for a lifetime." The purpose of certain charitable organizations is to take an individual suffering from poverty or homelessness and instruct them on how to navigate the turbulent waters of the job market. The goal is to take employees and eventually move them into permanent housing. The organization is geared towards individuals looking to take responsibility for their present circumstances who demonstrate a sincere desire to change their lives. The money generated from the sale of the keys allows the organization to survive and

retain employment to continue their charitable work.

In the words of philosopher Peter Singer, "What do I owe to strangers? What do I owe to my family? What is it to live a good life? Those are questions which we face as individuals." These ethical conditions provide interesting takes on social obligation or the responsibility of members in a community to one another. As we struggle with these moral questions, it is better to understand for what purpose money or time should be given and see a return on that investment. There are such organizations designed for such a return, and besides contributing to them in order to keep them alive in their communities, it is up to us to get the word out. Bringing attention to what and where charities are is nearly as important as contributing to them. Even if fads seem self-indulgent, they encourage participation and bring awareness to those willing to contribute. The concept of paying

it forward is one wildly popularized for its simplicity, which easily becomes infectious. There are foundations, charity events, and various food drives devoted to this concept. People have taken time out of their lives to spread kindness and document the experience, as its expression is not obligatory and is easier to duplicate. The answer to how much is enough also lies within the answer of what one is willing to give. In the words of Giving Key founder Caitlin Crosby, "Keep your eyes open to all the needs you see around you... there are locks all around you and maybe you hold the key to someone else's freedom."




Chicken with Plums

From quarterback to country star

Sam Hunt burns through music charts

Everyone's latest obsession in country music is the handsome singer-songwriter Sam Hunt. Besides the fact that he was brought to fame by his hit song "Leave the Night On," there is more to his journey to fame than most people

Hunt played college football for Middle Tennessee State University in 2004 and University of Alabama at Birmingham in 2006 and 2007. He became a free agent for the Kansas City Chiefs after graduating, which led to him relocating to Nashville after failing to land a job in professional football, kicking off his musical career.

Before Hunt started releasing his own music, he was a very successful songwriter. Hunt co-wrote "Cop Car" by Keith Urban, which reached No. 4 on Billboard Hot Country Songs and No. 8

on Billboard Country Airplay, "We Are Tonight" by Billy Currington, which reached No. 1 on the Billboard Country Airplay and No. 12 on Billboard Hot Country Songs, and "Come Over" by Kenny Chesney, which reached No. 23 on Billboard Hot 100 and No. 1 on Billboard Hot Country Songs. Hunt co-wrote "Come Over" with Shane McAnally and Josh Osborne, which led to him to receiving an award by the ASCAP (The American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers).

In a CMT News article published Aug. 22, 2012 by Edward Morris stated that at an ASCAP event hosted by Ryan Beuschel, he announced to the crowd that "Come Over" was Osborne's and Hunt's first No. 1 single, McAnally's third and Chesney's 22nd as an artist.

Shortly after receiving the award, Hunt released his first debut single "Raised On It" independently under one of Nashville's most successful independent publishing companies, Combustion Music. In January, Hunt signed with MCA Nashville, and "Raised On It" was also re-released under his new label. The song was available for purchase on iTunes Aug. 11.

Although it was not the first release under the label MCA Nashville, "Leave the Night On" was his first song released in June 2014, followed by a music video on VEVO released in July. At the height of his success and attention, he released his first EP on Aug. 12 titled "X2C."

The EP allows fans to get a glimpse of what is to come from the artist in his full-length album. An article by Coti Howell published Aug. 4 on Taste of Country said, "Sam Hunt's debut album 'Leave the Night On' is set for an Oct. 27 release, but fans can get an early taste via a four-track sampler, dubbed 'X2C."

There are many songs by Sam Hunt that are not heard of, but can be found on his YouTube channel or on Spotify. The songs "Vandalizer" and "Make You Miss Me" were posted on his YouTube channel in March 2013 with videos recorded by a videographer. There is no production behind it.

In the "Vandalizer" video, Hunt plays the acoustic guitar, and in "Make You Miss Me" he sat behind the piano playing. It is raw and his vocals are unbelievably good. In addition, the lyrics to both songs are original and relatable. The videos were uploaded on his YouTube channel under an acoustic mixtape "Between The Pines."

Some people may have heard him perform before his career took off when he toured with Chase Rice for a short period in 2013 or with David Nail at the beginning of 2014. Hunt appeared this summer in Michigan on Aug. 10 at the Midland County Fair with "Little Big Town." He will be performing more shows on "Kip Moore: CMT On Tour 2014: Up In Smoke;" however, when the tour makes a stop in Detroit, Sam Hunt will not be attending.

Although Hunt is not necessarily new to the scene, his own musical work has skyrocketed in recent months. The success of his single releases and his newest EP, there is no doubt his debut album will gain popularity fast. Sam Hunt will inevitably become a common name in the scene of country music.

Schoolcraft Cross Country hits the ground running

CARDENAS HIGHLIGHTS OCELOTS SHOWING AT CRIM

On Saturday, Aug. 23, the Mens Cross Country team traveled to Flint for the 38th Annual Crim Road Races. This year, three Schoolcraft runners opted to go the longer distance of 8K, which is a change from the previous years 5K option that the all the team members ran.

In the 5k event, freshman Liam Cardenas continued to recover well from a year of illness, as he finished fifth overall in a field of 1,492 runners with a time of 19:07 (6:08 mile pace), which was faster than his time of 20:37 in his first race. Cardenas's significant improvement over two weeks is promising considering he is the lone freshman on the team.

Also in the 5k was returning letter winner and last year's most improved runner, Brandon Sutton. Late last fall, Sutton suffered an injury to his right knee, and it was later discovered that he tore his ACL and meniscus. He had surgery to repair his knee in March, and now is fully recovered, but has a way to go to gain the endurance he had last year. His time in the Crim Road Race was over 8 minutes slower than his best time last year.

The 8K race had 816 competitors. Sophomore Caton Hacker completed the distance in 32:00 (6:26) and finished ninth

overall in the field. Teammate and fellow second year runner Ethan Levack finished 26th overall in 35:38 (7:10). In 2013, Levack was the team's top runner and was a competitor at the National Championships. Up to the 8K, Levack performed well in the other meets he participated in this year. Also running was Scott Howse, who was 17th overall in the race and was the first finisher in his age group with a time of 33:33 (6:45).

STRONG SHOWING AT GRIZZLY **INVITATIONAL**

On Friday, Aug. 29, the Mens Cross Country team participated in the Golden Grizzly Invitational at Oakland Uni-

For the first time since 2011, the temperature was reasonable for the invitational, unlike the last three years which have been plagued by extremely hot and uncomfortable conditions. This year brought a mild and sunny 70-degree-day along with good track conditions, which made for the perfect race.

The invitational was run on a 6 km (3.73 miles) course, a distance not often run in cross-country races.

Rebounding nicely from his subpar race at the Crim, sophomore Ethan Levack led the team from the start, coming through the first two-mile points in 5:37 and 11:54 and finishing the race in 23:11 (6:14). Fellow sophomore Caton Hacker was not

far behind with splits of 5:40 and 12:07 and a finish time of 23:31 (6:19). Also within range was freshman Liam Cardenas at 5:47, 12:10, finishing just 11 seconds behind Caton with a time of 23:42 (6:22).

Still recovering from his major injury, Brandon Sutton looked much better the first half of the race with splits of 6:39 and 14:36 and finished in 29:44 (8:00).

The fastest Schoolcraft runner who ever ran a 6K was Mark Freyberg, who clocked 21:39 in 2010 when he was a contender for All-American status.

LEVACK, BAETZ ONLY RUNNERS AT TITAN

Due to eligibility issues, a majority of the Ocelot runners were unable to officially participate at the Titan Invitational on Saturday Sept. 6 held at Cass Benton in Northville.

The only eligible runner for the Ocelots was Ethan Levack. Last year Levack's time for this four mile was 26:11. This year he cut his time down by over 2 minutes finishing in 24:02. Levack just missed being the second Schoolcraft runner ever to be under 24 minutes at the Titan Invitational. In 2010 Mark Freyberg hit 23:34 in his near All-American season. Additionally, Scott Howse, ran the open 5K and finished in 20:14. Last year he finished in

Schoolcraft led 3-0 at the half, and dominated play throughout the second half.

Six of the Ocelots seven goals were scored by freshman. Although Jackson has had a poor record the last few seasons, having a majority of the goals scored by the first year players is a postive sign that this group of freshmen have poise and confidence in their abilities.
