Masco Corporation to relocate headquarters to campus grounds

It is huge, it is shiny, and it is moving into Schoolcraft's territory. After years of Schoolcraft's property off of I-275 being unused, there is finally a company moving in to call it "home," as Masco Corporation is in the process of building its new headquarters there. Tuesday, Oct. 6 at 11 a.m. marks the official "ground-breaking" for Masco's construction, which will start the transformation of the 11-acre, grassy field into a three-story, 91,100 square foot glass building. Who is Masco?

Who is Masco? Masco is the proud owner of 28 companies including Delta° and Hangrohe° faucets, KraftMaid° and Merillat° cabinets, Milgrad° windows and doors, Behr° paint and HotSpring° spas among other household products. The now 32,000-employee company with 130 locations across the USA all started as Masco Screw Products in 1929. It has transformed from one small tool company into a hardware empire.

Its current headquarters, located in Taylor, MI off of I-94, is 419,000 square feet. At one time, there were about 700 employees working in the headquarters and over 60,000 employees under Masco altogether. With only about 250 workers needed in the headquarters now, Masco is down-sizing their business and relocating to Livonia's central location where I-275, I-96 and I-696 all cross paths to do so.

"Masco's headquarter em-

ployees are very excited about our upcoming move to the city of Livonia and the wonderful campus of Schoolcraft College," said Jeff Horka, Manager of Real Estate Transactions and Property Tax at Masco. "We certainly will miss the city of Taylor and have had the pleasure of an outstanding partnership with them for nearly 50 years. We are proud to have called Taylor our home and thank them for their longstanding support as we transition to our new location." The new partnership It all began when Glenn Cerny, Schoolcraft Vice President and Chief Financial Officer, wrote a letter to city of Livonia in April requesting an Industrial District. Now, Schostak Brothers and Company, the company that developed Northville Park Place west of campus across Haggerty Road, is working to develop the land and building. Masco hopes to move in by March 2017 and

Twenty-nine years ago, Schoolcraft asked its community for a 0.5 mill increase. It was approved by the voters and brought success to the school and the community. Since 2008, the college has seen property tax revenues decrease by 22 percent, making it so that over the course of the past seven years, the school has lost more than 29 million dollars in property tax income. Schoolcraft is now asking voters for an additional 0.6 million over a ten year period. If granted the millage, Schoolcraft has high hopes

Schoolcraft will have to delay technological and capital advancements, and the school's degree completion efforts will be challenged. The school's completion rate as of today is 61 percent. Schoolcraft tops all other community colleges in the state in this aspect and is ranked fifth on the list compared to 4-year universities in Michigan. It will also be unlikely that services for students will be expanded, including efforts to lessen the cost burden on students through additional financial aid options. The end of September marks the first week that the Michigan Legislature is back in session with a hefty agenda to improve the state from fixing roads to addressing the Detroit Public Schools and energy policies.

Their first focus is to fix the roads. There are two different plans to fix the roads which both involve shifting state budget funds and increasing the gas tax and fees in other areas. They also plan on protecting the Earned Income Tax Credit of working-poor families. The legislature must come up with \$1.2 billion annually to fix the roads before the new 2016 election year and catch up on the work they have not agreed on. Both Democrats and Republicans see the road plan coming together by mid-November.

COLLEGE CAMPUS SHOOTING

On Oct. 1, a 20-year-old male shooter attacked Oregon's Umpqua Community College. Twenty people were injured, and 10 people are dead. The shooter exchanged fire with police and was killed. No police offers were injured and it is believed by police that three shot guns and a rifle belonged to the shooter. The shooter posted on social media about his thoughts of committing the shooting before it occurred and it is currently under investigation to why the shooting occurred. As of Oct. 1 the name of the shooter has not been released.

AMERICA'S EFFECT ON AFRICA

South Africa is proposing a new plan of full coverage health care modeled after the American Obamacare system. For 70 years, universal coverage healthcare has been lacking from the South African government. In the coming months, a government paper proposing this overhaul of the current healthcare plan is to be released and soon instated. Eighty-four percent of South Africans have no health care insurance and cannot afford to pay for any that meet current government standards. This plan will drastically lower this number and is hopeful to hit zero.

SC Forward takes flight

Program offers faster option to obtaining a degree

Starting this fall, Schoolcraft is bringing forth a new program that allows students to complete semester long courses in as little as five weeks.

The college will offer four courses that are eligible for the SC Forward program including: English 101 and POLS 101 in the first 5-week sessions, English 102 during the second 5-week section and History 151 in the third 5-week session.

"The SC Forward Program was created for those students who wish to pursue a College degree but have limited time for education," said Cheryl Hawkins, Dean of Liberal Arts and Sciences at Schoolcraft.

Each class taken will be worth three credits, so the idea of the program is to earn nine credit hours in the time a normal stu-

dent would have accumulated only three. The program was meant for people who have had to put a degree on hold or for those who would like to obtain their degree, but do not have the luxury of time to do so. Online classes will also be available in addition to traditional on campus classes.

"Now, these students can take classes, one class at a time, but potentially finishing three classes per semester. The goal is to help these students get their degrees completed in a shorter period of time," said Hawkins.

For highly motivated students, it is a great alternative to complete classes faster and get closer to career goals, weather transferring or proceeding at Schoolcraft.

"I believe that if I went into SC Forward, I would have better motivation to want to get my work done quick and easy. It'd be nice to have the 10-week freedom and

not have to worry about another class," said Schoolcraft student Lindsav Simos.

To get started in the program, students can submit an application online or to the Admissions and Welcome Center on campus. From there, a meeting with an academic advisor would be scheduled, and registration

can be done through WebAdvisor.

Anyone is welcome to join SC Forward after meeting with an advisor or counselor. This new program is just starting off, and Schoolcraft expects to bring continued success to the college.

Schoolcraft has high hopes for the future of the SC Forward program and aim to see great success from it.

will lease the land from Schoolcraft College for 15 years.

"The college is intent on figuring out businesses that will allow us to generate additional revenue and allow our students to get real world experience that they wouldn't have had otherwise. Out partnership will be able to leverage that," Cerny said. "They're going to be hiring students here from the college."

The partnership will benefit both Masco and Schoolcraft through various shared services, such as the Fitness Center, food services, use of Schoolcraft's classrooms or presentation rooms and even internship opportunities at Masco. Just by their mere connections here, students now have connections to a lot of sites," Cerny said, referring to the 130 Masco locations in the country. The lease will offer extensions to the partnership in the future, meaning it could last up to 40 years or more, benefitting generations of students to come. "At a community college, there is a stereotype, and we're getting rid of that stereotype very quickly. This is one of the ways to do that-to differentiate and connect partnerships like corporate America coming here on our campus," said Cerny.

On the hunt Friends of the Rouge host annual Fall Bug Hunt

Many strange creatures lie below the waters of the Rouge River bed. Some are well known, but others remain a mystery. Twice a year, teams of volunteers visit sites throughout the headwaters of the watershed of the Rouge River and search for mayflies, stoneflies and other aquatic invertebrates. The presence or absence of these streambed creatures reflects the quality of the water and habitat. On Oct. 17 the Friends of the Rouge River will be hosting their Annual Fall Bug Hunt. The Bug Hunt will begin at 9 a.m. at Schoolcraft College in the VisTaTech Center.

Established in 1998, this event was created as a long-term program to monitor the health of Rouge streams. Many insects, aside from those being searched for, are found as well, such as snails, clams and grayfish. These species are all taken into con-

sideration to analyze the overall habitat of the river.

Volunteers are essential in order to be able to monitor the Rouge's habitat on a continual basis.

"The Bug Hunt allows for volunteers to gain a wide variety of knowledge about the environment they live in, as well as help collect data about the ecosystems and creatures that live within the Rouge River. It is a great opportunity and experience," said South Lyon resident and former Bug Hunt volunteer, Amy Rozman.

Teams are split up into two locations to cover a larger area, and the number and types of bugs found are recorded at each site. Then, the data is submitted to the state and the Rouge Communities for research comparison and assessment.

Having the event held at Schoolcraft makes this oppor-

tunity to help the local environment extremely convenient for students to get involved with.

"I have always been interested in bugs and environmental research. This is a good experience to help me dive into the field I hope to study full time," said Schoolcraft student Nicklas Koons.

No prior experience is needed

to participate in these hunts. Further involvement is possible through offered training to become a team leader held prior to the fall and spring bug hunts.

The Alliance of Rouge Communities supports these Rouge River bug hunts held in the fall, winter and spring in order to give an unique opportunity to become involved in the conser-

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Riding towards success

Join the Fall Frenzy movement today

If you aspire to get fit, meet new people and have the chance to win a scholarship and trophy along with bragging rights, then Fall Frenzy is for you.

Schoolcraft's very own Fitness Center is participating in this crazy, nation-wide biking tournament for the third annual year starting Oct. 6 at midnight. Last year, the Ocelot nation was able to feast on victory at the end of the five-week competition, earning the Golden Spokes trophy, and this Fall semester, Schoolcraft hopes to repeat as champs.

What makes this biking competition so unique and separate from others is that Interactive Fitness, a company that specializes in virtual-reality exercise equipment, runs it. Founded in 2009 and based out of Sunnyville, California, the company's main product is the Expresso Bike, which is the exclusive bike used in the tournament.

Schoolcraft owns nine of these Precor Upright and Recumbent bikes-all less than five years old. Aside from their comfort-designed seats, handlebars and build to take stress off the knees, what makes theses bicycles special is their screens. Riders have a 15-inch LCD capacitive touch screen in front of them that offers over 40 different courses or can have a cell phone connected. After a course is chosen, riders steer and switch gears all on their own. This means riders can chose to cruise next to a sandy beach on a sunny summer day, but be in the comfort of the air-conditioned Fitness Center.

Interactive Fitness has been holding the Fall Frenzy since 2013 as a both a way to appeal to college students, and to provide students with professional development scholarships. Ninety-three colleges competed in the original 2013 competition; 2014 saw 124 colleges compete, and 2015 will see at least 140 colleges participating, some including: Carnegie Mellon University, Harvard Busi-

ness School, Iowa State University, Louisiana State University (LSU), Northwestern University, Penn State, Stanford University and Schoolcraft College.

The way the tournament works is in five rounds of 48-hour periods. Whatever schools bike the furthest between Tuesday at midnight and Thursday at midnight advance to the next round. The rounds take place every week for five consecutive weeks until someone comes out on top.

The bicycles in Schoolcraft's Fitness Center will be used to track the progress bringing in registered bikers from faculty, staff, students and the Livonia community. Those who are interested in participating should set up memberships and accounts on the bikes before the 48-hour time periods of tournament rounds take place. Any amount of time on the bike will help go towards Schoolcraft's mileage. Also, if a student pedals enough miles on the bike and has a high enough GPA, a scholarship may be awarded if the tournament is won. Last year, two students were recipients of the scholarship.

Join the Fall Frenzy, and start getting fit today while aiding in Schoolcraft's success. Every mile counts for both the tournament and your health, so hop on an Expresso Bike to improve joint, cardio and respiratory health, plus improve Schoolcraft's number of miles. 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

The contraception debate

Minors should have access to birth control without parental consent

Many people believe that no matter what the age, a minor's decisions should always need consent from an adult. Whether it be for the benefit of the minor or not, access to birth control is one of the decisions many feel strongly about. Although controversial, minors need to have unattested access to birth control without the consent of an adult for the benefit of the minor as well as society as a whole.

According to dosomething. org, by their senior year in high school, 62 percent of teens have engaged in sexual activity, and by the time they reach age 20, three in 10 girls get pregnant. If proper contraception is used, these unwanted pregnancies could be avoided; yet the main obstacle stopping this is accessibility.

The most reliable form of contraception is the birth control pill; yet, it is also one of the least accessible for teenagers to get on their own.

A recent study from The Journal of the American Medical Association discovered that 47 percent of sexually active teenage girls in

the Wisconsin area would stop seeking all reproductive health care services if they had to talk to their parents about it first. This includes accessing contraception. Yet, of the same set of girls, 99 percent said they would continue to have sex according to the American Civil Liberties Union website.

Denying minors birth control does not stop them from having sex, it just increases un-safe sex. Minors need to be able to protect themselves, and allowing them unattested access to birth control is a way of doing so.

The age group most at risk for unplanned pregnancy, as well as least likely to use contraception while engaging in sexual activity, are girls aged 15 to 19 years old as stated by Guttmatcher Institute family planning website. If teen contraception use increases, unplanned teenage pregnancy will decrease. While allowing minors access to birth control without consent is not the only way to increase teen contraception use, it is one way that can help.

While many may argue that birth control pills are unnecessary when the male condom is readily available in drug stores, they are not taking into account reliability. The birth control pill

Since the birth control pill was legalized in 1960, teen pregnancy rates have decreased 64 percent as stated by the Center for Disease Control. This proves that as birth control becomes more available, teen pregnancy rates decrease. In order to keep proving this trend, birth control needs to continue becoming more readily available by allowing access without parental consent.

This solution is simple. By one action, the lives of countless teenagers could be improved and spared from unwanted pregnancies. Children would be less likely to be born into unfit families, and young people would be able to better themselves for the future. No logical negative outcomes could come from providing birth control to minors, while the positives are vast. By putting personal beliefs to the side, countless lives can be improved. Allowing minors access to birth control is not only the logical decision; it is also the moral one.

Republican primary candidates go head-to-head on stage at the CNN debate.



Recently, the news has brought about madness when it comes to politics, especially in important election years as we are experiencing now.




Pete Rose gambles for hall of fame

Going the extra mile College aims for a repeat victory this Fall Frenzy

Get ready to sweat, burn off calories and relentlessly compete with other colleges, because this year, Schoolcraft is hungry for a repeat performance in the Fall Frenzy bike tournament.

This October marks the third annual Fall Frenzy tournament sponsored through Expresso Bikes. What occurs is intense stationary biking during five rounds of competition, each of which are 48 hours long. This lasts for five consecutive weeks from Tuesday at 12 a.m. to Thursday at 12 a.m. each week. The participating colleges and universities that bike the most miles advance to the next round. The first round will shrink the pool from 140 teams to 16 and then progress similarly to a March Madness tournament.

Virtual experience

What makes this biking event unique are the Expresso bikes. They are all equipped with interactive screens above the handlebars to project a virtual course in front of the biker. There are over 40 courses to choose from that all have different scenery and elevation changes. Bikers are able to physically turn and switch gears unlike typical stationary bikes.

Due to the elevation change feature the bikes also offer, Lisa Cunningham and Jake Fedewa,

both Fitness Leads organizing the event, suggest riding easier courses, so it is easier to bike more miles. Two of the best options are the Expresso Speedway one-mile loop with no elevation change and the Campus Loop, which are four to five miles with less than 100 feet elevation change.

"Even the experienced riders do it [bike the Expresso Speedway] because you can do it the fastest, and you just keep going around," said Cunningham.

Champions

Last year, Schoolcraft came out on top of the 124 colleges that participated to win the Golden Spokes Trophy.

"It was exciting-the energy in the Fitness Center was great. We had involvement from students, community members, faculty and staff. Everyone was very supportive," said Cunningham.

A \$500 professional development scholarship was also awarded to Schoolcraft for the win, which was given to two students with high GPAs and who biked many contributing miles.

Jose Ramirez was one of the scholarship winners last year with 485 miles under his belt after the 10 days he was able to bike.

"At first, I wasn't that committed, but once I saw there was a lot of involvement, I got hyped, so I started coming at midnight," said Ramirez. "When I heard that we were going against other schools like Louisiana State University and State University of New York, I was like 'I want to beat those guys.'"

Ramirez would bike two to three hours at a time into the early hours of the morning and sometimes go to sleep just to wake up to hop on the bike again.

Although Ramirez has an intense school and work schedule he plans to ride as much as he can this tournament because he said all it's a great environment-even at midnight. He said all the bikers joke with and compete against each other to push everyone to do their best.

Jack Washka, who has been a physical education professor at Schoolcraft for 48 years, biked about 70 miles last year and even offers his students extra credit for participating in the event, giving them incentive to start riding.

"It's a chance for students to get to know each other in a different way and center themselves around one goal," said Washka.

Team effort

To win last year, it took over 300 people for Schoolcraft to reach 11,522 miles. Schoolcraft aims to match that effort this year and even increase miles ridden. One bike has been added to the collection at the Fitness Center, boosting it to nine, so higher mileage should be attainable. Word of mouth promotion will be necessary for greater results though.

"We don't want to see those bikes empty for those 48 hours," said Fedewa.

Even for people who have little

time and are unable to ride multiple miles at a time, Schoolcraft would like their help.

"Every mile counts," add Ramirez.

The Fall Frenzy will officially begin Tuesday, Oct. 6 at midnight, and the Fitness Center will be open the entire 48 hour round. Make sure to get a membership to the Fitness Center and set up an account on an Expresso bike before the craze begins.



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Preventing problems College launches Early Alert System to improve student success

Schoolcraft College faculty and staff's hope is for every enrolled student to succeed in their studies. There are many existing programs in place for help if students are struggling in the classroom; however, a new type of program has recently been implemented to make this goal even more attainable for everyone: Schoolcraft's Early Alert System.

Launched in the Fall of 2015, this system is an early intervention in a student's academics to increase success. If a professor or fellow staff member notices a student having difficulty with homework, tests or even class attendance, they may make note of it electronically to notify the Office of Student Success and Retention.

"The early alert system is a communication tool that faculty have access to, to ask for additional outreach for a student if they notice they might be struggling," said Melissa Schultz, Director of Student Success and Retention at Schoolcraft.

Once the office is alerted of a student, they research each case individually to decide who would be the best person to follow up with them. Each student then receives an individual phone call to discuss the issues and find the best solutions.

"Some of the processes and procedures in college can be confusing, so instead of waiting for the student to come to us needing help, we're looking for the signals to ask them first," said Schultz.

Schoolcraft College is dedicated to student achievement, so what makes this program special is that every student gets the individual attention they may need to improve. Many students receive follow up phone calls and emails after the initial outreach from staff to see how they are improving. This continued connection makes students feel more comfortable at Schoolcraft and is proven to increase success. This system is also important, because often students don't even know they need the help when they do. With the aid of the Early Alert System, not only can students get back on track, but they can thrive.

"Research tells us that sometimes students don't really know how they're doing in a class—they may need more feedback or other kinds of assistance. Not only does Early Alert provide what students need, it also lets students know that we truly care about their success—because we do," said Cheryl Hagen, Vice President and Chief Student Affairs Officer.

The staff of Schoolcraft know that every student is enrolled at the college to attain a certain goal, so they make it a responsibility to help everyone get there. FIND US ONLINE AT WWW.SCHOOLCRAFTCONNECTION.COM

The Early Alert System is another stepping stone in this process. In place for all students, whether on campus, online or in continuing education, the staff is able to intervene for anyone before a situation gets too far.

"We wanted a system that could let us know if students were in trouble early enough to make a difference," said Dean of Education Programs Dr. Deborah Daiek. "The Early Alert System was the result."

The main purpose of this system is to help students in any way possible—not benefit the college. That means that if it is in the best interest of a student to simply withdraw from or drop a class, that is what will be suggested to them. Other suggestions the system may offer to improve academics include utilizing tutoring at the LAC, speaking with the professor or another form of personalized help.

"I think this program is a really good idea," said Schoolcraft student Sam Holmes. "Sometimes students are scared to go up to the teacher and ask for help, so if the teachers reach out to them, it's easier."

The Early Alert System was crafted out of genuine care and concern for students and although new, Schoolcraft staff has high hopes for this program. It is expected to not only aid individual students, but improve the success of the college as a whole. Through early intervention, everyone can succeed.

Secrets of the Quill

Q: Dear Writing Fellows, **My English professor** assigned a research essay and it is making me nervous. What can I do to simplify the whole process and make it less daunting? Sincerely, **Scared and Sweaty**

A: Dear Scared and Sweaty

Hi, there is no reason to be scared OR sweaty! I have collected five tips for constructing an all-star essay.

Your first step is choosing a topic. Research essays are a big commitment and a long process,

so choose a topic that will keep your interest. Do not pick your topic based on what is easiest; choose something that fills your passion. Your professor does not want to read a lukewarm essay, and they will be able to tell if you feel strongly about your research! Be sure to choose a topic that is neither too broad nor too narrow, so that you will be able to find enough information to construct an essay that is thorough, yet concise.

Once you have chosen your topic and are ready to gather information, the second step is using credible sources, which are the cornerstone for a strong research essay. Generally, books and scholarly journals are infallible sources of information, but using the internet for your essay can be a little tricky. Scholarly journals are an excellent source because they are peer reviewed, which means

articles have been evaluated by experts in that field, therefore strengthening their credibility. Websites ending in .edu and .gov are your best friends; citing Wikipedia will make your professors weep. If you find a .com article that you would like to use, ask yourself these questions: What are the author's qualifications? Do they present unbiased information? How recently was the source published? Who is the intended audience? If the source is biased, out of date, or does not have an author: DO NOT USE IT!

The third, and perhaps most important step, do not procrastinate. This is, of course, easier said than done. Accomplishing things ahead of schedule and budgeting your time provides a cushion for any unexpected bumps in the road. Maybe after searching for sources, you realize there is not enough information available to craft your essay. Maybe you decide that you absolutely hate your topic and want to change it. Writing a research essay is a process that

takes time, and any unforeseen obstacles have the potential to derail your entire operation. To prevent that night-before-theessay-is-due-and-you-still-havenot-started-panic, get things done as early as you can. You will thank yourself later!

Next, to ease your burden, divide the project into manageable steps. Initially, research essays seem like an intimidating task. But if you slice it up into smaller steps, it will be a piece of cake. For example, start by collecting two or three sources. Then, continue by finding usable quotes from each source. Follow this pattern until your project comes together; by treating each task as an individual step, it will make the entire

of a behemoth endeavor.

Finally, revise, revise and revise again! Rereading your essay a few times will likely illuminate mistakes, or things you would like to change. It is nearly impossible to produce an A+ essay in one swing, so be sure to spend time revising to guarantee your essay is the best it can be. A fresh set of eyes can be the most helpful part of the revision process. You might not pick up on tiny grammatical errors that slip past Spellcheck, but a Writing Fellow will! Hope this helps, and good luck!



Legacy of fear

Last month, Hollywood lost a legend in the horror industry when Wes Craven died of brain cancer.

Known for such films as "Scream," "The Last House on the Left," "The Hills Have Eyes" and possibly the highlight of his career, "A Nightmare on Elm Street," Craven was arguably one of the most celebrated horror directors in cinema history, famous for movies that explore the nature of reality.

His first film, "The Last House on the Left," was filled with such shocking content that it was banned in several countries. Craven showed that real life could be just as horrifying as any movie. The film features no monster of magical or scientific origin; instead, it is packed with blood and gore and features all too real monsters in the form of a group of sadistic rapists. It is also the movie that launched Craven's career, as he went on to do bigger and better films.

Then, in 1984, Craven created another lasting impact on moviegoers with "A Nightmare on Elm Street," which introduced the world to the nightmarish Freddy Krueger. Aside from creating the first supernatural slasher in horror history, Craven also created New Line Cinema, the company behind the film. The film also launched the careers of several actors, most notably Johnny Depp. Ironically, Craven intended for "Elm Street" to be a one-film only story, with no plans for it to become the franchise it is today. With the first "Scream" movie, Craven cleverly lampooned the so called "horror movie rules." This

horror-comedy satirized slasher movies, bringing the genre's clichés to the forefront, and it spawned three sequels, all directed by Craven. "Scream" helped revitalize the horror movie genre as a whole, which was almost dead in the nineties. MTV even recently launched a TV series for the historic franchise. In a world where directors like Michael Bay and Uwe Boll care more about taking liberties with their films and trying to create massive blockbusters than telling good stories, directors like Craven are greatly appreciated. Craven may be physically gone, but his legacy and work will last forever. Like any good director, Craven's films serve as a reminder of how talented a man he was and what kind of visionary he was. His movies are still considered to be masterpieces of horror, and they turned many actors into household names. A great filmmaker is never forgotten, and Wes Craven was one of the greatest.

Michigan is home to some of the biggest metal bands of today, including The Black Dahlia Murder and Battlecross, which has fans wondering, who is next? Carnis Immortalis, a death metal band hailing from Garden City, Michigan, brings a relentless sonic attack drawing influence from bands like Slayer, GWAR, Cannibal Corpse and Nile. The quartet is comprised of vocalist Jalen Wallace, guitarists Jesse Buehler and Craig Kirk, bassist Kyle Wagner and drummer Shane Baker.

Ever since they broke out of Michigan's local scene and onto the national scene, The Black Dahlia Murder has been kicking ass and taking names. On Friday, Sept. 18, The Black Dahlia Murder put out their seventh LP "Abysmal" on Metal Blade Records, their most aggressive record yet. "Everest" combines emotion and suspense for a cinematographic masterpiece

On Sept. 18, Icelandic director Baltasar Kormákur's movie "Everest" opened in theaters nationwide. Chronicling the true events of the 1996 Mount Everest Disaster, this movie is a passionate, yet heart-wrenching account that will leave audiences in tears.

The film follows climbers Rob Hall (Jason Clarke), Scott Ficsher (Jake Gyllenhall) and their expedition team of about 30 other members, as they climb towards the earth's highest peak on May 10, 1996.

As soon as they begin their ascent up the mountain, it is evident that not everything is going to end well. Almost immediately, expedition member Beck Weathers (Josh Brolin) nearly plummets to his death after losing his footing on a ladder. Although he is saved, this near death experience is just a taste of what is to come.

As the team continues climbing, they make their way into what is known as the death zone. This zone begins at 8,000 meters, an altitude where there is not enough oxygen in the air for humans to breath. The crews make their way higher and higher and eerily pass frozen bodies of climbers who have died in the past. By the end of the events that this film retells, sadly eight more bodies are added to these frozen gravesites.

The climbers know that a storm has been scheduled to pass through the mountain the day of their climb, so they plan their hike accordingly. While most make it safely to the peak on time, unfortunately, some do not and get caught in the weather. Doug Hansen (John Hawkes) was one of the climbers running behind. Although told to turn back before the storm hit, his determination and anger from a failed attempt in the past pushed him onward. He makes it to the peak, but during his descent as he runs out of oxygen and goes into a state of delirium, he falls off the side of the mountain in a spooky silence.

The cinematography of this film is what makes it truly remarkable. The realistic mountains and storms coupled with the movie's release in only 3D makes audience members feel as if they are part of the expedition. The documentary-esque film style and the raw emotion of the actors make this movie seem almost too real, leaving moviegoers on the edge of their seats.

Although this movie is heart-breaking, the lack of background on certain characters causes a lack of emotional connection for viewers. The fact that there are so many characters makes it impossible to focus on them all, so when inevitable deaths occur during the film, some are far less tragic than others.

The true event that this film is based on is one of the deadliest encounters on Mount Everest in history. While it is a daunting task to relay this tragedy as a movie, "Everest" does a wonderful job. Through its ideal casting and respectful tributes of actual photographs of the real climbers of that day, "Everest" leaves audiences with constant heartache, thrill and suspense. Although not for the faint of heart, this film is an important recount of a tragic moment in history and will be a subject of discussion for viewers well into the future.

guitar, keyboard, trumpet and back-up vocals) and Tom Warren (bass and back-up vocals).


vocals). The band shows a different sound with this latest album, coming up from record-

Playing past the difficulties

"Nobunaga's Ambition: Sphere of Influence" proves a daunting, yet rewarding task

Many games have a learning curve, then there are games like "Nobunaga's Ambition: Sphere of Influence" that have something more akin to a learning cliff. This strategy game that launched on Sept. 1 from developer and publisher Koei Tecmo is the 14th successor to the 1983 game, "Nobunaga no Yabo," and it is infinitely more complicated.

The game intricately balances careful governance of the player's chosen clan with managing military campaigns in an effort to unify Japan and end the "age of chaos." The game has a council phase where the player decides the actions for the following month. From here, they can pursue diplomatic relationships, develop their means of production, build facilities, improve their lands and manage specific officers of their clans. After the first play-through, players still might not know what some of the stats and terms mean. As one may find out later in the game, much to their frustration, this phase can be entirely or partially automated.

The second phase is the military phase, where players watch the decisions made during council unfold and are given full control of their armies. Players can deploy soldiers to conquer other clans while keeping a close eye on their troop counts and provisions. Then, players can decide whether they want to let the unit fight or take direct control of an army in a battle. In battles, the player can move units around the battlefield and give specific commands like charging or setting up a volley to make a difference in the battle

result. By directly intervening, the battle is less up to chance. and troop counts may be better preserved.

This title is significantly more complex than other titles in the genre. Upon entering the game, players will be overwhelmed by the options available and sheer amount of data on screen. Many will think that learning the game itself will be as challenging as beating it, but that is not necessarily true. Hours in, the game will start making sense and stop sounding as foreign as the game's setting, which is in the warring states period of Japan. The game can get so complex and addicting, players will find themselves constantly asking how they found themselves in such unenviable positions well beyond the time usually designated for sleep.

The game does have ways to offset the difficulty, primarily by using the in-game editor, which is a cool feature considering not many strategy games include

one. The editor turns off in-game achievements, or "feats" as they are referred to in the game, which not only unlocks characters and scenarios, but also bragging rights, so there is incentive to not use it.

The game stands firm as one of the most complex and engaging strategy games available. The game's depth of management and warfare may be engaging, but it lacks the nation building experience of other strategy titles, so when a player's clan reaches its greatest heights, there is less of a sense of accomplishment. "Nobunaga's Ambition's" biggest shortcoming is that the payoffs for success feel underwhelming.

The game's greatest success is its remarkable depth and difficulty. Seasoned strategy game veterans should definitely check this game out, as it will keep them hooked for hours on end, losing track of reality.





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
