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Red, White and Brew

Brewery and Distillation Program provides opportunities for entrepreneurs

In the United States there are 20 colleges with brewery programs, according to the Brewers Association, and Schoolcraft is now one of them. With only two other colleges providing programs in the state, it is safe to say this program gives the colleges unique advantage, while continuing to prove that community colleges providing students with the degrees and certificates that will give them an upper hand in the brewing industry just as well as a university may be able to do.

"The program here at Schoolcraft does come with more than just making beer. It covers everything from beer production all the way through selling, marketing, sensory, dealing with the public, business, all those different aspects. So it gives

you a more rounded experience. It can be applied in whatever field or aspect of the industry you end up in," said Brewery program instructor Ken Belau.

The Schoolcraft Brewing and Distillation Technology program is a 24 credit hour program where students receive a certificate after completion. Before production started the students were still using valuable time to be in the classroom for lecture. The program is 30 hours of lecture and 30 hours of hands on learning.

'This program gives them [the students] a good baseline to open their own, and then easily be able to transition to working in a brewery," said Master Brewer and Director of Brewing and Distillation Technologies, Tom Block.

This program gives students an opportunity to transition from a hobby of brewing at home to actually learning the business and trade and one day opening their own company.

The Brewing & Distillation Technologies program is separate from the Culinary Arts program., However, it gives students many of the same strengths and skill sets as the Culinary Arts program. Students learn the process of brewing, the business aspect and get hands on experience in creating their own brewery and flavors. In all, this gives students in the program the experience that they need to be successful in the field.

Production for the brewery started the week of September 12. After the production commences, then the selling of the actual product on campus actually initiates. Since brewing is about a two week process, selling at American Harvest, the on-campus restaurant, will not begin for another few weeks. It is prospected to be up for sale by the beginning of November.

When asked about the production and selling of the product, Block said, "We will start on serving in the international lines, which is Thursday and Friday nights. Eventually, we'd like to get the doors open a couple more days a week to be able to sell the beer. Maybe in the winter semester, we'll have a couple more days open-Saturday, Sunday we're looking at."

In addition to selling in the restaurant, the instructors hope to be able to sell bottled beers in the reach in cooler outside of American Harvest. Though the culinary and brewing programs are separate, they will still be working together to provide people with good tasting food and beer, available right on campus.

To begin the course, the brewery is going to start with five batches of beer and hopefully work their way up to eight towards the end

of the fall semester. With the hands on experience, students learn the process of brewing their own beer. These 30 hours of instruction teaches the process of making the beer: putting the brew into a fermenter, adding yeast and letting it ferment for five to ten days, chill the brew, move it to a bright tank to clarify and carbonate the beer and then keg and finally bottle or can the beer.

When asked why he was interested in Schoolcraft's brewing program, Brewing and Distillation Technology student Nick Cornell said, "I needed a way into the industry. That [opening my own brewery] is the end goal."

Like many other classmates, Cornell is looking to turn a passion and hobby into something more profitable.

Schoolcraft's exceptional programs and teaching create a great environment for students and along with the additional fact that Schoolcraft only has two other competing schools in Michigan that offer brewery programs. This brewery is expected to attract many students who are looking to learn the trade for years to come.

Sarcastic Beer

On Oct. 1, the Jolly Pumpkin in Dexter will be the first in Michigan to participate in Zwanze Beer Day. This day is celebrated in only 60 locations across 18 countries worldwide. This rare occasion began in 2008 and is an event where the Brasserie Cantillon Brewery in Brussels, Germany releases a rare lambic-style of beer with fruit notes in a choreographed, simultaneous tapping at select locations worldwide. This year's brew is called Framboise. Zwanze is a play on the local Belgium dialec and means being sarcastic. This beer is a play off of traditional beer and is a sour type fruit beer brewed in Belgium. Trying the beer even helps a good cause as all funds from the sale of this special beer goes to Feelgood Tap, which raises funds for nonprofits across Michigan.

Holding power of the office

On Sept. 12 an appeals court rejected a challenge to Michigan's emergency manager law. It stands that Gov. Rick Snyder's solution for distressed communities that needed help from the state doesn't violate the constitutional rights of residents. Emergency Managers when put into place have exceptional power to run things such as city hall, school districts and other government forums, while for the 18 months they hold their position, elected officials are casted aside while finances are fixed. Recently critics sued the state arguing that the law violated a variety of rights such as freedom of speech, voting, even protection against slavery, especially in cities with large African American populations. In 2012, voters turned over Snyder's first emergency financial manager law. This time the court in a 3-0 decision overturned the lawsuit and stated the law may not be the perfect remedy to turning around local governments, but its rationally related and thus did not violate any rights.

NATIONAL

Suing Saudi Arabia

A bill allowing victims of terror attacks on Sept. 1, 2001 to sue the government of Saudi Arabia was passed in May by the Senate and by the house unanimously on Sept. 9, 2016. The White House has announced that President Barack Obama will veto the bill. Since the bill first was presented on the Senate floor the suggested that Pres. Obama not sign the bill. The fear of passing this bill is that it will complicate diplomatic relations with the country of Saudi Arabia. The white house also stands against the bill because it is not an "effect, forceful way for us to respond to terrorism." Lawmakers are expected to attempt to override the veto. If successful, it would be mark the first time for this to happen during Obama's presidency.

News briefs Schoolcraft College rated among best value community colleges

Ranked sixth place out of 50 by Value Colleges

Recently, the college ranking organization Value Colleges released a list of the 50 best value community colleges of the year. Schoolcraft was ranked in sixth place on the list. Only De Anza, Orange Coast, Meridian, Saddleback and Normandale Community Colleges were ahead of Schoolcraft.

When asked what he believes Schoolcraft does or

does not do to be ranked in sixth place, CAD instructor Steven Rochon said, "I believe Schoolcraft provides help for students to provide our best possibility for help and education of our students so they can move further in their chosen career or transfer to another university."

While community colleges are crucial for educational access and entry into specialized careers, they do not receive the same level of recognition as traditional 4-year institutions. Few reliable rankings of community colleges exist, and most of those use criteria reserved for traditional colleges. This misrepresents community colleges, because such colleges have different jobs from regular universities. Henceforth, Value Colleges exists to provide aspiring college students with the information they need to determine which community colleges will deliver the best higher education results.

The organization compiled data from CollegeMeasures. org of all 1,717 community colleges throughout the United States. In order for a community college to be rated as "best value" by Value Colleges, it had to have a 45% or better gradu-

ation rate, an average cost of less than \$10,000 each year, more than 1,000 enrolled students and have AACC (American Association of Community Colleges) membership. A total of 614 institutions achieved this rating.

For Schoolcraft to have been ranked in first place, Schoolcraft's project manager for the Michigan Coalition for Advanced Manufacturing (M-CAM), Sandra Miller, believes the key is more classroom space. "We could possibly increase capacity in the most high demand fields, such as manufacturing," said Miller.

The top 50 of these schools were filtered out based on the graduation/transfer rate, mid-level salaries for alumni and actual tuition. When asked which of these criteria he liked best, Graphic Design student Ian Culton of Westland said "I like the graduation/ transfer rate the best about Schoolcraft."

For the 2015-16 academic year, the total estimated tuition and fees for in-state firstyear, full-time undergraduate students at Schoolcraft was \$4,854, up from \$4,734 from the previous year. In addition, books and supplies for

2015-16 were estimated to cost \$1,352, compared to \$1,326 from 2014-15. As of 2014, the four-year average transfer rate of Schoolcraft students to other colleges was 28% while the average graduation rate was 19%. However, this data is for students who have completed their degrees within three years of starting at Schoolcraft. Per federal government regulations, all colleges must calculate graduation and transfer rates based on the number of students who complete their studies within 1.5 times the expected program time.

As good as Schoolcraft did when it comes to the graduation/transfer rate, alumni salaries and tuition, some people think more criteria should be used to rank the top 50 community colleges. Schoolcraft **Industrial and Manufacturing Engineering student Sarah** Walworth of Northville said "I think the small class sizes should be among the criteria because smaller classes let you interact with the professor more."

While Schoolcraft is heavily devoted to continuing education for its students, it is also widely recognized for its culinary arts program and Business Development Center. Thanks to this center, local employers have the ability to provide superb training to their employees, manage their finances, and analyze markets within the area.

Smoked out

Campus goes smoke free

Students should know that the college is smoke free and tobacco free; this means that any tobacco products such as chewing tobacco, e-cigarettes, hookah cigarettes and vaporizers are prohibited on campus. If anyone is caught with any tobacco products the consequences can range from a warning to a disciplinary action involving the student code of conduct.

"It is enforced to everyone that's on campus, not just students and faculty. Vendors, contractors, anyone that walks on our campus, it applies too" said Leavens.

The feedback from students around campus has been positive since being implemented on Aug 1 as more and more individuals have started to take notice of their new smoke free environment.

Student Joy Johnson, stated, "I think it's a great thing to do. I'm glad I quit smoking.'

Clearly not only is the tobacco free campus helping the environment, but it is helping students who broke their bad habits stay strong and become healthier.

Another student, Samantha Holmes, zoology major, stated, "I'm happy they did it, it doesn't smell as bad, it makes the campus so much better."

Although the students, fac-

ulty, staff and visitors have to oblige to the campus' new policy, they are allowed to go back to their cars and smoke in the parking lot. However, some students may find this difficult due to the fact that they will have less time to smoke during their breaks during class.

A wave of positivity has swept through campus with the new smoke free and tobacco free policy. The campus has done its part in working to stop smoking, now it is up to the campus community to take control into their own hands to quit their bad habits.

Fire Academy now offering online courses

With everything moving in the direction of becoming online based programming, colleges around the world are starting to offer more online classes for their students to take. However, what are public safety students

supposed to do when their schedules are too uncertain to dedicate themselves to a face-to-face class? Schoolcraft's Fire Academy has

figured out the answer with

its new Fire 205 Department Organization and Administration online course.

Many firefighters often face unset schedules during their workweek due to the ever changing 24 hour shifts they are subject to. Since these public safety officials face the struggle of not being able to attend on campus courses, Schoolcraft has created a class for returning cadets and employed firefighters to take when they are waiting in between calls.

The Fire 205 course was made for veteran firefighters as well as entry level candidates to start training for the future in the role of a Battalion Chief, Deputy Chief and other executive positions. During this class students will learn the procedures of budgets, staffing, resource management, disciplinary issues that may occur and many other topics that comes with running a Fire Department.

"I have them acting like they are a Fire Administrator. Each chapter in the book goes through each type of administration such as a budget. They actually have to practice doing a budget, dealing with all the different areas in the city that deal with making a budget," said Fire 205 Instructor Mike Harper.

One major difference in the Fire 205 course compared to other classes offered in the Fire Academy is the fact that it is not directly targeting Fire Academy students. The online course makes it easy for workers who have been on the job to come in and get the degree after years of being out of college. It is offered as a "Non-academy" degree as opposed to a Fire Academy degree making it easier for workers from the surrounding communities to take the class as well during work hours.

"This class is geared for those people who are already working, but now specifically want to move to the next level," said Fire Technology Program Coordinator, Liam A. Carroll.

The Fire 205 online course is just the start of integrating online courses into the curriculum of the Fire Academy. The Public Safety Training Center is already in the works of trying to add additional online classes for future students to attend. Community Colleges should offer fouryear degrees

Traditionally it is thought that one would attend a community college to get the basic general education classes out of the way for a more affordable price and then transfer to another college. Some may obtain an Associate two-year degree while attending or receive a certification for certain careers. It is the easiest route to get in, get a degree and to get into the workforce as $\,$ quickly as possible.

Many careers won't accept just an Associate's degree anymore and it is becoming more difficult to find work without a four-year degree or higher. With this in mind, college tuition keeps rising every year, making it financially crippling to attend a university or obtain this fouryear degree without loans.

Some community colleges are starting to receive the certification to allow students to receive a bachelor's degree without ever leaving campus and for a lower cost. According to communitycollegereview.com, this new system of bachelor degrees should be offered nationwide at all community colleges, to help students receive a useful degree for less and in a wider variety of degrees.

There are differences in the community college's bachelor degree from the traditional four-year institutions though. In most cases these degrees are offered to students that have obtained an Associate's and are given as an extension of their own Associate programs. This means that students acquire the Associate first then apply for the bachelor's program of study.

They also differ with the variety of degrees offered. They are limited to degree programs that take students directly into the workforce. Instead of offering a general bachelor of the science or English field of study, the

degree is specialized to fields such as nursing, radiology and information technology.

According to the Education Commission of the States, in 2012, Lawmakers in Michigan enacted H.B. 4496. This authorized all 28 community colleges within the state to offer bachelor's degrees in energy production, concrete technology, maritime technology and culinary arts. The community colleges within Michigan act independently, on a decentralized level and do not address the core policies laid out by the commission. Individual institution's board of trustees can decide to undergo a review process by the regional accrediting agency to receive authority to offer bachelor's degrees. Since 2012 some

institutions within Michigan, such as Macomb Community College and Northwestern Michigan College according to The Detroit Free Press, have tried to become accredited in other general degrees. This should be allowed because it offers many

benefits to the general population. Some of the benefits are that community colleges give access to degrees for those that live in more rural areas and may not have access to fouryear colleges or are not able to relocate and uproot their lives.

It also benefits low-income, first generation and older students returning to school. Many of these students may have never considered receiving anything more than an Associate's degree or a work certification in a certain career. It also is an advocate for non-traditional students and makes it a seamless transition for students to receive these higher degrees without having to transfer.

With so many colleges aiming to benefit their students with as many resources as possible and as many ways to get students to succeed, adding bachelor's degree programs that are more than only three or four

specialized programs benefits the entire population.

It helps to get additional students to graduate with higher degrees that many may have never considered pursuing and keeps cost lower. It does start to pose new grounds than the original purpose of community colleges, and could have some challenges, but in all benefits the overall population for the better.

Breaking new ground and expanding education within community colleges seems to be in the near future, which will change the lives of many.

Originality at its worst

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Current Hollywood cinema screenplays are severely flawed

Throughout the twentieth century, a wide range of directors had blessed audiences with a variety of movies based on several different genres that complimented original plotlines. However, it is a sad reality but, the movie industry has severely declined in quality.

It is shameful to observe the evolution of directors; that is, transitioning from an era where Alfred Hitchcock, Stanley Kubrick and Wes Craven's blockbusters tantalized audiences, to the likes of the "superhero" era of Michael Bay, Zack Snyder and Christopher Nolan.

It is a sad state of affairs, because at this point, the movie industry appears to have given up. It is fueled solely on profitability as op-

posed to releasing real, honest projects. Current projects lack creative direction; the screenplays have become repetitive, with no added flair to make them stand out. The content of these screenplays revolve around poorly made sequels, remakes and the incredibly trendy superhero genre. The questions remains, who is to blame? Has the creative design and innovation in Hollywood faded to nothing? Have renowned film directors and staff simply given up?

Unfortunately, the roots of this dilemma date back to the early days when cinema was slowly growing in popularity. The "Golden Era" of cinema began in the early twentieth century with the founding of the production company MGM by founders Irving G. Thalberg and Louis B. Mayer. Though MGM is credited with producing several successful films that proved to be instrumental in the continuing evolution of cinema, such as "The Wizard of Oz," the direction and aim of the company was problematic when it came to the mindsets of its founders.

Reportedly, Thalberg was a "movie buff," and wanted to make honest, original films, whereas Mayer was solely concerned about profits. It goes without saying that complications on the originality of screenplays in cinema date back to its origins, and continue to this day.

The rise of the superhero

movie franchise dates back to 2005, with the release of "Batman Begins," the first installment in the Christopher Nolan Batman film trilogy. Following the conclusion of that trilogy with the release of "The Dark Knight Rises" in 2012, the Marvel Cinematic Universe franchise took off, with the release of "The Avengers," a collaboration of several Marvel superheroes on the big screen. Since then, the Marvel Cinematic Universe and DC Animated Universe

franchise have been competing with each other, releasing installment after installment to determine which is the more successful franchise. These companies effortlessly dominate the current industry, with recent releases such as "Deadpool," "Batman v. Superman: Dawn of Justice," "Captain America: Civil War"

cide Squad." The releases of films will continue for years to come, with no end in sight.

Another category of cinema that needs rash improvement is the "sequels and remakes." Over the summer, moviegoers slammed the release of "Ghostbusters (2016)," an all-female cast remake of the classic 1980s film of the same name. The film was both a financial and critical failure, with much blame put on the lack of comedy, crooked plotline and the decision to include an all-female cast.

The release of "Independence Day: Resurgence," the sequel to Will Smith's "Independence Day," lacked narrative and an overall direction. The original film had a grasp on both concepts, but it is just another example of easy profits to be made by Hollywood.

Individuals should be asking themselves "Who will step forward and make the next Taxi Driver or Pulp Fiction?" Sadly, that question remains without an answer. The term "originality" has declining meaning in the world of cinema. It appears that profitability now defines Hollywood, and it is an unfortunate turn of counts.

Gendered bathrooms are a thing of the past

Although it may not necessarily be the majority, being transgender and part of the LGBTQIA+ community is beginning to be seen as a bigger part of society. According to livescience.com, a science driven website, 700,000 people in the United States currently identify as transgender, or a gender that is different from the one they were assigned at birth.

Whether or not that is the

exact amount is really hard to tell, because the Census Bureau does not address the fact that one may identify with something other than what they were born as. In short, at least .3 percent of the population is being discriminated against intentionally through bathrooms- more specifically, the lack of bathroom options for people in the transgender community.

As of April 19, 2016, the Target Corporation has chosen to stand with the federal Equality Act and offer options to both people of the cisgender (non-transgender) and transgender community. The backlash that followed this announcement apparently hasn't affected the company as a whole, though.

"To date we have not seen a material or measurable impact on our business," said Brian Cornell, Target CEO, in an interview with "Fortune" magazine.

What makes this so notable is the amount of "protesting" people are claiming to do because of this declaration of equality. Currently, the Amer-

ican Family Association has over 1.4 million people pledged to boycott Target Stores because of transgender equality. The AFA claims that this policy allows men to wander into restrooms to harass women and children, and also states that a unisex or family style bathroom is just as good enough for transgender people.

The claim that creepy men will be harassing women just because of this policy is an overreach. The amount of emotional, physical effort and stress it takes to publicly out oneself as transgender makes the chances quite low that a transgender person will harass others in the bathroom; why fight so hard to be treated as equals to have it taken away for bothering others in a restroom? As for unisex or family bathrooms, these types of restrooms just ostracize transgender people and make them feel as if they don't fit anywhere. How is one supposed to feel confident about their gender identity and self worth if they are not allowed to use their preferred bathroom because of the off chance an-

other person will think they're faking their gender?

Bathrooms that are separated by men and women are backwards nowadays. Not only does this not support equality, but also it enhances the details that create prejudices, aggressive behaviors and attitudes towards an already subjugated minority. The LGBTQIA+ community has taken great strides recently and is always working to further equality in society. It is the job of people outside of

this community to be accepting of differences and embrace social change so that future children and adults alike do not have to live in fear of harassment or unequal treatment due to age, race, sexual orientation, gender, gender identity, religion, ethnicity or anything else.

Bathrooms that do not restrict transgender people from using their preferred rest room is another step towards a more equal world.

Thankfully, if this is the case, the college offers some special faculty that can be utilized as resources to help support a student to succeed to the fullest potential. Within the Learning Assistance Center (LAC) located in the Bradner Library are faculty members ready to lend a hand. These members assist in a myriad of academic subjects and are coming together to form the team of Academic Success Coaches. They are here to help in areas such as Math, reading preparation, writing, science and to offer support to students on a mentor level as well.

"We have so many resources that are great here on campus. Getting students to take advantage of these resources so that they can be as successful as they can be is important. We are here to help and want to," said Ryan Lemasters, Faculty Facilitator and SASS Coordinator.

This team of Academic Success Coaches is comprised of six members who operate on main campus. These members are Niran Kheder, Terri Lamb, Ryan Lemasters, Nancy Anter, Dr. Carmen Wilson and Ryan Masters. Their services and skills are able to accommodate all students in a wide range of academic needs.

Niran Kheder is the Writing

Fellows Coordinator, Adjunct Assistant Professor and Special Projects Coordinator. Kheder personally as well as her trained Writing Fellow student staff offer writing review services for students. They can help students that are struggling with grammar usage, writing style, organization and basic mechanics, provide an opportunity for revisions and a fresh set of eyes to look at pre written assignments or labs.

Teri Lamb is the Mathematics Learning Specialist, **Tutor Program Coordinator** and Online Tutoring Program Coordinator. Lamb offers help with students that need math tutoring or prep for test skills as well as students seeking tutoring for online courses.

Ryan Lemasters is the Student Athletic Success Strategy Coordinator. Any student athletes that need assistance academically can talk to him or students facing academic referrals or suspensions as well. Lemasters also can help students with study skill strategies and stress management.

Nancy Anter is the Learning Specialist. Anter assists with helping students that need to help learning college reading and learning strategies, as well as students that work with alternative learning strategies for those with disabilities. She also offers test prep skills and helps runs test prep for the Test of Essential Academic Skills (TEAS) and the Michigan Test for Teacher Certification (MTTC) tests specifically.

Ryan Masters is the Univer-

sity Bound Coordinator that works in conjunction with Wayne State University. He can help students that want to transfer design a plan and set a course that they need to be on while at Schoolcraft that will set them up for advancement once they leave for another University.

Dr. Carmen Wilson is a Learning Specialist the also focuses on study skills, college reading and learning strategies. She offers test preparation in groups and one on one sessions as well.

"We are here to help. We not only care about students academically, we care about them on a personal level too. It's as simple as that," said Dr. Deborah Daiek, Dean of Education Programs and Learning Support.

All of these tutoring and

prep services are free to students. The Academic Success Coaches are here to help students not only review their work, or receive tutoring, but can also assist them with learning how to prepare for class and college learning. This then sets students up to use these skills for the future.

"I hope Schoolcraft students meet with an academic coach this semester to discover how students learn best, and then capitalize on that knowledge. It's better to start strong, with a concrete plan, rather than just show up to class and hope it works out. The college courses and support services are designed for student success. Students should understand that design, and use it to their academic advantage," said Nancy Anter, Faculty Facilitator.

All of these coaches are

willing to work with students and lead them on the path towards success. They also can put them in contact with the coaches one may need to focus on their specific areas of trouble. These mentors truly care about all students and want each one to be set up for accomplishing as much as they can.

It is best to start the year off strong by getting help early that is offered and have this support as students travel down their road towards achievement. SAGA works to better student life on campus

Schoolcraft has created SC Aware online which, in addition to being a tool to help take disciplinary action against students or faculty members who promote harassing behaviors, also allows one to submit a request for the college to reach out to someone who needs help or support. To use this tool, go to www.schoolcraft.edu and click on the SC Aware icon on the top of the screen.

"SAGA is not just for a certain group of people, it's for human beings regardless of sexuality and identity" said Manpreet Kaur, SAGA Public Relations.

The SAGA office hours range from 12 p.m. to 3:30 p.m. Monday through Thursday. The club time is still to be announced but meets in the conference offices in the

lower Watermen building. The club discusses gay issues in the community, participates in different activities, play games and plan events for both on and off campus activities during their meetings. Last year they also had weekly game nights, along with bonfires and a drag show.

" I really like the variety of different events that the club participates in, very welcoming atmosphere," said nursing student, Allison Walbrook.

For anyone who wants to be part of activities but cannot attend meetings, on Sept. 21 and 22 SAGA will have an informational table at Schooldaze where you can meet the current SAGA board members and learn more about the how to get involved with the club.

As for off campus activities, they will be partaking in the Aids Walk Detroit coming up on Sept. 25 and the Wellness fair on Oct. 10. The Aids Walk in Detroit provides financial support in HIV prevention, education and services for HIV positive individuals and the Wellness fair which is a fair that helps with mental health comprehension, along with the learning resources available.

"Hardwired... to Self-Destruct" Metallica Nov. 18



The men and women's cross country team hit the ground running under first year head coach Wright Wilson earlier this month. Despite having a small roster to begin the season and one returning sophomore, Caitlin Goyer, Wilson continues to recruit new faces to fill out his squad. Debuting earlier this month were three new freshmen men's run-

ners, Todd Kazlukas, Ibrahim Mourad and Eric Wikerwitz.

Kazlukas from Inter City Baptist school has showed potential in his first two cross country meets without having any prior experience in the sport before.

"I have no experience running cross country anywhere. In high school I played soccer, basketball and baseball. Without have any experience I think my team and I have done very well in the races so far," said Kazlukas.

The first two cross country meets this season were the Golden Grizzly Invitational at Oakland University in Rochester on Sept. 2 and the Tommy Titan Invitational at Cass Benton Park located in Northville on Sept. 10.

Making strides

On Saturday Sept. 10, the Ocelots ran a 5k in the women's race (3.1 miles) and a four mile in the men's. Caitlin Goyer ran the race in 24 minutes and 19 seconds. Goyer improved from last year by running 41 seconds faster in this year's invitational.

"The difference between this year and last year for me is that I know what to expect

On the men's side, Eric Wikerwitz finished in 23 minutes and 56 seconds and was the third best community college runner at the invitational. Todd Kazlukas finished his first cross country race in 26 minutes and one second and Mourad finished in 30 minutes and 26 seconds.

Golden opportunity

On Friday Sept. 2 the Schoolcraft Ocelots competed in the Golden Grizzly run at Oakland University. The women's race was a 4k (2.5 miles) and the men's race was a 6k (3.73 miles). Gover finished the race in 19 minutes and 25 seconds which was good enough to be in the top 50 and capture the 44 place for women's in the race.

For the Schoolcraft men two runners finished in the top 50 with times under 24 minutes. Kazalauskas finished in 43 place with a time of 23 minutes and 22 seconds. Wikewitz finished 34 place with a time of 21 minutes and 41 seconds.

First year coach Wright Wilson sees potential as the season moves on, "I think as the season progresses this team will get better with more practice and the weather being less humid. The humidity factor always plays a part in the early season."

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
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
