Virtual training system features cutting-edge training for law enforcement

Say hello to the new generation of law enforcement training.

The Firearms Training Center (FTC) has just put in a new, highly-realistic and thorough training program for trainees like no other before it. Being one of only a few in the entire U.S. and the first in the Midwest, the Fire Arms Training Simulator (F.A.T.S.) training runs the gamut of scenarios ranging from on-foot pursuit of suspects, transferring dangerous inmates in a prison, active shooters in a work or school environment and smaller

de-escalation scenarios to prevent heated arguments from turning into deadly situations.

This new training simulator offers a 300° realistic training experience in which multiple distractions such as dogs barking and onlookers can be introduced into the scenario.

This is done to improve the decision-making skills and judgement of all recruits in what Associate Dean-Public Safety Programs, Jerry Champagne, calls "a multi-tasking target-focus shooting environment" in which recruits are placed into "realistic scenarios involving decision-making skills with escalation and de-escalation use of

force decisions that may or may not require the use of fatal force."

The skills trainees are required to use includes verbal commands to control the situation and deescalate confrontational altercations when the use of force may not be required. With this training provided by the Public Safety Training Complex programs, trainees have the opportunity to learn the skills in an academic classroom setting, then apply what they've learned to a realistic, hands-on experience.

"Any mistakes made by the trainees during the practical training experiences can be immediately corrected before the trainee applies the skills in an actual on-the-job experience," Champagne assures.

The previous simulator consisted of a single, one-dimensional video screen based on 20-year-old technology similar to that of a VHS system. The new one is operated from newer high definition technology presented on a five-screen system that lets users simultaneously interact with multiple adversaries and distractions during the decision-making process involving the use of force.

Area 51 Raid Disappointing

This event, started as a joke, took place at the Area 51, a highly-classified USAF facility in Nevada. It was originally posted on Facebook June 27, 2019, where 2 million users were reported to be "going," with 1.5 million others "interested."

Despite the event's satirical nature, it had an effect on businesses both in local Lincoln county and in Nevada statewide, resulting in packed hotels and increases in local businesses.

Only 40 people attended, according to NPR. Only one arrest was made at the event, not for trespassing but for public urination.

Football-Bowling Hybrid Sport Takes off in Hamtramck

The Detroit area can lay claim to a new hybrid sport: fowling. Hamtramck resident Chris Hutt and his friends invented this sport while tailgating years ago at the Indianapolis 500 event.

Hutt owns a 34,000 square ft. facility which features 20 lanes, where players or teams try to be the first to knock down all 10 of their opponents' bowling pins by tossing one football from a distance of up to 48 feet; the opponents, in turn, must do the same.

Simple as it sounds, it is described as difficult to master.

Only 28 strikes have been achieved over the past +100,000 games played. Hutt, the sport's inventor, is looking to expand his "fowling empire," targeting major cities and college towns.

Farm Hosts Goat Yoga Class of 500 People

Florida farmers Debbie Canton, 56 and her husband Rob, 50 said more than 500 people and 110 goats are expected to participate in their attempt at a world record. Their farm, the Grady Goat Farm near Tampa Bay, is reporting full reservations as of this time, though they do have a waiting list.

This event is held as a fundraiser for the Global Offensive Against Trafficking, or "G.O.A.T." This project opposes human trafficking and sexual exploitation of children. It is run by the farmer's charity organization, the Grady Goat Foundation.

Henry Ford Health System: Are Fitness Trackers Really Helping?

Health coach Aimee Richardson from the Henry Ford Health System suggests that trackers may be sabotaging efforts to improve health. Her findings see most users ignoring data on the number of steps taken per week and miscalculating heart rate and sleep patterns on both low and high-end models. Her findings also see excessive fitness challenges due to data obsession, binging after 10,000 steps and lack of focus on exercise due to device distraction and working to excess due to eating disorders.

Richardson reminds the fitness-

oriented that their needs are not "one-size-fits-all."

While fitness trackers aren't dismissed entirely, Richardson suggests that "The best barometer of your health and fitness is how you feel. Listen to your body. Notice when you feel more energized and more depleted. Then alter your habits accordingly."

Statewide vaping ban earns blowback, critics cite harm to smokers and vape shops

Gov. Whitmer called for a ban on flavored e-cigarettes and other vaping products with nicotine nearly two weeks ago. This action rose from the declaration of a public health emergency by the state's top doctor, Chief Medical Executive Dr.

Joneigh Khaldun, after six people across the state died of respiratory illnesses linked to vaping. He states "Michigan is leading the effort nationwide to protect young people."

A legislative hearing in Lansing gave lawmakers and shop owners an opportunity to explain the consequences of Gov. Gretchen Whitmer's ban on flavored vape products, with critics saying "These flavors are now more often than not the first choice for smokers looking to make the switch to vaping [...] It will curtail supply, but it won't curtail demand and you can get even worse problems." Problems, other critics say, that are leading to potential vape customers reverting back to smoking cigarettes.

GM Workers on Strike

Following a trend of labor strikes across the U.S., over 50,000 GM plant workers across the Midwest and South go on strike over wage disputes and stopping operations at plants. Workers argue that keeping the plants open would be a key bargaining demand. GM execs say that the need to save money for investments into electric and self-driving cars is the reason why the company halted operations at three US plants — including the assembly line in Lordstown, Kentucky and announced plans to shut the Hamtramck plant, the last Detroit factory, early next year.

With little progress in talks between the UAW and GM, along with major corruption investigations looming over the former, GM and the UAW are far from reaching an agreement on wages, health care benefits, temporary employees, job security and profit sharing.

Actions involving the use of force by law enforcement officers are often analyzed and criticized in the media and by citizens after said events took place. For the legitimacy and professionalism of police agencies, it's important that recruits and established officers get regular professional development training to enhance both their decision-making skills to improve their professional response.

The simulator was developed by Meggitt Inc., a company that has worked with Schoolcraft before. Having developed the original firearm simulator that served the College for over 20 years, Meggitt has stood behind their equipment when warranty repairs were needed in the past. They've also made systems utilized by federal agencies throughout the country, making Meggitt a natural pick when the Public Safety program conducted their research for the replacement equipment.

The primary reason why the Firearms Training Center is so highly sought after by law enforcement trainers and recruits across the country is because its programs are served by the professional trainers involved in the curriculum and development of the students/trainees.

Having a new virtual training simulator provides an opportunity for multiple agencies across the country to enhance their firearms training at a centralized location in the Metro-Detroit area while participating in other training activities like driving and defensive tactics offered at the same location.

Jack Kent Cooke Transfer Scholorship now accepting applications

The largest undergraduate, private scholarship in the United States worth up to \$40,000 is up for grabs.

The Jack Kent Cooke Undergraduate Transfer Scholarship, the most competitive scholarship for community college students, is awarded annual to only 60 students out of thousands of applicants.

Those who are awarded can receive a maximum of \$40,000 per year of education the amount depending on the college the student attends and what their financial situation is, for two to three years.

The scholarship deadline is fast approaching with a deadline of Nov. 20 and those interested students shouldn't delay.

The process requires both academic information and financial documents from the student and parents, as well as two letters of recommendation by academic professionals (adviser, instructor or professor) who are well acquainted with the student's work and character. Finally, the application consists of multiple essay questions and require the applicant to write clear and grammaticallycorrect sentences, a stage that is often the most time-consuming for students. Laurie Kattuah-Snyder, JKC representative at Schoolcraft since 2010, is honored and excited about this year's applicant pool for the scholarship.

Since 2011, six Schoolcraft students were the recipients of

this award which have assisted them in continuing their education at four-year colleges.

Minimum criteria

Applicants must meet all the criteria to be eligible to qualify. Students must be a current student at an accredited U.S. community college or two-year institution with sophomore status as of Jan. 1, 2020, or a recent graduate (since spring 2015).

They must also plan to enroll in a full-time baccalaureate program at an accredited college or university in fall 2020 term and have a cumulative undergraduate GPA of 3.5 or better on a 4.0 scale or an equivalent. The average GPA of the 2019 Scholars was a 3.8.

A student should also be able to prove unmet financial need and have not previously enrolled at or attended a four-year institution. All applications must be received by Nov. 20. No late applications will be accepted.

"We will consider applicants with family income up to \$95,000," says Kattuah-Snyder. "Last year's cohort of new Undergraduate Transfer Scholarship recipients had a median family income of approximately \$28,000".

Scholarship benefits

Additional benefits of the scholarship include college planning support, ongoing advising and the opportunity to connect with the thriving community of fellow scholars are all offered. Students may use their scholarship at any regionally accredited college or

university across the U.S. and Schoolcraft students have used the scholarship to attend colleges in-state and out-of-state.

If a student does receive the JKC scholarship, it won't impact their current Schoolcraft financial aid. Their funds will be sent to the college or university the scholar is attending next year, in the fall 2020 term. Recipients will be notified in April if they have been granted the award.

The process in earning this

award is intense and rigorous for all who apply and see it through.

Students can apply on the JKC website if they want, but there is a much greater chance of success by scheduling an appointment first. Don't delay on applying for your chance at this prestigious scholarship.

Established in 1966, Phi Theta Kappa was created to honor high achieving students enrolled in a 2-year college. Since its birth, the organization has grown into a team of service-oriented leaders that have a goal of improving themselves and the world that they live in.

Today, it's no surprise that Schoolcraft's very own chapter of Phi Theta Kappa (PTK), Omicron Iota, has currently over 200 members. That isn't the only amazing feat that this chapter has accomplished. Omicron Iota is also considered to be the most active branch in the entire country through its community involvement in volunteering and research.

Requirements and benefits of membership

The only stipulations to become a member are that students are required to maintain a 3.5 GPA and must pay the \$110 membership fee. PTK certainly makes the investment worth it with a variety of transfer scholarships through an exclusive database called 'PTK Connect,' which provides students with more than \$37 million for over 750 colleges and universities. The organization also provides incoming members with a membership certificate, identification card and a special PTK designation on students' diplomas and transcripts as proof of membership.

According to Matthew Fular, President of Phi Theta Kappa Omicron Iota, the benefits of becoming a Phi Theta Kappa member are limitless.

"It shows commitment to your education and to making a difference in your community and requires very little in return. Besides your GPA, there are no other requirements."

As members, students are expected to uphold the Hallmarks of Phi Theta Kappa which are Service, Leadership, Fellowship and Scholarship. Thus, Fular encourages students to become actively engaged on campus and throughout the community.

"PTK also participates in two projects, Honors in Action (HIA) and College Project (CP) which work with Schoolcraft's marketing executives and Dr. Jeffress to improve the college. We're also conducting researching on the Opioid Crisis and its effects on the economy to see how we can help our community," commented Fular.

Types of membership

For students that are interested in joining the organization, they should know that there two membership opportunities available: general membership and 'Par Excellence' membership both of which require the student to pay a one-time fee of \$110. The difference between the two is that 'Par Excellence' allows for members to earn back a refund of \$35 following the completion of a 6-STAR program.

"Our Par Excellence membership is how our members can earn a \$35 refund to what they paid to join and the process by which they can earn their honors regalia for graduation. The benefit of this membership is that it shows consistent involvement in our chapter and dedication to

service-learning," states Fular.

STARS can be earned from any combination of volunteering, fundraising and assisting at campus events. The typical number of stars earned can vary, but students will typically earn ½ star for each hour of service and all six of them can be earned from fundraising a total of \$300.

When asked how becoming a member of the Omicron Iota chapter has benefitted her, former officer Carrie Ross replied "PTK gave me several opportunities to volunteer in the community and to meet new people. It's because of PTK that I met my two best friends and was able to grow as a student leader."

Professional and personal growth opportunities

Phi Theta Kappa also provides students with professional development to enhance the skills necessary for success in the workplace.

"These programs ease any anxiety that young adults face about their careers because many are nervous when it comes to the unknown. 'Employment Edge' provides a realistic demonstration of what students can expect in their career, regardless of what field they enter," Fular commented.



Just two years after the release of his 45-track double album (now 57 deluxe edition), "Heartbreak on A Full Moon" (HOAFM), Chris Brown is returns with his ninth studio album "Indigo."

Similar to "HOAFM," Brown decides yet again to bless or overload, (depending on what kind of fan/listener you are) with a 32-track double album on "Indigo." Unlike Breezy's previous double album project, "Indigo" isn't as lengthy, but still requires

listeners to set aside some time in their day (life), to truly enjoy and even internalize what, the album is about, as well as what he has to say this time around.

Unlike "Heartbreak on A Full Moon" which had a bit more of a darker/sorrowful tone, "Indigo" opts for a brighter and happier tone filled with light.

Back in January on an Instagram post, Brown stated that "THIS "INDIGO" ALBUM IS ABOUT ENERGY, LOVE, LIGHT and HAPPINESS", and as he described "Indigo" is simply just that. The album is filled with nothing but colorful anthems that while at times can sound repetitive (content wise), still hold up sonically and can be enjoyed.

The album starts off with the

high/turnt up energetic selftitled track "Indigo," a song that finds Brown singing about different bright colors, and "spiritual" connotations. On the chorus Brown sings "Green rolled up in leaves, Yellow mood ring, Purple light like a beam, I dream in indigo." On another chorus he sings "Open my third eye, that's my baby she woke."

Moreover, this track is essentially about Brown being in touch with the spiritual and physical realm (woke) while being connected to a girl that is also the same as him, enhancing each other's frequencies.

The second track "Back to Love" is ultimately about the ups and downs about love or "pure" love as Genius lyrics describes it. Brown finds himself wanting to be the better version of himself and promising to keep putting his best foot forward.

Throughout the course of the track also finds Breezy often sprinkles innuendos within the color and spiritual themed tracks. Songs such as "Indigo," "Emerald/Burgundy" (feat Juvenile and Juicy J), and "Natural Disaster/Aura" exemplify this, especially on "Emerald" where he states,

"I just wanna realign your chakras, Baby, I'ma make you feel it in your body."

What makes "Indigo" different compared to previous projects isn't just the features this time around, but rather the theme of the album as well as the sampling and production. It can be implied or rather it is implied that the title of the album came from Brown researching "Indigo Children."

On Genius lyrics according to Lonerwolf, an indigo child is "a person who has come into this world destined to create change and spiritually awaken humanity. Indigo children are considered to be freethinkers with profound insight into the human condition and an ability to see the truth clearly."

"Indigo" boasts an impressive list of star-studded features, all of which who have collaborated with Chris in the past, or is there first time collaborating with the music icon. H.E.R (Come Together), Lil Jon (Temporary Lover), Gunna (Heat), Justin Bieber (Don't Check on Me feat. Ink), Trey Songz (Sexy), Drake (No Guidance- the two have never collaborated before the release), and more.

Overall "Indigo" is a bright, colorful, playful and even deep (if you dig hard enough behind the meaning) that once again showcases Breezy's raw talent as an artist. Much like "HOAFM," "Indigo" gives fans a taste of Brown's musical dimensions. From his rap, top pop, to R&B, to even dancehall, every side Breezy can be explored on this album

From a thousand derelict monuments of a thousand dead civilizations, to crumbling landscapes and oppressive institutions, there is born a story that is centralized around a single monolithic character: "You."

N. K. Jemisin's "The Fifth Season" is the initial book in her "Broken Earth" trilogy, a work of bleak fantasy presented in one of the unique modes of storytelling out there - second person perspective - with a vibrant selection of characters and themes of oppression, perseverance and identity.

The story takes place on a continent called the Stillness - quite the ironic name, given that

it's ever-changing landscape of neurotic fault lines. Tremors rattle the earth with the frequency of afternoon rain showers and towns are decimated at the frequency of power outages during a storm. But lately, things have been getting worse. The common folk think it to be just another "Fifth Season," or just another years long period of near-apocalyptic levels of environmental instability. However, there exists a people attuned to the earth and her tremors, the Orogenes, the Roggas, who know that this will be the last time the world will end.

The book begins by introducing the reader to themselves as the protagonist saying, "You are she. She is you. You are Essun. Remember? The woman whose son is dead."

The narrative follows Essun, one of the aforementioned Orogenes, who are used and abused for their ability to listen to and influence tremors, and has been living in hiding from her morbid past for many years.

Her newly established status quo is swiftly shattered when she finds her son dead at home, with her husband and daughter missing. After a dayslong period of an anguish-stricken stupor, she decides to go after her husband, retrieve her daughter and avenge her son.

The book doesn't always lean on the second person perspective. It also follows Damaya, a child who is just discovered as an Orogene, and Syenite, a young Orogene who comes under the guidance of a very odd and powerful mentor, with whom she travels with and



through whom she acquaints herself with the world and its horrors. Her mentor is Alabaster, an Orogene bred for raw power and a man broken by the truths of his people's suffering.

The Fifth Season explores oppression and liberation, in all their dirty details and grimy

consequences; but most of all, how tall an order, how high a price paid is justifiable for a race's freedom.

In a nutshell, N. K. Jemisin's "The Fifth Season" is an excellent read, with a colorful array of three-dimensional characters and a plot that has thought and purpose.

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LEARNING SUPPORT SERVICES Success Starts Here

Dear Writing Support Studio. I am reaching out because I struggle to format my ideas while using an organizational pattern. Though I am able to express my ideas and make many statements which pertain to the prompt of the essay throughout my body of writing, I feel as though my arguments would be far stronger if I were able to develop each individual idea more fully. I tend to include several topics in one paragraph, whether I

am aware of the fact that I am doing this or not. How might I best be able to halt the tendency of my thoughts to wander on paper?
Thank you,

Dear Thoughtful Student, Perhaps the most effective means of countering this tendency to include too much information will take place during the prewriting stages. In fact, it is arguable that the prewriting phase of the development of an essay, rather than the drafting phase, is where the most time is ideally spent. Upon conducting initial background research on a topic in order to come to an understanding of

the topic, freewriting in conjunction with different brainstorming techniques provides the means by which a writer is able to group ideas according to how they should best appear in their essay. There are several ways to build the foundation of an essay. However, an informed freewriting session in which the writer sets aside any preconceived notions about the quality of their writing is sowing the seeds from which idea development can be reaped. If one has briefly researched the topic on which they are to write, then a focused freewriting session of even just ten minutes is often very effective in terms of putting ideas about the topic on paper.

The objective of this is to write as many thoughts down as possible, so long as they are in some way pertinent to the prompt, during the duration of this time. There is no room for any concern about organizational form during this time. There is no room for any judgments. Ideas are not to be wrestled with during this activity; they are to be embraced. After having completed the freewriting stage, an individual is ready to begin to organize and develop what they find to be useful from the endeavor. Different brainstorming techniques are more effective for different types of learners. If a writer tends to think on a pointby-point basis, then lists and outlines can be an

effective way to develop their thoughts. If a writer tends to connect ideas more strongly through visual techniques, then an idea map is always a fantastic option. These brainstorming techniques allow a writer to identify the function that each individual idea will serve within their paper whether it is a statement, an illustration of a point, or an explanation on the relevance of that illustration.
