Reality Ready

Schoolcraft and Phi Theta Kappa partner to prepare students for the workforce

Ready or not, Ocelots are preparing to pounce into reality as they enter into the workforce. Phi Theta Kappa (PTK), as their College Project for the 2019-2020 school, have partnered with the college in hosting a series of events which include guest speakers in various career fields in order to prepare students as they enter into the workforce. It is the hope of the college as well as PTK that those students who attend these events will have an easier transition into the process of getting an internship, job or transferring to a four-year university.

"Reality Ready $^{\text{TM}}$ is a certification program that helps Schoolcraft students win in the workforce," states college President Conway A. Jeffress. "We equip our students with intellectual and behavioral skills that result in a well-rounded individual that employers are seeking."

Since the fall 2019 semester, PTK has hosted a series of "Reality ReadyTM guest speakers including Jackie Charniga, Finance & Insurance Reporter for Automotive News; Helen Ditouras, English & Humanities professor at Schoolcraft College; and Roger Fox, Director of Respiratory Therapy Services for the CIENA Group. These events, along with those planned for the

winter semester, will lead up to the launch of a pilot program and a one-day summit, set to be held in April.

"We are looking to launch a pilot program with its first cohort April 3," Jeffress commented. "The pilot program of Reality ReadyTM will focus on: communications (personally and professionally); emotional intelligence; conflict resolution/problem-solving; and professionalism and networking where students can walk away with four to five tangible items where they can implement right away," he concludes.

Moreover, in their endeavors to assist students, PTK made it priority to provide speakers with practical experience in different areas of the career field whether it be medical or business.

"We researched and came up with the fact that so many people are going into the workforce lacking the necessary soft skills needed to excel," states Patrick Long. Vice President of Phi Theta Kappa. "We wanted to create a series of speakers that would come into talk to students about what they need to be prepared and that would focus on each career area."

Guest speakers are planned to be scheduled throughout the winter semester and students are encouraged to take advantage of these free sessions, which provide them with additional preparation to begin their career

or next step of their future as they begin the transfer process or approach graduation.

Enough Money to Fix the Damn Roads?

An important survey of 600 Michigan voters was taken in a Jan. 14 to 18 by Glengariff Group for the Detroit Regional Chamber on the question of funding road construction. The poll said that 53 percent of voters say there's enough money to fix the roads, with 47 percent being more likely to support an increase to road revenue on one condition: if the administration of the road funds was entrusted to local governments and not state government. The poll has a margin of error of plus or minus 4 percent, according to the Detroit News.

Governor Whitmer's proposal last year to increase the 26.3-cents-a-gallon gas tax by 45 cents was shot down by GOP legislative leaders when they sent the governor a budget that allocated existing funds from other departments for a one-time \$375 million payment toward roads, which the governor vetoed. This poll reflects the continued difficulty of state leaders to make solid arguments regarding the need for new road revenue.

GLOBAL Coronavirus Spreads from

A new coronavirus was identified in Wuhan, China after victims developed pneumonia without a clear cause. This virus, designated as the Novel coronavirus (2019-nCoV), has not been conquered by current vaccines or treatments. It has also shown evidence of human-to-human transmission

and its rate of infection had escalated in mid-January, infecting over 30,000 and claiming the lives of around 600 people.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), "While the immediate risk of this new virus to the American public is believed to be low at this time, everyone can do their part to help us respond to this emerging public health threat."



"This center will allow for rotations to students in physical therapy, exercise science and strengthening and conditioning," explains Shannon Striebich, President at St. Joseph Mercy Oakland. "Our membership has increased by over 60 percent since our partnership with Schoolcraft College began and the St. Joe's Sport Dome opened in 2017," states Ed McCarthy, Executive Director of Michigan Wolves Soccer Club. "The facilities, perfectly located here on the campus of Schoolcraft College, have allowed us to maximize player development by providing the majority of our training and games at a single location with exceptional quality."

The development of the St. Joe's Mercy Elite Sports Center is a steadfast continuation of the synergetic partnership that Schoolcraft strives to uphold with the community and the betterment of its students.

"I think we can expect some great things, not only for our own students, but for those youngsters who are part of these organizations to learn about these sports and to develop the skills giving them opportunities to excel in the future," states college President Conway A. Jeffress.

What once was just a dream became a reality for Wilborn. He got his chance to appear on the show after taking part in an audition held in Detroit. His episode aired Dec. 31, although he entered the audition event this past May, got the audition in June, and shot the episode in September where he delivered an impressive performance, even managing to correctly answer three consecutive puzzles during the triple toss up, buzzing in before his competitors had time to react.

"I think I was more excited than nervous, but I will admit to being somewhat nervous as I got to set. Wheel of Fortune is something I'd wanted to do ever since I was a kid, so by the time I got to the taping date, I was just ready to go for it," explained Wilborn. 

Rising S.T.A.R.S.

Mentoring program helps first-generation college students

First-year students, particularly those who are the first in their families to go to college, have been given a gift courtesy of Academic Success Coaches Dr. Carmen Wilson and professor Ali Pavlicek. This gift is the Scholars Taking Off Academically & Rising to Success (S.T.A.R.S.) Mentoring Program.

Designed to support a new student's transition from high school to college, S.T.A.R.S.'s goals are academic and personal enrichment, developing career and transfer ready skills, building a social network (and) transformational learning experiences within a robust and all-inclusive program.

S.T.A.R.S. is accomplishing this by helping first-generation students navigate through college, know their resources on campus and equip them with life skills that will serve them during and after college while a positive impact. Coaches will help students with their challenges and life outside of campus while also challenging them to listen, participate and be risk-takers, advising them on topics such as career exploration, picking a major or program, course selection and transfer planning to a university.

While they're here at Schoolcraft, students get access to resources from Learning Support Services like peer tutoring and writing support, workshops to prepare them for exams and skills coaching in whatever they're struggling with academically.

"We want to find a way of embracing everybody," said Dr. Wilson. "These students may not have the requisite knowledge that other folks who had parents or siblings that have attended college did. That was the emphasis for creating S.T.A.R.S."

Students are formed according to the program's four pillars: Service Learning, Social Engagement, Academic Success and Leadership Development, each pillar covering different topics each semester.

Leadership is given extra consideration, as it is each student's traits as a leader which earned their acceptance into the program. After they engage in the year's leadership opportunities and develop their skills, students will have the opportunity to become a peer mentor when they finish their first year in S.T.A.R.S.

Once accepted into the program, students must commit to S.T.A.R.S.' expectations and program requirements. They must agree to a full year's commitment, maintain a GPA of 2.0 or above, complete CAB 201 over the summer before their first semester, attend the program's Family and Friends Orientation, attend kick-off meetings and closing celebrations at the start and end of each semester, attend five group activities each semester and uphold the student code of conduct.

Key to each student's success is their relationship with their academic advisor, with whom they'll develop an Academic Success plan and update it over the course of both semesters. Students will be required to attend biweekly check-ins with their Academic Success Coach and respond to communications with them, complete two Service-Learning Friday events in both the fall and winter semester as well as complete Academic Advising sessions for the summer, fall and winter semesters.

Since her graduation in 2000, Reva Constantine-Smith has never forgotten her own slice of humble pie, beginning that would ultimately lead to her becoming an executive chef at Great Lakes Culinary Center in Southfield.

"Growing up, I spent most of my time with my mom," 40-yearold alumnus. Reva Constantine-Smith states. "She was an excellent cook and I always loved being in the kitchen learning

from her and watching the Food Network channel with together."

With her memorable upbringing at home, transferring to a second high school and attending a vocational school with a culinary program, Constantine-Smith began to dream of a career as a chef and began searching for where she was to earn her education.

Similar to many culinary professionals born from Schoolcraft College, she was attracted to its reputation of having multiple Master Chefs and the multitude of

scholarships available to incoming students. According to Constantine-Smith, the small class sizes and layout of the former Waterman Wing allowed for a great sense of camaraderie within the student body, especially since everyone knew one another. KAYTRADANA is a Hatian-Canadian artist, producer and DJ whose newest album, BUBBA, is more than the common hodgepodge of shallow and colorless tracks that many releases are taken to be. As it turns out, it's a brilliant assemblage of tremendously thoughtful songs that each tackle their own theme with their own unique sonic flavor while using the same, unifying aural template.

First comes the VibeTM, for lack of a better word. It's the first thing that hits the listener. Each track bears a similar laid-back thrum of bass driving it forward, with vocal features from scads of other artists dancing atop this fortifying throb, riding the waves. Each one of these voices lends their own signature to their respective song, and when combined with

beats and rhythms created from a twisted variation of that same central VibeTM, they give each one an auditory identity of their own.

For instance, take BUBBA's determinative track, "Midsection". As the final song of the album, it's a bit different from the rest, being a bit faster, with more of a bouncy, Bob Marley-ish sort of sound sprouting from it. This is a song about Humanity, in all of her variations, and how those differences, bearing their own individual beauties, can unify into something all the more wondrous.

It mainly focuses on issues that have mired societies, though gender disparity is really the seed from which this grew.

At the end of every verse, the tone changes to be higher and more ethereal. This happens as visiting vocalist Pharrell Williams switches from talking directly to the audience, to talking about "her," a female figure likely representative of all womankind. Each verse ends with "I see power when I see her midsection". Now on its own, that may seem as just a run-of-the-mill sexual line, but in the song's context of the streets bring crowded pleas to talk "about it".

Though, all in all, KAYTRANADA's BUBBA, regardless of thoughtfulness, is a fantastic album for everyone who's looking to pass the vibe check.







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That one special day

Almost instinctively we place them into categories or put labels on them according to what the world has termed "acceptable" or "the norm." We do this without failure to see the long-term impact it has on

Fixing to save lives before appearance

From discovering the double helix and recreating DNA inside a test tube for the first time in the 1950s to having the first human CRISPR treatment for Sickle Cell Anemia and Beta-thalassemia in 2018, genetics has come a long way in finding how vital

the unit is to life and what conditions can arise with mistakes in the simple, four-letter coding system.

Through the rapid expansion of our knowledge in the field and the creation of new therapies to attempt fixing these conditions, many ethical inquiries have come to surface in regard to the circumstances in which genetic modification should be permitted. However, with the reality of this practice in mind, it's safe to say that genetic modification is still in its trial period. Therefore. it should be limited to medicinal purposes due to the urgency of finding treatments and cures to genetically influenced and fatal diseases.

According to the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation, the recessively inherited disease is caused by a mutated trans-membrane conductance regulator protein, known as CFTR for short. The mutation causes its intended protein to function improperly primarily in the lungs and leads to infection due to the imbalance of salt and fluids transferring between cells. This fluid imbalance can develop into a thickened mucus that blocks the pancreatic ducts and affects digestive enzymes secreted by the organ.

As stated by the University of Rochester, about 35 out of 100 people with CF get CF-related diabetes in their 20s. Moreover, more than 40 out of 100 people with CF get CF-related diabetes after age 30.

With more than 10 million people carrying the gene for this disease, it's a realistic idea to consider genetically modifying the genes of carriers and those already living with the condition to improve and lengthen their lives.

Similarly, a mutation in the HEXA gene causes Tay-Sachs. This disease prevents an important enzyme from being produced in the lysosomes and causes toxic, lipid substances to accumulate in the brain and spinal cord. The condition progressively worsens with

age and causes blindness, deafness and deterioration in neuromuscular abilities. According to the National Institute of Neurological Disorders and Stroke, this condition will display symptoms around six months of age and children usually don't live past 4 years old.

Through the science of these conditions, it's evident that the practice of genetic engineering and modification is necessary to gain an understanding of conditions we know little about or better yet, those we don't know how to cure. Thus, the emphasis of this alternative treatment being solely for medicinal purpose to do what the field does best, save lives.

One world, one family

Deafening blasts shake my makeshift shelter. The walls of my chest rattle along with the walls of this house; my heart, pounding so fast it might jump out of my body. I thought I would get used to the constant barrage of war, but I guess accepting the probability of death wouldn't be humane. The roar of war subsides so I rush outside to see if I can help. Destruction surrounds me, the city I once knew, now a pile of rubble.

Corpses litter the street; I ignore their faces- afraid I may see someone I know.

Children crying for their mothers, lovers separated by death, and screams of loss all create a ghastly melody of war.

This past January I attended a youth congress where 400 youth from over 56 countries came together to discuss issues facing our countries, ways to improve international dialogue and end biases. We attended lectures from leaders in the

field, discussion forums and presentations about the reality of life in different countries. However, it wasn't these organized activities that left the biggest impact on me, but a conversation I had on a bus; a conversation started with a simple question: "Why do you look sad sometimes?"

It came from behind me, by a man from Syria. At first, I was taken aback by his straightforward question, but I answered honestly, saying that I was a bit sick and a bit sad. I later realized that my pain in that moment was nothing compared to what this man lived through. I would not be able to understand even a fraction

of the type of suffering he and other youths from Syria on the trip with me had experienced.

We talked for what seemed like hours, every detail of the reality in Syria becoming clearer and clearer.

Despite what this man and his fellow Syrians had lived through, their spirit inspired everyone on the bus. With constant singing and dancing as we moved from destination to destination, the joy radiating from these people seemed to contradict their violent reality at home.

Of course, we hear about conflicts in the Middle East every day in the news, but I realized that I had become so desensitized to what I see that I stopped thinking about the victims. It was so easy for me to watch the

news and think "oh so sad," and then turn it off and continue with my safe and comfy life. In the meantime, people living in the reality of war are being tortured and brutally murdered. It wasn't until I myself saw the consequences that I became more compassionate to a world outside of my own.

Now, as I sit in my comfortable surroundings, with relatively few fears. I think about their reality and the reality for so many living in difficult situations. When I see the news today, it is through different eyes. It may seem too far away to impact me personally, but that is just an illusion. The fall of cinema

We all know Star Wars. right? Originally a vision of George Lucas, with the Force, Light versus Dark. Jedi versus Sith. all centered around the Skywalkers: good boy turns into a bad boy, kills all the Jedi and has an unknown son and daughter who end up saving the galaxy from him and his master? A "Prequel" trilogy about the good boy turned bad, and a so-called "Original" trilogy about the son and daughter's escapades? Yeah that one.

Even though the prequels have always been

controversial for their overall quality, there's no denying the flowing continuity of these first six movies' narrative. It was the vision of George Lucas, a director with an unusual amount of control over each of his movies, led by his own passions. But people *really* hated the prequels, so much so that he sold the rights to Star Wars to Disney. And what a job they've done.

Since their acquisition of all things Lucas, Disney has shown little preparedness for their resolving trilogy of the Skywalker Saga, not because they are maligned toward viewers or creators, but because of a mass cultural shift in the entertainment industry within the last few decades.

Things have become less like artists creating beautiful things for people's enjoyment, and more like the sterile manufacturing of a shiny product to sell to consumers. The age of the so-called "Original Trilogy" is a more expressive climate than the one we live in now.

Disney has seemingly perfected their cinematic money-making formula since acquiring not only Lucas film but other studios as well. Unlike the times of old, where all creative types had quite a few artistic liberties, in the current age Disney has every decision run through the world's largest bureaucratic Brita Filter; whatever the people up top don't like must be changed. and vice versa. All of the creatives are simply tools to be used, factory workers crafting one great, milliondollar product.

Don't worry, Disney isn't the only one to use this method. DC has been a prime example of this tight leash on creators from the very beginning.

"Justice League" is a famous case, where Zach Snyder was booted from directing the movie after filming, giving Joss Whedon the helm for post-production. The resulting movie was an odd Frankenstein's Monster of creative visionary signatures, one that didn't sit well with critics and moviegoers alike. The movie was plagued with disorienting pacing, shallow characters and preposterous plot. It was the kind of increasingly popular movie that suffers from the same sort of postproduction manglement by the order of some executive.

Dear Writing Support Studio. Oftentimes, when I have finally completed the draft of a given paper, upon reviewing it I find that the ideas lack a sense of unity. Sometimes, the ideas in the paper connect very minimally and I feel as though I have not proven my main point. I would like to be able to write longer, more complete paragraphs that actually add coherence to my writing. Do you happen to have any tips? Sincerely,

An Unstructured Writer

Dear Unstructured Writer, To truly come to a better understanding of any topic, one has to put its components in the format where the ideas are the most digestible for them. Though a proper mindset is the indispensable tool all writers are capable of using, the ability to smoothly transition between paragraphs by using phrases is always helpful in keeping readers' attentiveness. The two primary means for doing this include highlighting the order of the ideas and showing the relationship between a newly introduced idea and the one that was addressed immediately prior to it. There are plenty of available transitional phrases, but it can be good to add entire clauses that provide context in lieu of the information the paper has already shared. Each paragraph has a job to do in order to prove the paper's

paragraph, one can ask the following questions: How does this point help me to prove the thesis of my paper? Is this point related to any of the other ideas that I have put forth? How so? There are far more questions that can be posited about the ideas in an essay than most writers assume. Outside of transitions and interrelatedness, there are three key sections that are present in the standard paragraph. These include making a point, illustrating that point, and explaining that point. A writer's point is their point that they have formulated based on the research they have done. The point is an expansion of the thesis. It is one of the reasons why the thesis is true, and illustrations are the ideas that show why the point of a given paragraph is true. Effective illustrations include research summaries, statistics, and quotations. The third portion of the paragraph, or the explanatory portion, serves to show how those illustrations help to prove the paragraph's main point. It shows how the evidence proves the point is valid, as well as what the point means for the paper's thesis as a whole. Always be sure each sentence is playing a clear role in its respective paragraph. This is an especially important goal during the revising stage, and one reason why that stage of an essay's completion is crucial for making your paper the best it can be! 
