Culinary Arts student Austin Hannah wins silver in national competition

Austin Hannah has been surrounded by cooking all his life. With a mother who would cook big, elaborate meals for the holidays, and a grandmother who was always baking, it's no surprise that he would soon become an accomplished cook himself. Now with a silver medal in the National Student Chef of the Year

Competition, Hannah has gone a long way since his days of high school where this future chef found his calling.

"I didn't really find cooking until my junior year of high school at Saline. They offered a culinary program that was run by Sam Musto, who is also an instructor at Schoolcraft," Hannah explains. "I got into it my sophomore year and that was when I met chef Polly Brown. She worked underneath

him. I just started cooking for fun and it was just something that I was wanting to learn how to do just for life purposes."

Hannah was already a competitive student in high school, participating in sports such as football, basketball, track and ultimate frisbee, so cooking served as another outlet to showcase his skills.



With the support of these individuals as well as Schoolcraft Culinary instructors Chef Shawn Loving, Brian Beland and Chris Misiak along with his family and fiance at his side, Hannah feels lucky in that he has so much support. It was this support group that helped him arrive at a local ACF (American Culinary Federation) competition, nominated by Chef Loving in 2019. Hannah would go on to win the competition and as a result was titled Regional Student Chef of the Year. With this accomplishment, National Student Chef of the Year was now in his sights.

In August 2021, Hannah found himself at the national competition held in Orlando, Florida, from Aug. 2-5 an event sponsored by the American Culinary Foundation (ACF). Competing in the Hot Foods division, he endured a two-hour competition consisting of a market basket filled with proteins such as lobster, flat iron scallops and pancetta. On top of this, Hannah also worked with several vegetables and starches. Every ingredient was required to be utilized in

dishes. The judges also based their verdicts off of professionalism, competency, taste and flavors, sanitation and techniques.

As a result of Hannah's skill in the kitchen, he was awarded second place overall (the silver medal) in the competition which made him the best Hot Food candidate and best out of the other 8 competitors in his category.

"You feel like a winner, no matter what," states Hannah. "You walk away from the whole experience learning such a great deal and you can't help, but walk away feeling like a winner. I feel like I placed first to be completely honest. I took away more from that than I think anyone else could have."

Experience is the bottom line for Hannah. He believes that even if he had won nothing he would be just as happy due to the honor and knowledge gained from participating in the event. He also knows how difficult breaking into cooking as a career can be for newcomers and veterans alike of the art.

"I think that for those who are

coming into the culinary program and aren't sure exactly where this is going to lead them, but if they want to be a chef, I just always encourage them to go for it, put yourself out there, make yourself uncomfortable, go through those certifications."

Hannah views these certifications as vital when it comes to learning the craft. They are a controversial topic wherein many opinions differ on their effectiveness and utility, but for Hannah, having Chef Loving as a mentor has cemented his trust in them.

"The culinary industry is this giant wave and there's so many people. There are so many restaurants. So there's this giant wave of just cooks, but only so many. There can only be so many surfers on this wave." Hannah views this as a way to be distinguishable from other chefs.

Well on the way to mastering his craft. Hannah continues to hone his skills when it comes to all things cooking and plans to pursue more competitions such as this one in the future.

To download this free app and read stories related to the Schoolcraft community, visit either the App Store for Apple devices or the Google Play for Android devices, type "College News Source," into the search bar and then download the app.

Once installed, click on it and search "Schoolcraft" into the search bar. After finding the college, a prompt will pop up asking whether the user would like push notifications tol be displayed when a new story is posted. This option can be changed later and can also be adjusted so notifications will only be sent out

for certain writers or sections.

After selecting an option, the Connection front page will become the homepage for the app and will appear whenever it is launched.

Fitness Center and Campus Recreation services offer up activities for every fitness level

Many things have changed and adapted since students have last stepped on campus. Chief among them being the large building that has been under construction by St. Joe's Sports Dome has now been completed and serves as the Mercy Elite Sports Center (ESC). As students continue to return to campus, things are slowly beginning to go back to normal, but there are still

some new things to look out for.

Schoolcraft College's Fitness Center has several new features and events planned for the upcoming semester just waiting for students, staff, faculty and community members to participate in.

When asked what there was for students to do at the center, **Director of Recreation Services Patty** Donohue-Ebach stated that there's something for everyone.

"We just really want people to know we're here, we're open and they should come over and check us out and get involved. FREE for all credit students-just have to enroll as a member to enjoy all the benefits!"

The Fitness Center offers a fully stocked free-weight area with total body strength and cardio equipment for any exercise needs along with a walking track in the Mercy Elite Sport Center Building and full locker room and towel service.

The effects that COVID held over the safety of businesses and institutions resulted in the hours the center operated to be reduced so that students, staff and attendees could remain safe, but the Fitness Center is now back open seven days a week. Hours of operation are: Monday-Thursday, 7 a.m.-9 p.m., Fridays from 7 a.m.-6 p.m., Saturday & Sunday from 8 a.m.-1 p.m.

On top of this, several sport activities are available for visitors to participate in and lose that extra COVID weight.

Open Lap Swim

Need to practice that backstroke? Students can cool down by taking an open lap swim from 12-1 p.m. Monday through Friday. Free for Fitness Center members, credit students, PPL students, faculty and staff. Other visitors can use the



facility for just a \$5 drop-in fee.

Racquetball and Wallyball

Need to practice that topspin? Visitors can reserve and rent a court for racquetball or wallyball games. Hours of operation are Monday through Thursday 7:30 a.m. to 9 p.m; Friday 7:30 a.m. to 6 p.m. and weekends 8:30 a.m. to 1 p.m. These services are free of charge for Fitness Center members credit students. faculty and staff every day until 3 p.m. and weekends. Contact the Fitness Center front desk to reserve your court. Drop-in charge of \$5 per person for a 90 minute period for all others.

Open Volleyball

Ready for a serve? Open volleyballis now available in the ESC so get out on those courts and at the following times: Monday, Wednesday, Friday 9-11:30 a.m., 12-2:30 p.m. Monday, Thursday 6:30-8:30 p.m. Credit students are free; all others must pay \$5 per player for the 2.5 hour period.

Open Basketball

Get those bank shots from halfcourt! Open basketball is now available Monday and Thursday nights from 7-9:30 p.m. and Wednesdays and Fridays at 11:30 a.m.-1 p.m. in the main gym in the Physical Education building main gym. This service is for free for Fitness Center members and credit students. All others are required to pay a \$5 drop-in fee.

Pickleball

How about the ever so popular game of Pickleball. Hours of operation are Monday through Friday 8 to 10 a.m., 10 a.m. to noon and noon to 2 p.m. A fee of \$8 per player per two hour block is required to play. To reserve a court, contact the Fitness Center by 7 a.m.

ESC Track

Run for the hills! The track in the Sports Center is open all the hours that the Fitness Center is operational during, Visitors may go for a walk, jog, run or anything in between. All in a comfortable, temperature controlled environment. Seven laps around the track equals one mile.

"Everyone there is very friendly and very accepting to people of all walks of life," Accounting major Matt Karbownik states. "The equipment and other gear supplied at this facility is very good and worth using to get the best results for your workouts and definitely is worth getting a membership for." He also compliments the staff for keeping the facility and equipment sanitary with all the proper care needed. He cites this as a reason why a membership at the center is very valuable and worthwhile.

That's not where the fun stops either.

Look out for special events hosted by the Fitness Center throughout the semester. One such event is "Fitness Center After Hours" which will be held Sept. 30 from 8-10 p.m. For a \$5 entrance fee, visitors will have opportunities to enjoy refreshments, an open fitness floor, volleyball, dodgeball, basketball, wallyball, and a raffle. Not only is this a perfect return to campus, but attendees may meet up with their friends or meet new ones to create some memories.

The Schoolcraft Fitness Center provides the perfect habitat for Ocelots to roam in their free time. There are many activities to pursue and things to see. Whether waiting for a class to begin, or looking to blow off steam, the Schoolcraft Fitness Center is the perfect place to be.

Annual Pageturners Book Club releases fall semester selections



Leading off the semester's book




selection for September is "Notes of a Native Son" by James Baldwin. This book is a set of personal essays from Baldwin detailing his experiences in his twenties

October: "Human Rights: A Very Short Introduction"


October's book selection is "Human Rights: A Very Short Introduction" by Andrew Clapham.

Many know this has been a problem long before even the original colonies ran ashore; many also know of racism's more notorious footnotes - slavery, emancipation and the Civil Rights movement with its laws and assassinations that came forthwith. While the history of racism's blood and law is well-known, we don't often learn of the history of its dialogue; one such historical bookmark is Native Son, a book released in 1940 about the fear that is instilled by systematic racism, and the following consequences of that fear.

The story stars Bigger Thomas as the main character; he's a young black man 20 years of age living with his mother, brother and sister in a single-room apartment in the South of Chicago. He's known as a bit of a troublemaker, picking fights and stealing; deep down he expects himself to get arrested, or even executed, for one thing or another. Against his recalcitrant personality, he's forced to take a new job he's not too keen

on since he's the only member of his family old and able enough to work; he begrudgingly goes to work as a chauffeur for an affluent white family who think themselves charitable for hiring him. Unfortunately, not even a full 24 hours into his new job goes by before things go horribly wrong; in a moment of sheer panic he ends up accidentally murdering a young white woman. From that moment onward, he follows the anger and fear within himself to try to save his skin.

For a story published in 1940, the images depicted therein are surprisingly sharp; graphic murder, sexual assault, and portrayals of several prejudices present during the time warrant that this book is not for those in pursuit of fun or amusement. Native Son is neither of these things; it may be a work of fiction, but it was heavily inspired by the experiences of its late author Richard Wright.

Wright was a Black man himself, growing up abused, in many homes and with sparse schooling; regardless of all of this he came to be an autodidact of sorts - someone who's educated themselves independently, without a teacher or formal education.

Of the many things Wright had

experienced, a few key things made their way into his works; violence, politics and religion. Violence, because of how much he experienced, and not only the physical sort, but verbal and rhetorical as well, kinds that may not leave bruises but nevertheless takes power from the individual it's aimed at, the kind that Wright was subjected to since birth. Politics, because of his brief affair with the Communist Party. Religion, because of his abusive family forcing him to pray so that he might "build a relationship with God." Native Son has a bit of all of these things.

That being said, this book is not meant to entertain - and it shouldn't; the protagonist is despicable, most if not all of the characters are shallow, the pacing is often sluggish and there is no happy ending (or happy middle or beginning, for that matter). This is a book about the forces at play in 1940s America; how the prejudices of a society's institution can bring to life the very demons they fabricated in the first place.

Neither Bigger nor the book apologizes for the murders he commits, and the story puts its entire chest behind what it has to say; the United States may be beyond redemption, regardless of whether or not it wants



to be redeemed in the first place, and attempts to stamp out resistance to the ever-present venom of history's transgressions will only fuel an oncoming storm.

Native Son still has its quirks. The story is very cynical, bloody and bleak; Bigger Thomas has been criticized as a character who pushes the angry and violent black man stereotype; and while the book is over 350 pages long it is broken up into only about three chapters, which affects the pacing.

Overall, Native son is an insightful - if dreadful - read for those interested in the dialogue of racism in America.









A Respectable Retrospection

Angel Olsen's "Aisles" is a tasty take on a handful of classics

Growing up in Saint Louis, Missouri, Angel Olsen grew up fascinated by the past and passionate about music. In her teenage years she attended many punk rock and music shows while learning piano and guitar at the same time. She began writing her own music, and at 16 joined a local band. Today Olsen continues making music, most recently an EP named "Aisles," a collection of five covers of 80s classics so wonderfully flavored by her style that it might take most listeners until "Forever Young" to realize that these aren't completely original works. That, or it's because this particular listener is rather young.

What sets these covers apart is Olsen's sound; it's a kind of 80s synthesizer-and-drum base with some indie acoustics and such for seasoning. Definitely the kind of thing someone would find in a Guitar Hero game. As this is an EP of covers, "Aisles" is apparently somewhat of a departure from her usual releases; the complete list of tracks are "Gloria", "Eyes Without a Face", "Safety Dance", "If You Leave", and "Forever Young", and the inspiration is rather unorthodox for Olson.





Keeping that in mind, it is a damn good breather to toss an ear to. "Aisles" and Angel Olsen's other music is available pretty much anywhere on the internet where music is streamed and sold.
