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erve Protect SCPD provides tips on how to stay safe on campus

When entrusting authorities with personal safety around campuses and schools, it is important to know that this is a responsibility they commit to with resounding care. Every year, lives are lost and injuries occur in academic settings due to the actions of active shooters or others with dangerous intent. After the recent shooting at Oxford high school, what may have felt like something that couldn't personally happen has now become too close to home for many Michiganders. The Schoolcraft College Police Department has recognized this potential danger by reviewing some of their protocols.

"Here at Schoolcraft, we're extremely proactive," said Chief of Police Mark Engstrom. "Every tragedy is an unfortunate opportunity to review the measures we have in place and ensure we are at the forefront of industry best-practices. The tragedy at Oxford has caused us to take a much more proactive role in meeting with our community to discuss safety procedures."

In line with these thoughts, the first step to keeping a safe campus is preventing tragedy before it happens. SC Aware is tailor-made for this. The website serves to provide students, faculty and staff an outlet for potential concerns they may have on

campus. This can include academic and health troubles, but also extends to safety concerns. Reports can be sent anonymously, but providing contact information is recommended. Any information given will be reviewed and the staff assigned to the report may follow up with further questions.

"College and university campuses continue to remain extremely safe, overall, and Schoolcraft College is no exception," Engstrom said. "The College has invested a great deal of resources toward ensuring your safety. We have over 800 cameras on campus, five technicians that monitor our safety systems, and 23 sworn police officers protecting our three campuses 24/7/365." Engstrom believes that this preparation contributes to the overall safety of the campus.

Another step in promoting safety according to Engstrom is for people on campus to have the Campus Police phone number (734-462-4424) at the ready. While 911 should be used in the case of an emergency, Campus Police will

investigate any other issues when called.

"Schoolcraft College has gone to great measures to ensure the safety of students, staff, faculty and visitors," said Engstrom.
"First, we have a fully-certified police department. They are also certified Medical First Responders. Our average response time is around one minute so whatever the situation is, we're going to get there quickly. Most of our officers are retired from local police departments, too. That means we have over 600 years of combined, real-world, police experience."

Sometimes, paying attention and being in control is all it takes to prevent a tragedy. According to Engstrom, staying calm goes a long way in staying protected.

"A great example is walking in parking lots, particularly for females and particularly at night. Our parking lots at the College are extremely safe and we even offer safety escorts if you call us." he notes that thieves generally look for crimes of opportunity and a person focused on their phone

while looking down is much more likely to be a target because they wont react in time and are less likely to identify the thief when prompted. A person walking with their head up, confidently with their keys in hand, has a much greater likelihood of being passed up by any potential would-be thieves. Those who are aware of their surroundings and are trusting of their instincts should report anything that seems odd, out of place, or dangerous to keep themselves and others safe.

"We are also one of only a handful of colleges/universities in the United States to have an Intelligence Operations Center run by 5 technicians." said Engstrom "These technicians operate complex security measures that include: dispatching, a global access control/lock-down system, an emergency paging system, monitoring over 800 cameras across our campuses, as well as real-time social media monitoring for potential threats."

Another resource people on campus can take advantage of is the Campus Police webpage under the Schoolcraft website. Information on the department

itself can be found as well as topics such as how to avoid parking tickets, what to do in a variety of emergencies, a link to SC Aware and a six minute video on the concept of "Run. Hide. Fight," which are the instructional steps to take in the event of an active assailant situation. The emphasis on this website is that "The time to think about what to do in an emergency is not IN the emergency." Being cautious and reviewing the available resources, students and others on campus put themselves in a much safer position to make intelligent choices in the event of an emergency occurring on campus, but these concepts are applicable off-campus as well.

"Our students are an important part of our overall campus community," said Engstrom. "By being proactive about your own safety and reporting any suspicious activity, you contribute greatly to the overall safety of our community."

Engstrom wants students to know that Campus Police aim to keep Schoolcraft safe. With officers committed to the concept of community policing, all someone with questions, comments or concerns needs to do is reach out for more information.

Public speaking can be a terrifying experience, but not for Jordan Fisher. She has always been confident speaking in front of others, but she is more than just confident.

"We always joke around the house that if Jordan tells you something, you don't necessarily have to agree with it, but you will definitely listen to her until the end," says Jennifer Walters, Jordan's mother.

It was clear that Jordan was unlike most children, she had a talent for public speaking. In 2019, Jordan started college to pursue her dream to become an actress. Meanwhile, Jennifer decided to return to college during the winter semester of 2020. With some previous college experience right after she graduated high school, a degree in Business Administration is on the horizon for her.

"One night we were at home," Jordan remembers, "I still needed 15 more credits to earn my associate degree and my mom needed a communications class for her business degree. While she has dreams of growing her career, pursuing education while being a mom is

difficult— even if her daughter is right alongside her in class.

"It's probably one of the hardest things I've ever done," Jennifer admitted. "Being a mother and studying at the same time means that you'll have to organize yourself to have enough time to complete your schoolwork. This means that you'll have to keep your household and motherly duties on different schedules. I was fortunate to be able to qualify for Future for Frontliners, so it would not interfere with us financially helping Jordan with college. My children are both adults and I have more time for school now. I also want them to be proud of me. What makes it easier is having a supportive family."

For Communication Arts

professor Maryia Duffy, this is a totally new experience.

"This is the first time that I have had family members attending my class together," Duffy says. "They have been a pleasure to have in class. They actively participate in all classes and have delivered excellent speeches. I love the energy that they bring with them."

While the course served to prepare both for their future careers, Jordan still hopes to pursue her dream as an actress. She would like to take the jump, going even further out of her comfort zone, and start going for auditions in the hopes of finding an agent or manager.

Jennifer, meanwhile, hopes to move up in her career and to be more confident in public speaking. For Jordan, college has been "wonderful," and having her mom there actually made it more special.

"I consider my mom as a friend and a mom at school honestly,"
Jordan says. "When we talk together about class, it feels the same as if I was talking to another friend in the class, but she can sometimes step in and be a mom when she needs to. For instance, I'll admit there have been a few times when I would have long days and I would come to class really tired, and I would start to slowly drift off and she would nudge me to keep me awake."

The two commute to class together, study together, hang out and have even started traveling together.

"Sometimes it might look like a competition, but it is more teamwork. We aren't competitive with each other," both say. "We mostly support one another more than anything. We both try to help each other, and bounce ideas off one another. Maybe you can see a bit of competition when it comes to getting our work done, but definitely we motivate each other. Speaking of grades, the pair happens to be very studious. Jordan boasts a 3.5 GPA and Jennifer has a 4.0. They are on this journey together chasing their dreams despite the age gap.

"Honestly, I have spoken with many others who are also pursuing degrees that are my age or older and reassured them that age is not important, as long as you are pursuing a path that you are interested in."

Exploring the depth of new media: performance art on Tik Tok

In today's social climate, with the seemingly limitless stream of content being created by internet users every day, it can be difficult to appreciate the time and effort that goes into creating every second of that content. It can also be difficult to appreciate the toll that modern creativity takes on the creator. The internet today has become a nest of fervent demand for new content, incredibly decisive, yet always desiring more. Tik Tok user Molly McCrann, known as "Moldoga" on the app recently finished a performance-art piece which uniquely captures the highs and lows of what it is to be a content creator.

The concept is simple. Actually, it is amazingly simple.

In her first video, McCrann performs a cover of Louis Armstrong's "What a Wonderful World," but only vocalizes the sound of "S's" as they appear in the song. The track to the song plays as normal, but she does not sing a single other letter besides "S" every time it appears in the lyrics. The resulting sound is odd, to say the least.

A week later, however, she released another video, stitched to the original. This time she would sing only the "T's." A couple of days later she would sing the "L's." Only this time, she had added a floating caption, which read "(3/26.)" It had become clear she was planning to sing the entire

song one letter at a time.

One could say that this project was ambitious, or pointless, or hilarious and all of the above would be correct. It would have been enough to see her sing the song one letter at a time and to see if it became at all intelligible in the end, but McCrann takes the art of the piece a step further. The first video of the series was released on Nov. 7. the last was released Jan. 15. Over the intervening months, followers of the series seem to have seen McCrann fall into a type of internet frenzy. Around the letter "K," letter "6/26", viewers can notice a few off details compared to those preceding. Her hair appears somewhat messier, the wire of her microphone has a knot in it and her makeup is less put-together. Soon enough, the madness begins to take over.

As the series continues, McCrann's appearance becomes more and more unhinged. Each time she drops a new video, her hair is even more tangled, her makeup is even more messy, the collar of her shirt shows signs of a struggle, and she appears ever more distraught.

After Christmas, the videos began to take a startling turn. Rather than her usual blank stare into the camera, as the soundtrack plays, McCrann can be seen glancing off camera, giving the distinct impression that she is not alone.

The last two weeks of the project would be centered around a series of companion videos entitled "The Reveal." After each letter drop, McCrann would then post another video, where she would gently hum the song to herself cowering in fear from an off-screen villain, identified only by a gloved hand. It seems silly to try to avoid spoilers for a Tik Tok series, but to ruin the Reveal in this piece also seems to be in bad taste. Suffice it to say, uncovering the mysteries of this odd performance-art piece is a fascinating endeavor.

McCrann's cover of "What a Wonderful World" is something to behold. It is the art of a new age. It is abstract and surreal, yet somehow poignant. The character McCrann plays of herself in this piece appears increasingly more distraught and the followers love it. One can see how the ridiculousness of this project has begun to take over the character, and yet each video receives hundreds of thousands of likes. Running jokes

began to form in the comment section. A faction of commenters identifying as "Team Consonant" came together to put forth their theory that she would never add vowels to the series (she eventually did, but saved them for last). And somehow in all the absurdity, McCrann actually starts to make an interesting point. Her character becomes increasingly more stressed, pumping out content, turning a stupid joke into a two-month endeavor. The pressure to create content, to keep the fans happy, seemingly weighs on her distressed psyche, juxtaposed by the dulcet tone of Louis Armstrong.

Why would anyone create this? For the likes, as insane as that sounds. Moldoga has captured that insanity, with her piecewise-cover of What a Wonderful World.
