The mass of people walking into the Physical Education Building holding enormous flags were eager to share their political feelings with the assembled candidates. Flags that read "Taxed Enough Already," "Who is John Galt?" and "Don't tread on me." Passing through the doors of Schoolcraft's gym was to leave the normal world and become immersed in the political spectacle that is an American tea party.

This particular rally was called S.O.S. (Save Our State) and was organized by The Tea Parties of Brighton, Lakes Area, Let Freedom Reign, Rattle With Us, RetakeOurGov and Patriots of West Oakland County. This particular event was held to make sure that all these tea party groups knew who to vote for the coming up election on November 2. It was held at Schoolcraft do to its location roughly in the center of these prominent, local tea party groups.

Alex Steward former co-chair of the College Republicans of Schoolcraft College said, "The tea party was filled

Hit but don't run

Increased criminal conduct

Hit-and-run accidents are seemingly on the rise on campus this year. With two strikes occurring in one week, Public Safety has released case information on the parking lot accidents and offered a warning in an attempt to promote cautious driving.

While running late for class, the driver of a Jeep with extra wide buffer tires pulled into a parking spot too quickly causing extensive damage to a parked car. The perpetrator was pulling in to park and misjudged the spot. After they had hit the car, the driver of the Jeep fled to the South lot to park and proceeded to class as if nothing had happened. The damage to the driver's own vehicle was minor.

Public Safety used their resources to identify the perpetrator, removed the individual from class and issued a violation. The offender was surprised to be pulled out of class.

"We have cameras that monitor all the parking lots on campus and students see things and extend the effort," Director of Security and Campus Police John Monge

After being questioned about the event, the perpetrator admitted responsibility and said they "just freaked."

Although it seems that there have been several accidents recently, as a whole the numbers are average. Many of the parking lot accidents tend to happen near the beginning of the semesters. "It is a combination of beginning drivers being unsure of where to go and overconfident with their vehicles," Monge said.

According to the records provided by Public Safety, in Oct. 2009, the total year-todate number of accidents was at 38. Up mid-October of this year, the number is a very comparable 41. For the month of October in 2009 there were six total accidents and

October 2010 had six as well. It seems this year is no worse than last

Authorities cracking down on stations ability to sell alcohol By Conor Brown

There is a battle brewing between liquor store and gas station owners in Farmington Hills over who should be permitted to sell beer and wine. When the politicians are done weighing in, it might be consumers that end up losing out.

Liquor store owners are upset that gas stations are acquiring licenses to sell beer and wine. They complain that it is unfair for them to have to invest so much money into stocking their store and gaining the license to sell their goods, only to have their business taken from them by smaller gas stations. However, the liquor stores are fighting back by getting local policy makers on their side.

Gas station owners believe they should be allowed to sell beer, wine and liquor if they please. They have to go through the state of Michigan to obtain the proper licenses, which require them to have at least \$250,000 in other merchandise in the store. More importantly, they are usually open much later than their liquor store counterparts.

"I think it's great, like a one-stop shop. Although I heard they wanted to raise taxes on beer and liquor sold at gas stations, so that would turn me away," said SC student Jeff Valentine.

Most liquor stores close at 10 p.m. or 11 p.m., leaving late night drinkers out of luck. Gas stations get a lot of business from people who purchase alcohol between 11 p.m. and 2 a.m.

Also, most gas stations sell only beer and wine, leaving the monopoly on liquor to specialty stores.

However, not everyone agrees that making alcohol more easily accessible is a good thing. "Gas stations should not be allowed to sell any alcoholic beverage because most people who buy something to eat, drink or even smoke, do so in the car on the way home, and I believe selling alcohol at gas stations promotes drinking and driving," said SC student Don Gurka.

City council members of Farmington Hills seem to be siding with liquor store owners. The city is now trying to change their zoning laws to keep any more gas stations from selling alcohol. They cite increased robbery as a reason, although Farmington Hills ranks as one of the safest cities in the state, having only 24 robberies last year. Another reason given is that it is easier to sell to minors at a gas station rather than a liquor store. Gas stations already selling alcohol will be allowed to continue business as usual but will likely face tighter scrutiny by the Michigan Liquor Control Commission. It is entirely possible that a few of these gas stations will lose their license for not meeting the requirements, as most do not possess \$250,000 in candy, chips and ciga-

Zoning laws in Farmington Hills try to eliminate competition by only allowing one liquor store for a determined zone. Since gas stations do not

sell liquor, they do not fall under these zoning restrictions. Liquor stores have to follow much tighter regulations than gas stations selling beer and the owners

of the stores say that this affects their sales negatively. Whatever the verdict is, someone is

At some of the larger universities, laptops are being banned from classrooms altogether. Signs outside of classrooms now warn students that no cell phones, iPods, laptops or other electronic devices are allowed because professors feel there is no need for them during lectures. However, students argue that they need them for taking notes and working on assign-

World News

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Shoved out of the closet

String of recent student suicides raises concern By Anita Mishra

At Rutgers University, on Sept. 22, 2010, freshman Tyler Clementi posted a note on Facebook stating "Jumping off the gw bridge sorry." The day after his suicide, his lifeless body was found near the George Washington Bridge. It is always shocking to hear about a suicide but it is further disturbing to hear how and why it happened. His roommate, Dharun Ravi, was asked to give Clementi privacy in their dorm room for a few of hours on Sept. 19 and 20. Little did Clementi know that Ravi and his friend, Molly Wei. were playing around with a webcam in another room that was set to view Clementi's room. After Ravi and Wei spied on Clementi being intimate with another man, they proceeded to broadcast this act online as a joke. This occurred not only once but two days in a row. The day after these incidents, Clementi killed himself.

Richard L. McCormick, president of Rutgers said in a public statement, "In order to hear directly from our lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender (LGBT) students, I am arranging to meet with student leaders of the LGBT community. Let me also urge your participation in Project Civility, a conversation on our New Brunswick campus about the meaning of respect and how we treat each other.

The Gay Straight Alliance, a Schoolcraft student organization, has brought the conversation to the College. The group was founded by Josh Allen in the fall of 2009 with the

goal of giving other LGBT students a support system and a place they can't find elsewhere. After hearing about these suicide reports, other students of this group had much to talk about. "I reacted with remorse," one member said shaking his head disappointedly. "It shows that there is still a lot of work to be done to change the community's perception of the LGBT community. It's extremely sad knowing that there are kids and teens that struggle every day with who they are."

"I felt shocked and saddened by his death and the same about the other deaths," another GSA member said.

It comes with little surprise that GSA members are reluctant to share their identities publicly.

"Social networking sites like Facebook, Twitter and YouTube allow students to post any message, no matter how hurtful, for their peers to see. I think we've moved forward in recent years when it comes to acceptance of the LGBT community but 'cyber-bullying' is an added obstacle for high school students these days. I think it's made it even harder for some students to come out," said a GSA student.

Preventing bullying and suicides from happening is the next solution. One student laughed nervously and said we would need "a complete overhaul of current society, which is damn near impossible."

Another member agreed, saying, "They need support from parents, friends and social institutions. Parents don't realize that avoiding the topic

What happened to "smoke free?"

Recent law change is sometimes disregarded by bar patrons

Despite the fact that the Michigan smoke free law went into effect on May 1, 2010, there are still many people who are failing to comply with these new regulations. The law prohibits smoking in public places. This includes, but isn't limited to: restaurants, bars, shopping malls, bowling alleys, concert halls, arenas, museums, mechanic shops, health facilities, nursing homes, educational facilities and child care centers. In simple terms, if you're inside of a building other than a private residence, you can't smoke.

"I agree with the smoke free law because I feel that any nonsmoker should not have to forcefully be subjected to being around secondhand smoke in a public place. I do feel that it has been effective for the most part. I see more people following the law than not," Rachel Knorp, a student at Schoolcraft said.

Most people would agree that it is a reasonable law but not everyone is convinced. Even though the smoking ban went into effect months ago, local health departments have been receiving complaints about patrons in bars and restaurants smoking anyway. Smoking violations are reported by phone or fax to the health department of the county in which the violation takes place. Citations can result in a fine of \$100 for the first offense and \$500 for any offense after that.

Why are many people choosing to ignore the law? "Since the casinos allow smoking,
I think businesses should be able to decide for themselves whether or not they want to allow smoking in their establishments," Jenn

Thompson, a SC student said, "I follow it just because I don't want the ticket."

The new law affected many businesses, over 37,000 food service establishments alone are under the jurisdiction of 45 health departments dispersed across the state. Local health departments have received over 583 complaints of businesses disregarding this law and five businesses in the state were temporarily shut down until they complied.

"The law does prevent me from smoking in restaurants that I previously would have but I smoke the same amount as I did before the law was in effect," nursing major, Alyse Anderson said, "I agree with the smoke-free law. I think it's pretty fair to nonsmokers. It's especially fair to families who go out to eat with their young children."

Restaurants, for the most part, are complying with the smoke free law. Bars and clubs are where patrons are having the hardest time adjusting. "About two weeks ago, I saw a bunch of people smoking at the bar," continued Thompson. If there are a lot of people who are still smoking in public places, it encourages others to join in. It's a classic case of the "If they can do it, so can I" mentality. Many people smoke while they drink and the prime places to drink are bars and clubs. Ann Arbor's Necto even has an outdoor room attached to the building where smoking is still allowed in order to accommodate their smoking club goers.

The smoking ban in Michigan is still in its beta phase, with some patrons still thinking they can disregard it. However, with 26 states having these bans in effect, the U.S. may very well be on its way to becoming a smoke-free country. Smokers are going to have to learn to comply or be ready to face the consequences.

Dr. Rob Steele, who is running for Federal Congressmen of the 15th district, mentioned that his opponent had been in office longer then Fidel Castro was dictator of Cuba and it is time for a change. Judge Mike Young, a

candidate for the state's highest court, talked about how both he and Judge Mary Beth Kelly must win the open seats on the court to stop the Michigan Supreme Court from being an ATM for trial lawyers. Republican hopeful for Schoolcraft's State Senate district (the 6th) John Pastor also asked the tea partiers to vote for him on Nov. 2. Here at Schoolcraft, computer graphics technology (CGT) instructor Cathy Begle insists computer screens be turned off and all eyes remain on her during lectures on typography. However, for up-and-coming graphic designers and Web specialists, she feels laptops are an asset. Begle says students like the convenience of bringing their laptops with them and having their personal licensed font collections, preferred software and favorite operating system right at their fingertips. Transferring fonts and large files from one machine to another can be a hassle, especially in CGT classes.

On the other hand, the average classroom is not always equipped with a computer at every seat, like those in the CGT classrooms. Brad Stetson, a full-time math instructor at Schoolcraft said, "I do actually allow laptops in the classroom, as I require my homework to be done online. Many students will attempt a few problems in class while I'm lecturing, and others like to bring their laptop to class to ask questions from the homework."

If one student is busy surfing or playing a game on their laptop, is it distracting to the students seated nearby? Freshman Megan Zuccaro thinks it is. When asked what her nts were on the banning of

thoughts were on the banning of laptops, she said, "Yes, I think laptops should be banned. I look around the class and half the people are on Facebook. It's very distracting."

Not all students share Zuccaro's sentiment. Sophomore Joshua Stothers said, "Personally, I think it's stupid to come to class and not pay attention. Seems like a waste of money to me. But it's their money to waste. I haven't been distracted. In fact, I find that if the teacher is not keeping my interest, I can go to my laptop and finish work for other classes."

At the other end of the spectrum, there are students who feel that having their laptop in class is beneficial to their education. Sophomore Cynthia Hodge uses her laptop in class for research and jotting down notes, stating, "I think that having a laptop in the classroom is a good thing. Sometimes you might not know exactly what a teacher is talking about, so you could research it more on the Web. Also, some people would like to take notes on their computer and, if the teacher talks fast, it is easier to type as they lecture. Also, if you are spelling everything wrong, the computer fixes the spelling.

While there are no plans by the College to formerly ban electronic devices in the classroom, their increased presence in the classroom ensures this subject will continue to be debated into the future.

us. We're human and make mistakes. Accidents happen. That's why they call them that." Monge explained.

The offenders are issued tickets for leaving the scene of the crime in addition to a student discipline form. Students involved in the hit-and-run accidents will be able to take their tickets to court, but the student disciplinary form will remain in place. In the event of an accident, students should always report the problem. immediately "The best thing to do is be honest and try to resolve the situation," Monge said. Often, campus security is quick to the scene of an accident. "Our primary focus is service. We have a car driving around the lots 24/7 looking for suspicious behavior and helping students avoid accidents."

Whether students encounter a severe accident or simply lock their keys in their car, Public Safety is prepared to help at any time. To avoid accidents similar to the recent collisions, students are encouraged to provoke safe driving, abide by the speed limit and, as Monge says, "Just slow down."

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




Live tutoring takes over the Internet

For SC students who need extra help with their studies, the LAC is offering a powerful and easy-to-use system: Elluminate Live, an online tutoring program where students can connect to available SC tutors live from the convenience of their own homes.

Elluminate Live, built specifically for live, multimedia collaboration, is a delivery of online learning, coaching, training, mentoring and meeting. The program offers an exceptional ability to take over the Internet with full two-way audio, live video, text message exchange, whiteboards, files and applications all being shared between the tutor and the student simply through the computer. Elluminate Live, is compatible with a dial-up modem or high-speed Internet, offering the same high-quality, superior performance and dependability with no lag time.

Terri Lamb, coordinator of Online **Tutoring and Mathematics Learning** Specialist at SC said, "From a math perspective, there's nothing like face-to-face, one-on-one tutoring. But if you can't get in to the LAC and you're struggling at home ... this is a viable option." The program is funded through the Learning Support Services and the College itself. Lamb also expresses that SC has been using online tutoring for a few years but have



recently changed the platform to the new powerful Elluminate Live.

"Sounds like an awesome program, I'll have to check it out. It's great to know that Schoolcraft offers such a convenient way to get the extra help you need with your homework without

having to leave your home," SC student Kyle Stansik said.

Students can download Elluminate Live by going to the SC website and visiting the LAC Web page. There, they can find instructions on how to

download the program and how to set it up.

Online tutoring is available to SC students during the fall and winter semesters, Monday through Thursday, from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m.; Friday, from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.; and Saturday from 12-4 p.m. Lamb also wants students to know that the LAC is looking to extend one of its weekday tutoring hours to 11 p.m. or midnight.

When accessing Elluminate Live, students should note the following steps in preparation before using the online tutoring: Make sure to find a comfortable place with no distractions, check audio speakers and microphone equipment are working properly, and be certain the Internet connection is up to speed. When using the online service make sure to log into a session and join 5-10 minutes prior to start. There are many unique features of the online sessions. One example is participation. If there are any questions or comments, a student can raise their hand by clicking the "raise hand" button. Also, feedback can be provided to the moderator by responding to

Being a community college, SC finds many of its students studying with the intent of transferring. More than 3,500 years ago, the Land of Israel was known as the center of Judaism and section south of Levant. Levant was a section which was used as "crossroads of Western Asia" or an area of multi-cultural habitation According to the Bible, Jews considered the Land of Israel as their land promised by God. The years thereafter, this land's boundaries have been fluctuating around areas now known as Israel. Palestine territories, the western part of Jordan and even the southern portion of Lebanon.

After World War II, there was an increase in the Jewish community in Palestine which irked Arab nations because they felt the Jewish settlers were, in fact, illegal residents. This furthered the tension in the region.

Flash forward to 1947, the United Nations voted in favor of partitioning Palestine into three sections: a Jewish state, an Arab state and an U.N.-controlled Jerusalem. This partition and establishment of Israel was acceptable to the Zionists but not to Arabian leaders and, in turn, lead to a civil war. After the war, Israel was finally established in May 14, 1948 but then was attacked by adjacent Arab

However, the Arab nations weren't necessarily the enemies and Israelites the victims.

A U.N. Security Council mediator named Folke Bernadotte, a Swedish Count, was recognized for releasing 31,000 prisoners from Nazi concentra-

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tion camps. He made one of the first peace proposals. Unfortunately, the militant Zionist group Lehi assassinated him in 1948 while he was on

The U.N. and intergovernmental organizations also formed a multitude of other peace proposals and treaties after that but they were only temporarily useful and eventually failed. The Camp David Accords of the 1970s settled an Israeli and Egypt peace treaty for a temporary time.

In the early 1990s, the Oslo Accord was issued to settle an Israel-Palestine conflict but failed. The Middle East Peace Summit at Camp David of 2000 was a continuation of the one in the 1970s but there were no final settle-

During these peace proposals, the U.S. also sent many military troops to the Middle East increasing the deficit, decreasing job opportunities and spending U.S. tax dollars. The "War on Terror" cost the U.S. \$20 billion in 2001, \$600 billion in 2007, and an estimated \$200 billion in 2009. On top of this, U.S. spending on the military is equal to the military spending of 15 countries combined, such as South Korea, Germany, Japan, France, Russia, and Britain. Simply put, wars cost lives and money. Peace talks are cheap in comparison.

For the U.S., coaxing the countries of the Middle East to the negotiating table might be a time-consuming, seemingly fruitless task ... but the alternative is too costly to seriously consider.

Albert Einstein once said the definition of insanity is doing the same thing over and over again and expecting different results. This is why it's laughable every two or three years when the executive office tries to solve the Arab-Israeli conflict. It is a waste of time and money.

To better appreciate the fruitlessness of the situation, a mini-history of the Arab Israeli conflict. From 1939 to 1945, about 6 million Jews were killed by Nazi Germany. Britain, sympathetic to the Jewish people, joined into the Zionist movement and, through the U.N., declared that the colony of Israeli would become a Jewish homeland. This was easier said than done after a hard-fought civil war was waged. On May 14, 1948, the nation of Israeli had its independence. Shorty after that, Palestinians, who used to live in the land now called Israel, formed the Palestine Liberation Organization (PLO) and have been using guerrilla warfare on the Israeli government ever since. After a little more than two decades of bickering and small engagements, Syria and Egypt attacked Israel sparking the Yom Kippur war. Israel won. Convincingly.

And for some reason Jimmy Carter decided to do something Nixon, Johnson, Kennedy, Eisenhower and Truman didn't do; he got involved. He had a secret meeting with the Israeli prime minister and the Egyptian president to try to settle the Arab-Israeli conflict. After 12 days of deliberation,

Israel gave up some land (all of which has been taken back) and the PLO agreed to recognize Israel as a state (which has also been taken back). There was a ceasefire for ten days and then things when back to normal.

Since that historic negotiation, just about every president has tried roughly the same thing — act as a mediator between these two warring entities. Israel will give the East bank or the Gaza Strip back and Hezbollah (the now the legitimate face of Palestine) will recognize Israel as a state. Then ceasefire stops and the merry-go-round spins over and over

It's a vicious circle and a bad idea for many reasons. First, who are we to mediate? We should be on Israel's side as they are a democracy. We sell them billions of dollars of military technology every year. Isn't it kind of hypocritical to do that then try to mediate peace. We should sell Israeli the weapons — it's good for our economy and keeps a true democracy in the Middle East.

Secondly, it's a waste of money. Maybe not a multibillion dollar bridgeto-nowhere waste of money, but a penny saved is a penny earned.

Peace is a bad thing; it's a great thing. However, donating generously to the Foundation for Peace in the Middle East might be a better way to promote peace than sending diplomats overseas to act as referee. But maybe having the U.S. step in every couple of years, pretending we're creating peace — one that rarely lasts longer than ten days — is, as Einstein states, insanity.



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

named the "U.N. Defense." This combination permitted the team to focus on a defense-first style of play and the players were confident in close matches. Unfortunately, a team that plays a lot of tight games also loses the occasional close contest. For the Ocelots. one of those losses came in the second round of the Division I National tournament. The

defeat denied the team a shot at the championship game. Though the season ended on a positive note — a 3-0 win to secure an overall ranking of third but the players were eft feeling they nad missed a rare opportunity that was

vithin their reach. Rather than dwell on falling short, the coaching staff looked to build on the areas where the team was proficient. The U.N.

Defense disbanded but the focus on defensive responsibility remained. McDonald-Wilkins returned ensuring the team would continue to have a commanding presence in the net. The final piece came in the form of a reinvigorated offensive attack. Entering the season, the Ocelots were confident that any aspect of their game — offense, defense, goaltending — was strong enough to carry the team if the others struggled

Boasting a robust 16-3-1 heading into the postseason, the Ocelots didn't struggle often in 2010.

Led by 18-goal scorer Marco Lobo, one of the team's emerging midfielders, the Ocelots have opened up their game to allow the strikers more opportunity to carry the attack and press opponents into making mistakes. For a team breaking in a new set of defenders, the best defense proved to be a good offense. The Ocelots tallied five or more goals in eight times during the season, double the amount from 2009.

Even as the campaign progressed, the hard lessons learned during the '09 playoffs were in the thoughts of players. "The previous postseason taught the team a great deal on what level is expected to compete with the top junior colleges to win a national championship," said McDonald-Wilkins.

Even with a first round bye in the NJCAA Region XII tournament, the team is taking little for granted.

"Staying focused is a major aspect that needs to remain a key thought when heading into the playoffs," said Coach Larson.

The team did just that

during their final regular season game, a tightly contested 1-0 victory over Lakeland Community College. The squad found they were still able to rely on goaltending and defense at a time when the offense wasn't firing on all cylinders, a very valuable affirmation after a season of plentiful

"The team is finally coming together, which is great with the team heading into the playoffs," said McIntosh.

Chemistry is another key for the Ocelots to advance deep into the postseason. On a team loaded with talent, it's important for the "stars" to share the ball and mesh strengths

Castlevania reaches its peak with "Symphony of the Night"



across the ages. The first game came out for the NES in 1986 and the series has been going strong ever since. There are 37 games under the Castlevania banner, although most fans agree that the franchise's crowning achievement is "Castlevania: Symphony of the Night."

"Symphony of the Night" was released in 1997 for the PlayStation. The game is set five years after the previous game, "Castlevania: Rondo of Blood." The story centered on Alucard, son of Dracula, who was introduced in "Castlevania III: Dracula's Curse" as an ally of vampire hunter Trevor Belmont. Alucard awakens 321 years after Trevor's victory against Dracula.

He doesn't know why he is awake, but he knows it must have something to do with his father. So, in true Castlevania fashion, he sets off for his father's castle to find out

what is going on. "Symphony of the Night" was a milestone for the series. Instead of being a linear side-scrolling action game, the

game featured an open-world format that encouraged exploration as well as adding some RPG elements. Of course, the juicy action and trademark magical power-ups remained intact. This new style of gameplay — dubbed "Metroidvania" — proved very successful would become the template for all 2D Castlevania games to

As always, the music is astounding. Composed by Michiru Yamane, the soundtrack borrows from several different genres, including baroque, jazz, gothic rock, metal and even some electronica. Despite being so varied, the soundtrack coalesces into something wonderfully cohesive and truly remarkable. It is frequently cited as one of the greatest soundtracks in all of gaming and it makes the expeience that much more enjoyable.

One other person of interest is the character designer, Ayami Kojima. This title was her first foray in the gaming world, and her superb art distinguishes this game from the pack. Instead of going 3D — as so

many game were in the late '90s — the game uses traditional sprite models which are exquisitely detailed and painstakingly animated. Kojima's unique character creations are grotesque and beautiful and they really fit in with the melancholy music and gothic settings. The drawing and movement of Alucard in particular is excellent, with every part of his body visible and moving, from his cape to his hair.

While not all that successful on its original release, the innovative level design, open-ended gameplay, detailed graphics and the blend of platforming, action and RPG

"Doubt: a Parable" hits Schoolcraft

SC's production is outstanding. Brian Taylor, Brenda Lane, Jessica Duffy and Elizabeth Tumminello make up the four member cast of Father Flynn, Sister Aloysius, Sister James and Mrs. Muller (Donald's mother) respectively.

The play is interpreted well with eerie accuracy. The strongest scene in the play is when Sister Aloysius brings in Mrs. Muller to discuss her suspicions of Father Flynn. The act escalates into two women screaming at one another, each one standing for a different outcome to Sister Aloysius's witch hunt. At an individual level, each actor portrays their characters well.

Tumminello doesn't immediately appear to fit the bill as Donald's mother, being a Caucasian woman. It's a huge difference from the play but the director doesn't have any qualms about casting her. "Only a few African-Americans auditioned," says director James Hartman, "and she (Tumminello) was the best." Her role as the mother, who just desperately wants her son to have a good education and escape his terrible home life, just leaves the audience speechless and some quickly take her side.

Taylor exudes confidence as Father Flynn. During the scenes where he preaches, he stands on stage completely alone and speaks to the audience catching eyes and making them feel as if they're in church, listening to the Sunday sermon. His performance is overwhelmingly big-hearted and kind that some audience members feel he's innocent in the end.

Duffy plays the sweet and innocent Sister James, who loves her students and teaching history. She's the catalyst of the play. Her confiding in Sister Aloysius of worries about Donald and Father Flynn causes the principal to go on her quest to discover the truth and ruin the man she's already deemed guilty. Duffy really embodies the innocence of the character, from the look in her eyes to the sweet sound of her voice. You can feel her confliction between wanting to believe the Sister and wanting to believe the Father.

Of course, the play wouldn't exist without Sister Aloysius, played by Brenda Lane. Her harsh tone and cold demeanor may have audience members turning away from her and believing fully in Father Flynn's innocence. But then again, Lane plays the Sister with such conviction that it's hard to ignore this woman and sometimes easier to think, "Perhaps he did do it."

The play also couldn't exist without the care and love of the director behind it, James Hartman, who is incidentally a huge fan of the play. "I saw a professional performance in Toronto and I was just moved by the story and the literature," Hartman said, explaining his reasoning on the choice of "Doubt." "I got the script, I read it 10 times and I just really, really liked it." Hartman not only directed, but was involved in all aspects of the play, such as helping the stage crew design and build the sets. His dedication makes acting more enjoyable.

"About the play"

"Doubt: A Parable" first hit the Broadway stage in November of 2004. The story itself takes place in 1964 at St. Nicholas, a Catholic Church and school in the Bronx. The principal of the school is Sister Aloysius, a rather old-fashioned woman who believes that too many sugar cubes in a cup of tea is wrong and "Frosty the Snowman" is a theme song for pagan magic. Sister Aloysius sees some rather questionable behavior (in her eyes) between the school's preacher, Father Flynn, and a young boy. She makes it her mission to find out if the Father is having inappropriate relations.

Sister James teaches 8th grade and is very young and new to the nunnery life. She seems to be very naïve and trusting of her students until Sister Aloysius takes her aside and convinces her that not everyone is exactly how they seem. She

enlists Sister James's help to keep her eyes open. Although she doesn't go into specifics, it's clearly in hopes that Sister James may help her catch Father Flynn.

The young boy in question, Donald Muller, is the first African American student admitted to the school. He makes no friends with children his own age and becomes isolated and lonely. Father Flynn seeks out the boy and befriends him, an act Sister Aloysius sees as suspicious and completely unacceptable. She and Sister James try to get Father Flynn to confess to his obvious crimes.

The author of the play, John Patrick Shanley, leaves the ending open to the audience's interpretation. It's never really said whether or not Father Flynn's relationship with the boy crossed lines it wasn't supposed to.

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Watch This, Not That

"Louie"

Comedian Louis CK has had a rocky relationship with the television world. His previous sitcom on HBO, "Lucky Louie," was cancelled after only 12 episodes despite a devoted fan base and ratings higher than "Deadwood" and "Flight of the Conchords." With his latest show, "Louie" on FX, he hopes to reclaim his rightful spot on the small screen. Judging by what we've seen so far, he might just have hit upon his comedic pièce de résistance.

The show stars C.K., playing himself: a 42-year-old divorcee with two daughters trying to make it through life. The show is comprised of vignettes interspersed with Louis performing his standup. It's not a typical comedy show structure and it gives the program a refreshing perspective. There are no real long-running story arcs, although several characters make multiple appearances throughout the course of the show.

Be warned: this show is not for the kiddies. The humor is extremely risqué, dark and over-the-top, although fans of C.K.'s standup comedy would expect nothing less. In fact, the great thing about "Louie" being on FX is that he's able to get away with a lot more than if he were on, say, CBS. With the exception of a few bleeped f-words, the show is essentially an uncensored glimpse into C.K.'s comedic mind.

In addition to injecting his own brand of hilarity into the show, C.K. also brings in various comedic talents to assist him in his endeavors. These range from fellow standups like Nick DiPaolo and Todd Barry to actors like Stephen Root and Matthew Broderick. One particularly riotous episode features Ricky Gervais ("The Office" [UK]) as Dr. Ben: a physician with an awful sense of humor. ("I've got the results from your blood work and ... you may have slight big-fat-gingerugly-itis.")

With its unique structure and unconventional humor, "Louie" is the antidote to conventional sitcoms like "\$#*! My Dad Says." It's a wonderful gem of a show that will hopefully live a long and healthy life alongside the other FX comedy classic, "It's Always Sunny in Philadelphia." If you have the chance, be sure to check it out.

"\$#*! My Dad Says"

Exactly how bereft of ideas do you have to be before you decide to create a sitcom based on a Twitter feed? CBS's latest comedy, "\$#*! My Dad Says," stars William Shatner and is based solely on a series of tweets detailing the rants and ravings of a 74-year-old man. That sounds like a winning combination if ever there was one.

The show revolves around an elderly father named Ed Goodson (played by Shatner) who belittles his adult son and says wildly inappropriate things at any given moment. If you're thinking, "Gosh, that sounds like every elderly dad in every sitcom ever," then congratulations, you've spotted the main flaw with this show. From his first line of dialogue, Shatner's character feels plastic and manufactured ... so much so that it's hard to believe it was based off of a real person.

The entire setup of the "\$#*! My Dad Says" screams "boilerplate." The show is so generic and dated that even its connection to Twitter can't make it feel like a product of this millennium. It's also a great deal tamer than the profanity-laden quotes it purportedly draws inspiration from. The title — which has been censored by CBS — is by far the edgiest thing about the program. If it weren't for the occasional PG-13-rated joke, the show might as well be "Full House."

Of course, the program might have stood a chance at success if it was actually funny. Unfortunately, the show fails miserably in this area as well. Shatner's tired jokes are so painfully unfunny that you can practically hear the canned laughter struggling. The real problem is that the show tries to capture the feeling of spontaneous real-life wit but the writing is in the rigid setup-to-punchline style of a circa-1950s sitcom. It's a poor choice of setup and it pretty much guaranteed that the project was doomed from the

Simply put, this production is a mess. The only solace gained from witnessing this disaster is the knowledge that it will most likely be cancelled. With innovative and hilarious programs like "Louie" on the air, it's an embarrassment that low-quality material like this is allowed to exist. If you're looking for a laugh, then your best bet would be to stay as far away from this show as possible.

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
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Taylor Swift "Speak Now" Genre: Country/Pop

The individual composures in itself is almost overshadowed by the puppy love digs coming out a young 19-yearold girl learning about "love" and making mistakes.



Electronic group The Orb took over the UK in the '90s with their unique brand of ambient house music. For their latest album, they've teamed up with legendary Pink Floyd guitarist David Gilmour. The resulting creation is an out-of-this-world experience that is surprisingly down-to-earth.

"Metallic Spheres" is The Orb's 10th studio album. The 49-minute compilation is composed of two lengthy tracks: "Metallic Side" and "Spheres Side." Though distinct, the two "sides" merge into each other to create a singular this album expecting any typical song structures or verse-chorus combinations. Instead, they should expect an ever-shifting world of mellow electronic sounds meandering hazily through a sea of sonic waves. Or, something like that.

The choice of David Gimour as a collaborator was excellent. Gilmour's laidback guitar work fits into the album well set against the backdrop of chilled house beats and spacey sound effects. He effortlessly fills in the crevices, adding an earthiness to the otherwise cold electronic tones. While the album doesn't feature any crazy solos, his expertise with the instrument is clearly visible, as always.

In keeping with The Orb's ambient groove, the music never reaches an apex but instead drifts from concept to concept. Unfortunately, for most people this slowly-wandering style translates out as "background music," but this album is so much more than that. There's definitely some Pink Floyd channeled in the album, as the 49-minute trip hearkens back to the tracks like "Echoes" off of the album "Meddle" "Metallic Spheres" would probably feel right at home accompanying a laser light show in a planetarium.

If there is one downside, it's that "Metallic Spheres" feels like something these artists could do in their sleep. As a result, the album is clear, precise and beautiful, but at the same time perhaps not as exciting or as experimental as one might have hoped. 
The direction by Jeff Tremaine is spectacular. The camera crew really upped their game by pur-

Why OSU will win the Conference

Since the Ohio State University Buckeyes won the 2002 BCS national title, a Big Ten championship no longer quenches that insatiable thirst for winning. Neither does a mere trip to the national title game. With an experienced team just off a January Rose Bowl win over Oregon, expectations in Columbus are off the charts.

The late, great University of Michigan Coach Bo Schembechler would often refer to Ohio as "that state down south" because of the rivalry between Michigan and OSU Schembechler might be rolling in his grave if he heard of Ohio State winning the Big Ten football title, which they very well might this year, leaving behind a trail of disappointed

Michigan and Michigan State fans. Junior Quarterback Terrelle Pryor is a powerful offensive weapon as he fights for consideration in the Heisman Trophy race. Although he is currently fifth in the Big Ten in passing yards, Pryor was named the Big Ten co-Offensive Player of the Week for Week 6 along with Wisconsin running back John Clay. Pryor is not the only offensive weapon on this potent roster. His favorite target in crucial situations is senior wide receiver Dane Sanzenbacher, who is second in the Big Ten in receiving yards and team leader in receiving touchdowns. If Sanzenbacher is not open, there are also other receiver options in WR DeVier Posey or running back Brandon Saine. A combination of all these players has made Ohio State the Big Ten leader in team points per game and touchdowns per game. As a whole on offense, this team possesses great depth which results in wearing defenses one play at a time.

A solid defense is another asset OSU bring into every game. The Buckeyes lead the Big Ten in team interceptions and team yards against per game. The reasons for a strong defense would have to be their two senior linebackers Ross Homan and Brian Rolle, who

As for strength of the schedule, the Buckeyes cruised to a No.1 spot on the AP Poll with easy wins over Marshall. Ohio, Eastern Michigan and Indiana while watching the previous No. 1 Alabama lose to South Carolina, OSU's schedule had them playing five of their first six games at home and only three road games the rest of the way. If both Michigan State and Ohio State end the season with the same record, all they can do is leave it to the rules to determine which team will earn a trip to Pasadena. Using the tie breaker, MSU will go to the Rose Bowl and Ohio State will go to a big bowl game like the Orange Bowl, Sugar Bowl or Fiesta Bowl if they climb back to the top four teams.

The urge to grab a satisfying, crunchy snack hits everyone at one time or another, and when a person decides to incorporate raw foods into their diet, kale chips can certainly satisfy that urge. Not only are kale chips delicious and nutritious, these little crispy morsels are very easy to prepare.

Kale is not necessarily a staple in everyone's kitchen. It is a dark green, leafy lettuce that is more than likely looked over while shopping for produce. It comes in many different shapes, colors and has a very strong taste. Because of its sturdy texture and bitterness, kale is often prepared via boiling or sautéing, even though it is widely known that foods lose their nutritional value if its internal temperature reaches 116 degrees or higher. By using the dehydrating method, foods can retain their enzymes and still deliver their nutrients.

Kale is full of beneficial nutrients and is quickly becoming recognized as a "super food" because of its cancerfighting abilities. It is packed with beta-carotene, an important nutrient for good vision and is loaded with vitamins A, C and K. Kale is also an excellent source of minerals, containing iron, manganese, calcium and potassium.

One caveat about kale is the fact that it contains goitrogen, which could possibly interfere with thyroid gland function. Its high content of vitamin K may also interfere with certain blood thinning medications. So, if you suffer from thyroid disease or have bloodclotting issues, consult your healthcare professional to see if you should avoid kale.

Smoky & Sweet Kale Chips

Start by soaking a cup of raw almonds in a glass bowl covered with filtered water for about three hours in the refrigerator. When the almonds are ready, soak two or three bunches of organic kale in a large vessel of salt

bathing, prepare the seasoning in the meantime. Next, take your blender out to combine the following ingredients and blend ingredients until smooth and creamy (add water a little at a time for a smoother texture, if needed):

- 1 cup soaked almonds
- 2 tablespoon Nutritional Yeast (Found in health food stores. This will give the kale chips a "cheddar"
- flavor.) 3 tablespoon Olive Oil (this will aid in the absorption of the
- nutrients) 2 tablespoon lemon juice
- 1 tablespoon Yacon syrup
- (this will give the kale its smoky sweetness. It is low sugar and has a low glycemic index. Blackstrap molasses can be substituted)
- 1 teaspoon turmeric powder
- 1½ tablespoon garlic powder
- 2 tablespoon chili powder 1 tablespoon Mesquite seasoning
- ½ teaspoon onion powder
- 1 teaspoon sea salt ½ teaspoon mustard powder

Next, rinse the kale as you drain all of the water from it. Break the leafy parts away from the stems and discard the stems. Tear the leaves into pieces about the size of a half dollar. They will shrink during the dehydrating process. Use a salad spinner or clean, dry towels to remove as much water as possible from the leaves.

Transfer the kale to a large bowl and "massage" the seasoning into it, making sure each piece is coated well.

Spread the kale evenly on dehydrator sheets. If using an oven for dehydrating, set the oven's temperature to the lowest heat setting, not reaching above 115 degrees.

Dehydrate for 4-5 hours keeping an eye on the chips. You want them to be crunchy, not chewy, so start sampling them after about four hours. Store in an airtight bag or container. The crumbs are excellent sprinkled on pasta dishes and salads. Now bite into your delicious creation and enjoy!



How to get great abs

Have you ever looked down at your stomach and wondered how you developed a keg? The thought of a six pack or "perfect abdominals" runs through everyone's head at some point and time in a person's life. Maybe you're at the beach with your girl and a guy winks while running by with granitehard abs. Life isn't perfect and neither are most people's midsections. There are three keys to achieving your goal to becoming that guy or girl which everyone wants to be at the beach: cardio, nutrition and training.

You can have the greatest, most muscular set of abs in the world, but if they are blanketed by a layer of body fat, no one will care. In order to rid yourself of the extra body fat around your midsection, you need to incorporate effective cardio sessions into your fitness plan. You cannot spot-reduce the midsection by doing extra ab exercises like crunches or sit-ups. Burning off the body fat through the right kind of cardio is the first step to properly defining the area.

Abdominal training by itself will not do much. Cardio needs to be intense enough to do the trick. Three to four sessions a week of intense jogging, running, the Stairmaster, the elliptical, jumping rope or biking should be enough to get the process in gear. Swimming, hiking and taking aerobics classes are beneficial as well.

Remember hearing your doctor tell you that eating healthy will reduce fat? Well guess what? They were dead on and the same rule applies to attaining abs. Ridding the body of fat once and for all is accomplished by proper nutrition more so than incorporating cardio. At the end of the day, if you have consumed more calories than you have expended, you add body fat. So you need to burn more calories than you consume.

Nutrition is important because you can reduce the amount of calories you take in, therefore greatly having an effect on the amount which you have

to expend through cardio. Eat five to six small, well-balanced meals spaced apart about every three to four hours. Try to keep something healthy on

If not, when you become real hungry, you will opt for something that isn't as good for you. When you become overly hungry, all rational thinking goes out

Muscle fiber is made of tightlywound protein, a molecule that is damaged during a workout, so you need more protein than the sedentary person to help that muscle tissue repair. Carbohydrates have an important role in the body, but do not base your meals on them. Try to avoid simple sugars like cane sugar, honey, fruit juices, syrups and even a lot of

Drink at least a gallon of clean water each day as well. It will help with nutrient absorption and digestion and will aid in flushing out toxins from the

Bottom line: make sure you are supplying your body with well-balanced, healthy food every three to four hours.

The last step on your way to perfection is how you train your midsection. The general public believes that a few ab machines will solve the problem. I often ask those I train, "Would you train your biceps with sets of 50 reps with no weight?" Of course, they say "no." How about your chest, 50 reps with no weight? Another no. I then ask, "Then why would you do that with your abs?"

Here's an important key to remember. If you want proper ab development, you need to add resistance (weight) to your ab exercises. Abs are muscles which need to be treated like any other. You need resistance to properly strengthen and build them.

A few ab exercises you can incorporate in your workout to help stimulate muscle growth are: weighted crunches, Cable Rope Crunches, Weighted Leg Raises, Seated Ab Machine, and Stability Ball Crunches.

Remember to keep striving towards your goal and you will one day own a strong midsection.




