Comfort dogs bring stress relief and smiles to college community

As students navigate the pressures of academic life, a new initiative is bringing a dose of joy and companionship to the campus. With their wagging tails and happy smiles, these four-legged friends are here not only to be petted and adored. They are here to help create a sense of community and reduce stress among students. Scout, Copper, Mocha, Teddy and Starla are welcome to all pets.

Schoolcraft College President, Dr. Glen Cerny, expressed the idea of bringing comfort dogs on campus to the Schoolcraft College police department last year. He expressed how having a dog's presence on campus would make the environment more welcoming and relaxed for the students. With the stress students place upon themselves, they could use something to brighten their day. The police department adapted this plan at once. They discovered a breeder for Labrador Retrievers in Canada and made a request for five black Labs. Soon after, their request was granted.

Once the pups were born, they were trained by the breeder for twelve weeks before getting to come home. From the litters, the five were chosen for their sociable and extraverted traits. Once they were initially trained by their breeder on simple commands, they traveled from Canada to Livonia, Michigan with their Police Officer Handlers, where they underwent special comfort dog training at Off-Leash K-9 Training in Farmington Hills. The dogs learned obedience and continual command training. Apart from the dogs, their handlers also had to learn how to continue with the training while working on campus. Since the dogs' graduation from Off Leash K-9 on July 22, they have been adapting extremely well to their new home and have gotten a successful response from Schoolcraft students and faculty. When asked about the response level from the students to the new dogs on campus, Sgt. Murray stated, "They love them, and are so happy when they see them, they want to pet them and snuggle with them."

The dogs have been extremely active in campus events since the start of the fall semester and have attended Ozzy Polooza, Touch-a-Truck and School Daze. The handlers have had requests almost everyday for classroom dog visits from instructors. Officer Murray explained, "We get many requests every week to have dogs come to classrooms and participate in various events".

Once the dogs turn around a year old at the end of January, they will return to training to gain their therapy dog certification. The dogs will have to respond to forty-five obedience and patience commands before passing their test.

In the time working up to the test, their handlers are working diligently to prepare them. Each handler has a bright orange communication device connected to each dog's collar, these devices provide a small buzz, which feels like a small vibration to the dogs. They do not harm the dogs in any way, and are used for obedience training.

The handlers want to remind everyone





Welcoming the world to campus

Schoolcraft's extraordinary international community and how to make them welcome

Most students on campus have experienced it countless times before: the classic rise and fall of the school day. A mundane commute to class, a cozy lunch around a coffee table, perhaps a wave of relief at the end of that last lecture. The familiarity of routine and tradition weighed down like a blanket of reassurance around your shoulders. Even if today doesn't go perfect, tomorrow will be more of the same old day to shape into something you're proud of. It'd be easy to assume this is a universal experience at Schoolcraft College— but the reality isn't that simple, and is better off because of it.

International students on campus

"This fall we welcomed 75 international students," said Laura LeVoie Leshok, Director of International Student Center at Schoolcraft. "It's a huge percentage increase from last year," said Leshok, bringing the total number of enrolled international students at Schoolcraft to around 275 from cultures around the world. "A lot of schools have pockets of students, maybe a lot from one or two countries ... We're lucky to have students from nearly 50 different

countries."

These students bring a variety of unique perspectives and skills to campus: new ideas, celebrations of faith, customs, and generation-long traditions that domestic students may never have the chance to experience again.

These students choose to come to Schoolcraft for a variety of different reasons, Leshok explained. "We have quite a few international soccer players on the Schoolcraft team, they bring a different type of game to soccer than a domestic student. There's also a lot of transfers from four year schools." Community colleges aren't well known in foreign countries, she continued. Many students arrive at a large school, believing it's their only choice for premium American education. If the experience isn't positive for them, a relocation to Schoolcraft College provides new tools for success on a less overwhelming campus.

Struggles in a new world

The trials international students face are just as varied as their cultures, Leshok expressed. 'Standard' struggles remain: stress, friendships, difficult classes; all compounded by issues like food insecurity, homesickness and the challenges of understanding a new culture. Activities locals view as second nature, like counting coins, navigating around semi trucks on the road; they can be massive hurdles for students experiencing America for the first time.

"One of the hardest things for international students," said Leshok, "is the lack of

public transportation here, which many of them are accustomed to in their countries." After all, Detroit is the automobile capital of the world— local custom dictates owning and maintaining your own vehicle; something a great deal of international students are not in a position to do. The shortage of transportation leads many to less than ideal scenarios; arriving at school early and leaving late.

Most oppressive of the hurdles faced are the crushing expectations. The American immigrant experience has never been an easy one. Moving to the United States often necessitates a massive amount of money, paperwork, and time. It's a massive investment for international students and their families. For many, coming to America is viewed as a promise for a better life. The demand to fulfill that promise in a way accepted by both the unfamiliar local culture and family back home can be incredibly draining.

The International Student Space and how to get involved

Schoolcraft College has made massive strides in welcoming and supporting the international community. Few projects better exemplify this than the International Student Space, which Leshok manages.

"We got our new space in the McDowell Center a couple years back ... we realized there was a need for the international students to have a hang out space of their own," said Leshok. The space was ideal for this, Leshok explained, because of its proximity to Schoolcraft's introductory ESL classes that many foreign students are



required to take. The center has been outfitted with a computer, whiteboards, puzzles, games and lots of space for students to socalize. Additionally, it's equipped with snacks, blankets and other necessities to combat the various insecurities and shortages that internationals can face.

The International Student Space currently has a modest number of patrons, six to ten a day, according to Leshok, but newcomers are always welcome.

"We hope that traffic will continue and students will continue to use the space to collaborate with each other," said Leshok.

Leshok continued to explain that the space is available for all students, even domestic ones. The best part of any international program is the cultural exchange it enables. Domestic students are as much a part of this as internationals.

The International Student Space is provided by the college, but community contributions are always appreciated. Students often come to Schoolcraft from foreign nations with very few possessions. Moving to America often requires putting your entire life in a suitcase; everyday items simply don't all make the trip.

Household items like shampoo, dishes, towels, blankets, and clothes can add up to a hefty sum, leading some internationals to cut corners and scrape by with less than they deserve. Leshok recalled a recent donation of pillows– gone in an instant. The items international students go without aren't always obvious.

Creative donations and unique supplies can have a tremendous impact; any items can be dropped off at the space Monday through Friday.

Leshok emphasizes, however, that the best resource for international students on campus is you. "Get out there, come to the International Student Center. Go to events like the Multicultural Fair. Go see a soccer game this season, there are only a few left," she said.

At the end of the day, responsibility for making our international students feel welcome falls on the faculty and student body. Whether making a donation, starting a friendship, or simply visiting the International Student Center. Every Ocelot can contribute to and benefit from Schoolcraft's diverse, vibrant, and beautiful comm u - nity.



Vera Lone perseveres and overcomes

American WorldSkills competitor takes an astounding fifth place

Schoolcraft has made it across the globe to Lyon, France for the WorldSkills competition. In our Schoolcraft kitchen, culinary legend Novirah Lone practiced for weeks preparing for this intense competition. Working hard in the kitchen to hone in her skills to compete beyond the national level.

Worldskills is a global event, inviting many countries to come together to compete for a chance at being recognized as being the best at their skill. WorldSkills goal is to bring global cultures together, for young students to build up their confidence and help communities build up their economies. They do not only showcase Culinary but several trade skills, such as wielding, heavy machinery and even plumbing. Bringing cultures together from around the world to express their love for their trade skills.

Before graduating in 2022 at Plymouth Canton Education



Park, she competed in SkillsU-SA, winning culinary competitions on a National level. Lone had to win at least once at a national level to earn the possibility of competing in WorldSkills. In Feb. 2024, Lone was picked and she was thrilled to accept this chance to compete at this level. Regionals, state, national and worlds, everyone has to win nationals at least once.

After being chosen she met other SkillUSA competitors., something that was noticed was that Lone was the only female and person of color heading towards Lyon. This was topped with facing prejudices against America and herself as a competitor. Many competitors assumed that Americans are rude. After meeting her they opened up to her, however, she was questioned if she was even American to begin with because of being a muslim. She even faced sexism from fellow USA competitors. "They[USA competitors] asked me if I even knew what I was doing,"said Lone. This drove and motivated Lone

to compete even harder. Loneearned her place at Worldskills, and was one of the youngest. Not only did she get fifth place in culinary, she placed above tenth place which North America hasn't done in several decades.

The location of WorldSkills changes each competition, since

France hosted dishes that were of French origin. The competition lasted four days in total. The first day was bistro day, six different dishes that required five portions of each dish; made from scratch. This included fish, beef. chicken baguette, croque monsieur and even a vegetarian option. Lone prepared the vegetarian dish with tomato, mozzarella, arugula and balsamic. Crepes and pain perdu, which we call french bread in America. Pain perdu translates to lost bread because the recipe calls for the use of stale or

"lost" bread. All meats were seared, so judges could observe how well competitors cook the meat.

The second day was a speed test such as separating eggs from yolk from whites, mixing sugar with the egg whites to form stiff peaks. Next was to fix a broken mayonnaise, which Lone states was easy since all you need is an egg yoke. One of the most

with French flag colors. Lone planned to make an Ermine buttercream which had to be cooked, but during the cooking process it was burned. Though her burner was faulty and the judges agreed that she was given a faulty burner; luckily losing no points. Though she did have to make a regular buttercream, which was disappointing in the point of showing her skills.

Lone was supported by many including her family. Her parents are her number one supporters. Along with Greg Beachey who was the expert that helped Lone along in preparing for the competition. She even had support from out of America, finding support and a friend in Canada. Though a fellow competitor, she found a close friend, Olivia Sewell, who was also selected to compete. That didn't stop them from forming a close long distance friendship.

While in France Lone learned many new skills, and visited many new places. She did not only just compete, she had the opportunity to embrace a whole new culture, she decided to embrace France. "You're in a different country on the other side of the world." Lone continued that she loved all the sightseeing, listening to all the people speaking in French. Along with this she visited a bakery farm, where she learned how they continue a food culture of small town bakeries. Sightseeing also included a tour of Paul Bocuse's restaurant and market that he owns.

During her time in France, a requirement for WorldSkills was to interact with students from that country. Middle schoolers excitedly greeted Lone "They love America and are learning about America, they [French students] were so excited and so sweet, " said Lone. Lone continues that these students are studying American culture and how to speak English fluently.

A skill Lone has brought home is how to make burrata cheese.

"It's a type of mozzarella cheese, traditionally made with buffalo milk; Stracciatella

cheese, which is a creamy stringy cheese then stuffed into a mozzarella ball. So, when you open the ball you have a burrata ball,"said Lone. Lone continues, saying the hardest part of making burrata is getting the curds for the inside just right.

The next WorldSkills competition will be held in 2026 in Shanghai, China.

Lone states she has been asked to go as a mentor, but is undecided. "If I'm not doing my own thing, unless I am still in school or running my own restaurant." She continues that she will decide by the end of 2025.

Lone does want to visit China. We will be on our toes, waiting to see how this young culinary artist continues to flourish.

The fight for social justice New club provides students with the opportunity to make noise and change

Earlier this year, the Social Justice Collective was established as a club for Schoolcraft students who are interested in analyzing and discussing social issues through mass media. Social Justice Collective is a wonderful opportunity for students who are dedicated to raising awareness about social problems. The collective seeks to raise funds and help out individuals in the local community as well, specifically those who are affected by homelessness, substance abuse and/or interpersonal violence.

Social Justice Collective was founded in the Spring semester by student and career mentor Nikki Wells, who has held a lifelong passion for social justice and activism. Wells originally came up with the idea for Social Justice Collective while taking Mass Media and Popular Culture, or Humanities 212. The course dives into the multiple ways in which mass media and popular culture are able to create narratives. The content of the class allows students to understand and examine how these narratives affect the lives of the public as they perpetuate specific rhetoric and ideology.

Throughout the class, students watch and analyze the critically-acclaimed television series "The Wire," which takes place in the city of Baltimore and was released in 2002. The show critiques systemic racism, the decline of metropolitan cities and the war on drugs that created a new wave of injustice, impunity and corruption within Baltimore.

Wells was inspired by the content and discussions of the class.

"I thought the whole idea of using mass media to address social issues is just such a brilliant thing," said Wells.. "I have been a social activist by heart my whole life from my own systemic barriers that I had to overcome, and just seeing people I love go through things. I always wanted to, when I became able to, whatever I got, just give it back. [Social Justice Collective] was just a great opportunity to blend the two things," she continued.

By the end of the semester, Wells brought the concept to Professor Helen Ditouras who teaches the class and currently serves as the faculty advisor for Social Justice Collective.

"Nikki is one of my former students and over the last few semesters, we have had some candid conversations about the intersection of social justice and student well-being; Nikki's passion for social justice aligned with my teaching pedagogy and I wanted to support her journey as a student at Schoolcraft College," said Ditouras.

The club is open to anyone with the desire to make a difference and change in the community, as Wells strives for Social Justice Collective to be an inclusive place. It is an opportunity to learn and think critically about



the manner in which the media contributes to and portrays issues like toxic masculinity, racism, gender discrimination, sexual assault, interpersonal violence, etc.

Wells, who hopes to pursue public relations, wants for Social Justice Collective to open minds and hearts. It is meant to be an environment in which humanity and dignity will be prioritized, as well as a place where respect and love can thrive.

The club meets on Thursdays at 2:00 p.m. at the Lower Level, Vistatech Center, in conference room C. Here, students will have the opportunity to engage in critical discussions and organize to create change. Films and documentaries will be the focus for analysis.

Each month, a new student employee will be recognized and given a certificate with a different prize. On average, the number of student employees is around 400 each year. Usually students work about ten to fifteen hours, but some as much as 25 hours per week. Pay is usually between \$12 - \$14 per hour. Student employees must be taking at least 6 credits and maintain a GPA of 2.0 or higher.

Sanika Tailor

Schoolcrafts' first September student employee is Sanika Tailor. Her role is Digital Database Assistant with Schoolcraft Foundation, located in the Jeffress Center. This department handles fundraising and scholarships. While working at the Foundation office, Tailor has been able to finagle what she enjoys.

"Working at the Foundation has helped me clarify what I wanted to do," said Tailor. Shecontinues on to explain how she really enjoys making posters for events. She has other important duties such as handling the departments social media accounts, such as Facebook. Tailor has even designed a booklet that was given to those who donate to the foundation. She has found that there is a lot of exposure to donors and has learned other skills that will help.

She has even been able to see all the amazing scholarship opportunities students have at Schoolcraft through the Foundation.

"I think this is a great opportunity. There are so many scholarships that students don't know about,." said Tailor.

Tailor is working towards her business administration associates degree and plans to transfer to Wayne State; double majoring in information systems and digital marketing.

'Joker: Folie à Deux' became a musical spectacle.

The long awaited sequel of Joker 2 has faced scrutiny with its unexpected angles that viewers are not receiving well. In the first Joker, we are met with Arthur Fleck. played by Joaquin Phoenix; a very lonely and depressed man, who appears to slowly descend into madness. We watch as he commits violent crimes, but gains sympathy from those who support his cause. In Joker two, the movie begins with what we will later learn was the movie that was inspired by Fleck's crimes. The theme of the cartoon takes on a looney-toon aspect, even with a WB [Warner Brothers] beginning. Afterwards, we are transported to Arkham asylum. Here, we see a highly medicated and docile Fleck being held in maximum security as he awaits his trial. We are brought along as the guards roughly get Fleck ready to see his lawyer. While walking Fleck to the minimum security wing, we see patients singing in a choir.

This is where we are introduced to Harley Quinn, who goes by Lee and is played by Lady Gaga. When Fleck is being interviewed by a psychiatrist, it almost seems that they are pushing for the Joker

to come out. Even at one point, the psychiatrist asks to speak with the Joker. Fleck smiles and a bright white light shines on him. This begins his slow descent into

insanity or is it taking on a persona to cope with his less than ideal situation?

Due to Fleck behaving well, the guard named Jackie Sullivan, played by Brandon Gleeson, takes Fleck to begin singing in the choir with the minimum security patients. Quinn and Fleck officially meet and begin to have a very unhealthy courtship. At one point, Quinn lights a piano on fire during a movie patients were watching together so that she and Fleck could be alone. During a time when Fleck is faced with a challenging situation, we are transported into his vivid imagination, in song form. The movie had a total of sixteen songs, fifteen of which are sung by Phoenix and Gaga.

Though this film has not been received well, it begs to question. Is this a movie for entertainment or is this a movie that makes you question if this man is really insane or is he a very lonely and depressed human, begging to be understood. When Fleck meets Quinn, he quickly falls under her spell. He stops taking his meds and begins to take on the persona of his version of the Joker.

To answer the question if Joker two is for entertainment purposes, no. This movie makes the viewer question the realities of this particular man. Fleck regardless is a highly mentally ill man, but what he is suffering from is up to the viewer to speculate. Though many were not expecting a musical, there are not so hidden reasons why. In the first movie this also happens, but it takes on a different way.

During the trial, the topic of Fleck's mother comes up. It is mentioned that his

Something that was not expected was that you are expected to remember very small details from the first movie that came out years ago. It is best to watch the first movie first before seeing the second, this helps your memory when walking into this movie. You definitely cannot watch Joker two without watching the first. The movie takes on dark cinematography and relies heavily on the musical aspect. Gaga and Phoenix vocally duet very well and the songs were not unpleasant. Both actors are accomplished singers and had chemistry to boot between them.



This captivating game was initially released on February 10, 2023 on the platforms of Nintendo Switch, PlayStation, Xbox and PC. The game transfigures players straight into the adored elements of the wizarding world and Hogwarts School of Witchcraft and Wizardry, through breathtaking graphics and marvelous storylines.

The game opens with players receiving their Hogwarts acceptance letter from new Deputy Headmistress Weasley, before completely customizing their characters. Preset options are available along with detailed customization such as voice, clothing, skin color, hair style and color, complexion, scars and more. Players can further select their dormitory preference of witch or wizard, as well as select their difficulty level; story, easy, normal and hard.

Players are then shown an action-fueled cut-scene containing vital plot information, before starting the tutorial in a small cave with Professor Fig. This beginning quest offers an opportunity to both to learn and get comfortable with the controls, ranging from basic movements to casting spells. Upon completion, players are sent to Hogwarts through an impeccable and nostalgic cutscene.



You raise your stick and slap it right above the goalie's right arm and into the net. The crowd jumps, your teammates and coaches rushing over. You raise the Stanley Cup above your head and celebrate. This moment, this fever dream, is one where everyone wants to be part of, whether they're a paying fan or sitting on the bench. Like the Head Coach of the Schoolcraft Men's Hockey Team, Dan Phelps, said: "Hockey isn't just a game; it's a lifestyle."

Phelps fostered this mentality when he started forming the Schoolcraft Men's Hockey program last year. With his two coaching assistants, he aims to create a strong program where his student-athletes have the opportunity to participate. Phelps is committed to creating a good environment for his players where they feel they're enjoying themselves and having fun, but also being put in a competitive atmosphere, where we can be a team that challenges our opponents every time we go out on the ice.

To achieve this, he takes time to under-

stand who the players are as individuals, not just as athletes. He facilitates respect between coaches and players allowing the players to have feedback in the program.

Phelps also understands that respect comes with an acknowledgment of who the players are: students. He knows that their educational component is the most important aspect of their lives. "When we met with the players and their parents during the recruiting process, we wanted them to understand that the players are student-athletes: school first, athlete second," said Phelps. He recognizes the importance of getting a proper education and enjoying college life.

"Being successful in the classroom prepares them for training, education, and knowledge to move forward in life. Being here at Schoolcraft, we want this to be a positive time in their lives that they look back on," said Phelps.

He constantly reminds his players to be a student of the game all the time. The players also have access to Trinity Elite Sports Performance, located inside Trinity Elite Sports Center on campus, where they work with sports performance and

strength and conditioning coaches to ensure they're physically fit to perform on the ice. These coaches also prepare the players for injury prevention, so they're less susceptible to injuries throughout the season. If they do get injured, they have rehabilitation options and work with athletic trainers. "We have the ability, under the umbrella of the athletic department, to access some very nice amenities," said Phelps. Dan effectively uses these amenities to condition his athletes, stating, "The better-conditioned teams are the most prepared."

The 2024-25 Ocelots hockey season started September 22, and the biggest challenge the team will face is the pressure on the ice. The team will be playing university level programs throughout the season, however, Phelps reassures his players that pressure and adversity are something we see every day in life.

He understands that the team will make mistakes because hockey is a fast-paced game. He wants them to move on and learn.; That's what makes individual athletes better and builds the team up..

Phelps believes that the team will support each other throughout the season. He is a strong believer in chemistry and expects the players to have a sense of ownership, which comes with a trust factor that each of them will be there for each other.

Coach Phelps' main focus is building the hockey culture at Schoolcraft and creating a solid program. He's thankful for the players who chose to be part of this new program rather than opting for another institution with a more established program.

"This team are pioneers of this new pro-

gram," said Phelps. "As pioneers, his goal is for players to help build the culture, our identity, and everything of that nature, so that one day, they can come back and look at something that's bigger than all of us."

For now, the players are working hard daily, and that's all Phelps could ever want. He is very excited for this season and looks forward to the journey of the program.

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


Avlochan Singh Major: Accounting


