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

Nino Salvaggio International Marketplace brings culinary and business opportunities to campus

Construction is set to begin soon for an expansion of Nino Salvaggio International Marketplace on Schoolcraft College's campus. The local premium fruit market and grocer will be built between the Visatech Center and the Jeffress Center, replacing a portion of the north parking lot. The building will integrate with Schoolcraft's culinary and business programs, and will serve nearby communities with fresh and prepared foods in a storefront on Haggerty Road near Seven Mile.

A multigenerational family business with roots in Terrasini, Italy, Nino Salvaggio International Marketplace has grown into a thriving local establishment, said Leo Salvaggio, the company's CEO. With locations across the metro Detroit area, the company has a strong foothold in the region. As times change, Salvaggio is looking to new avenues of success. "I believe the future is in prepared foods. Everyone wants convenience, but they shouldn't have to sacrifice quality," he explained. "A future goal of Nino Salvaggio is to offer healthy, delicious prepared foods for the community alongside our produce."

This goal led to an exciting opportunity for collaboration with Schoolcraft College. With a renowned culinary program, the prospective partnership presented a valuable opportunity, Salvaggio explained.

"The goal here at Schoolcraft College is to take Nino Salvaggio from a fruit market store to a culinary experience... Where else have you seen anything like this? It's a oneof-a-kind opportunity for us to learn from

students and for the students to learn from us."

Schoolcraft President, Dr. Glenn Cerny shared his enthusiasm for the partnership.

"It's the student experiences that draw students to Schoolcraft College. You're having experiential learning, you are doing real life things... Nino Salvaggio coming to campus is another way for our students to get real work experience." He expressed hope that the partnership would benefit Schoolcraft's culinary program for years to come and integrate seamlessly into the school's business programs.

Cerny also detailed the major financial resources this partnership would bring to Schoolcraft, including rent paid by Nino Salvaggio for use of the school's land and the Salvaggio-funded construction of a new parking lot along Haggerty road. The income generated will fund improvements across campus and support various programs. Future updates to the Liberal Arts building and repairs to the adjacent parking lot may also be considered.

The cementing of a partnership between Schoolcraft and Nino Salvaggio was neither easy nor quick— the two groups worked behind the scenes for months before making a public announcement.

"These deals," Cerny explained, "like the Trinity deal, took a few months... These things take time because each of them is


unique. But in the endgame, it's very positive for the college."

"It's like a relationship," Salvaggio said.
"It's hard work; you can't go to bed angry... We've created a great relationship."
Both Cerny and Salvaggio cited financial difficulties and the collaborative process as hurdles that were eventually overcome; culminating in the announcement of a nonbinding memorandum on March 6 and an official groundbreaking on November 7, publicly finalizing the project and rewarding the combined effort.

Construction has yet to begin in earnest. "In every project you have a key pathway. For this project, that pathway is the completion of the parking lot," Cerny said. The completion of this parking lot will allow construction of the Nino Salvaggio location to progress without significant impact on students and faculty, he explained. As soon as the lot is finished contractors will begin work on the new building.

Cerny speculated that integrating the college's educational experiences into the business could begin as early as next January.

"We're going to need nine to twelve

months to really work through the scenarios... the Curriculum Office is going to have to figure out how this will change the curriculum," he explained. "There's due diligence that has to be done but I'd expect it will begin in January."

Salvaggio expressed excitement for the involvement of students in the new store, which will feature a classroom along with opportunities to engage with the business. "We're going to have students in the store, learning how to order shipments, learning about human resources, learning all the

stuff you need to know to be successful in this business... I like raising people up," Salvaggio added, a subtle echo of Schoolcraft's own motto, "Look Ever Upward." It's a motto both Nino Salvaggio International Marketplace and Schoolcraft College can pass onto future generations—together.

Although she didn't win the million dollars, it was a million-dollar experience according to Culinary Arts student Kristal Davis, who had a once in a lifetime opportunity to travel to Los Angeles, California to be a contestant on Wheel of Fortune this past summer. Wheel of Fortune is a popular American game show filled with chance, puzzles and for Davis, memories of a lifetime.

Davis has been a longtime fan of the show for over 20 years, watching every episode with my Grannies. Together they would watch Wheel of Fortune for the feeling of luck and chance, then watch Jeopardy after for the test of their knowledge. As she got older, she joined the Wheel Watchers Club; a club that displayed the winners for each episode and statistics of each contestant.

One week she logged on to check if her wheel statues had won, it didn't. However, she noticed something peculiar at the bottom of her screen. It had asked her if she wanted to fill out a form to be a contestant. Davis filled out the information, not giving another ounce of thought to it.

Months passed, and at the end of February 2024 she received an email invitation to a group zoom interview in March.

"I felt discouraged, I was in the interview with around 25 other people, how could they choose between all of our personalities?" said Davis. However, at the time she felt so much honor being even asked to interview it didn't phase her too much. They told the prospects not to get worried if she doesn't hear anything back for some time, for it could take up to a year to get recruited.

After the interview, Davis went on with her classes at Schoolcraft and significant time had passed. She had gotten so busy that she forgot she even went through with the interview.

Davis believed she had no chance to continue on to the next group.

One day in early August she looked down at her phone, to see an email from Wheel of Fortune. Davis opened it, and it read, "Congratulations Kristal!"

She remembers her heart leaping at that moment.

"It was the absolute best feeling I have ever felt in my life," said Davis. She recalled screaming at the top of her lungs.

Davis continued reading the email and they sent her three dates she could choose from: August 27, 28 or the 29th. The dates were soon, she didn't know how she was going to fit it in, but she knew she had to go.

Davis selected August 28 to attend and she bought her ticket and left.

She arrived on August 28 at 6 a.m..Davis recalls the entire day as if it were a dream from

touring Universal Studios to being on set, she can recall it all very vividly. She felt like a movie star.

The show was filmed all day, went through practice and then the official broadcasting. It went by in a flash, but she would not trade the experience for anything.

Davis was able to see what goes into the real behind the scenes of Hollywood. Seeing what it was like to have real fame.

The show aired on television, October 14 nationwide. Now every time someone asks about her experience on Wheel of Fortune or even recognizes her, she feels so much joy and honor to be recognized.

"Even a smile from someone in the hallway makes me feel like a celebrity," said Davis. Being on the show was a once in a lifetime experience, which was a dream come true. From a young age she dreamt about being on the show, and she made it.

Empty Bowl Luncheon set for December 5

The Empty Bowl Luncheon will be held in the Wilson Room, outside Henry's Café, Thursday, Dec. 5, from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. All proceeds will benefit Schoolcraft's food pantry.

In the fall semester of 2023, about 19 students used the food pantry. As the 2024 fall semester comes to a close, that number has increased to 55 students, highlighting the growing need on campus. Last year, the Empty Bowl Luncheon raised approximately \$3,000, and with demand rising rapidly, organizers are hopeful for an even larger turnout this year.

The Empty Bowl Luncheon has been a Schoolcraft tradition for decades, currently organized by Todd Stowell, Director of Student Activities. The event began in the early 2000's, to raise funds for a Catholic charity run by Sister Joan, who operated St. Leo's Soup Kitchen in Detroit. Schoolcraft students would volunteer their time to assist in the soup kitchen.

In 2011, it was decided to help Schoolcraft students better with an on-campus food pantry. Since then, proceeds from the Empty Bowl Luncheon have been used to keep the pantry stocked. Robert Bielat, the former ceramics professor at Schoolcraft from 2000 to 2015, was essential in helping raise funds for the cause. After Bielats' passing in 2018, his wife Veronica, established The Robert Bielat Memorial Scholarship, which is available to students who are in ceramics or in 3D sculpture.

Sophie Neslund, the current professor of





Sherry Springer, a Schoolcraft graduate who fell in love with the college and worked as the Student Activities Coordinator until retirement in 2009. Springer was essential in helping establish the Empty Bowl Luncheon.

In addition to the Ceramics and the Student Activities Offices, the Culinary Operations department also has a necessary role in the charity. Each year, they provide a vegetable-based soup, along with a variety of bread.

Many attendees purchase bowls, created by students in the ceramics classes. After purchasing the bowls, patrons can grab some soup and enjoy your ceramic piece made by a Schoolcraft student. Each piece is priced by the Student Activities Office. Depending on how intricate and detailed the piece, prices range from \$10 - \$55. Typically these bowls are purchased as holiday gifts for family and friends. We hope to see you there!


Mechanics within the game are quick-time events where the player must click a button repeatedly or click on a button that shows up to make an action.



Players like Lebron James,

listened to coach Jerry West to build the dynasty that is the Los
Angeles Lakers.

What about the men's basket-ball team for Schoolcraft?

Meet Coach EJ Haralson, a coach, and a former player, who wants to give back to the community.

Coach Haralson, a former basketball player, decided to become a coach as he "wanted to do the same thing his coaches did for him when he was a player" as he pays it forward, investing in the players.

Prior to being named the Head Coach at Schoolcraft, Haralson spent 19 years, serving various roles, including Interim Head Coach, at Wayne State University. Prior to Wayne State, Haralson was a coach at Finney High School for 4 years, spending the first two as an assistant and the last two as the head coach. As head coach, Finney won the first Public School League title in school history to go along with a district and regional championship. In the 2002-03 season, Haralson was named the Detroit Public School League Coach of the Year and was awarded the FHS Outstanding Achievement Award. He had five seniors move on to play collegiate basketball.

The third year coach focuses on instilling confidence within his players. He builds structured work ethics and pushes every player to bet on themselves, forces his young players to understand hard work, education, and working together to accomplish their goals.

A strong foundation is key for the Ocelots. The team starts their practices with stretches followed by basic skill warmups and daily workouts to train their body.

Haralson heavily wants the players to build the foundation, focusing on widening their offensive and defensive philosophy. He wants the players to "put themselves out there to be a good team."

Freshman Andrew Kim-

and teaching the game of basketball to his players.



The heart of a runner

Noah Walters demonstrates endurance beyond the finish line



For the second straight year, Cross Country runner, Noah Walters, qualified for Nationals. Representing Schoolcraft Walters, traveled to Richmond, Virginia on Nov. 9 to compete in the NJCAA Division II Cross Country Champioship.. Walters finished in 72 out of 317 competitors with an overall time of 27:27. He qualified for Nationals after placing 13th in the NJCAA Region XII Championships on Oct. 25 with a time of 26:42.9.

Accomplishments like this didn't happen overnight. Over the past several months Walters has been preparing mentally and physically with a strict diet and training regiment. Cross-country is a long-distance running sport, and training for it isn't simply about running several miles every day. Each day's workout is different.In Swedish terms, "fartlek" means "speed play"—running at different speeds over many miles.

When Walters began training with his coach, Tobin Jones, he started at 45-50 miles per week. Jones didn't want to risk injuring Walters, as high school cross-country is not as rigorous as the higher levels of the sport. Jones eventually worked him up to 70 miles per week, 6 days a week, around 12 miles per day.

"There is nothing he [Walters] doesn't do. Once he heads in a direction he has the self motivation to stay focused," said Jones.

Jones continued, noting that Walters is a very disciplined athlete and has become a part of Jones's family.

During interviews with both Jones and Walters, they were quick to compliment each other, sharing how much they appreciate one another.

"Tobin [Jones] is such a great coach," said Walters. He added about how they have become like family. "Runners understand each other; it's a community," said Walters.

During high school Walters was a multisport athlete competing in tennis, swimming, cross country, baseball and even earned his black belt in karate.

When covid hit, tennis was dropped and Walters was invited by a friend to try cross country. He fell in love with running and began searching for a college with a cross country team.

Walters caught the runner's sickness and Jones puts it. "You're a sick man Noah[Walters,] I like you" said Jones. He added that the transition from high school to college-level running was tough for Walters, but Walters holds himself accountable, even without a team. Walters is a tremendous ambassador for Schoolcraft's cross country team and gets along with everyone he encounters. His junior collegiate career is over and he is set to graduate this spring however he is far from slowing down. His passion for running continues to grow and he is looking forward to new challenges. Jones is training Walters to run for a marathon, —approximately 26.2 miles. To prepare for the marathon Jones will have Walters run in several half marathons and increase his training miles per week.

He continues to serve as a spokesperson for the sport, demonstrating that crossing the finish line marks the start of a new adventure rather than its conclusion.

Open heart, open mind

What are the processes international students go through?

I never thought that when I came to Schoolcraft in the Fall of 2023, I would be learning much more than academics.

As we all know, there are hundreds of international students on Schoolcraft's campus; we are classmates, colleagues and genuine friends. However, as Americans, do we really know what international students go through to get here?

With the elections ending and constant misinformation/disinformation circulating throughout social media, news and other platforms, I think there is something that needs to be brought to the forefront and that is the lack of understanding of America's immigration policies.

I certainly can say I don't remember learning about the hundreds of visas there are to immigrate to America. Sitting in the Schoolcraft Connection's newsroom, a conversation between myself and two other staff members began. They began to explain to me the expenses that go into applying for your F1, student visa, and the intricacies of filling out the extensive paperwork. The amount of money that is put into applying without even having approval in the first place. Along with providing proof that you will have a place to live, and can take care of yourself financially.

My mind was blown, not only at the astounding amount of money it costs to remain in America but the process in which they had to go through to remain here to obtain their education.

I gently ask, as this topic can be a huge issue for many. Please read this with an open mind and open heart. For we are all human; take this opportunity to understand a difference in perspective. To be transparent, I am only speaking about international students in this column which is an F1 visa; there are over 180

different types of visas available.

I sat down with Laura Lavoie Leshok, Director and Advisor of the International student office and PDSO, Principal Designated School Official; and Kayla Lahiff, International Student Advisor and DSO, Designated School Official. Their roles and responsibilities are many, but one role for both staffers is to help students with their paperwork such as their visas.

Both are academic advisors for international students and help prepare the students for the transition to Michigan.

"We will do pre arrival webinars to help the students set expectations for school and climate," said Leshok. Leshok continues that some are used to access public transportation and here in Livonia, it doesn't exist. So figuring out transportation to get to school or anywhere can be extremely difficult. Some students will ride their bikes in the winter to campus even in unfavorable conditions..

International students are not eligible for many scholarships, they have to take twelve credits per semester and are restricted to only working on campus and 20 hours per week. Some students, even with the best prepared plan, have to question their housing situation.

International students face adversity when it comes to housing, not all countries have a credit score system. Though some landlords will overlook that, they will require six months worth of rent in advance, or have cosigners and six months of rent.

Many may not know that international students bring billions of dollars into the American economy, according to nafsa.org. In 2022 they contributed 1.3 billion dollars just to the Michigan economy. Lahiff explains that these students don't receive financial aid andthey pay international fees, which is \$270 per credit hour. This is an astounding increase compared to an in district resident, which pays \$139 per credit hour.

So much goes into being an international student there and there is another layer that needs to be addressed.

"There is a huge misconception that anyone who doesn't look like us three [gestures to myself, Lahiff and herself Lashok] is an international student and that's not the case," said Leshok.

There can be misunderstandings that some international students came to America illegally. When the reality is, there are so many steps to coming to America to study. Potential students have to be interviewed by the embassy or consulate, Lahiff clarifies. She continues to explain that some people don't choose to have no papers. However, some do not choose to even be, their parents choose to come to America with no documentation and potential students have no idea until they attempt to enroll. Living in America with no documentation is extremely restrictive and can hinder a student's academic growth.

Imagine having the dream of coming to America, taping a map of the entire United States to your ceiling giving yourself the goal of coming here to study but met with consistent adversity.

American students take for granted the system that we are a part of already, unknowing the hardships others face to make their dreams come true. Instead I believe that we should be making friends and learning from those who are not from America. There is so much tradition and culture we don't know about.

The Schoolcraft Connection is holding a bottle and can drive to raise money for international students, we will use the funds to purchase hand and feet warmers, hygiene products.


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
